### Definitions of "Mobilize" as a verb

- *Bring (resources) into use for a particular purpose.*
- *(of a country or its government) prepare and organize (troops) for active service.*
- *Make (something) movable or capable of movement.*
- *Make ready for action or use.*
- *Organize and encourage (a group of people) to take collective action in pursuit of a particular objective.*
- *Get ready for war.*
- *Cause to move around.*
- *Call to arms; of military personnel.*

<b>arouse</b>	Excite (someone) sexually. <i>The letter <b>aroused</b> in him a sense of urgency.</i>
<b>assemble</b>	Create by putting components or members together. <i>He <b>assembled</b> the surviving members of the group for a tour.</i>
<b>awaken</b>	Rouse from sleep; cause to stop sleeping. <i>The film helped to <b>awaken</b> many to the horrors of apartheid.</i>
<b>bring into play</b>	Advance or set forth in court.
<b>bring into service</b>	Attract the attention of.
<b>call to arms</b>	Order, summon, or request for a specific duty or activity, work, role.
<b>call up</b>	Indicate a decision in regard to.

<b>cause</b>	Cause to do cause to act in a specified manner. <i>We have no idea what has happened to <b>cause</b> people to stay away.</i>
<b>deploy</b>	Place troops or weapons in battle formation. <i>The U S <b>deploys</b> its weapons in the Middle East.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Spur on. <i>We were <b>encouraged</b> by the success of this venture.</i>
<u><b>excite</b></u>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Gould was <b>excited</b> by these discoveries.</i>
<b>foment</b>	Try to stir up public opinion. <i>His legs should be <b>fomented</b>.</i>
<u><b>galvanize</b></u>	Shock or excite (someone) into taking action. <i><b>Galvanize</b> steel.</i>
<b>generate</b>	Form (a line, surface, or solid) by notionally moving a point, line, or surface. <i>The hydroelectric plant needs to <b>generate</b> more electricity.</i>
<b>impel</b>	Cause to move forward with force. <i>A lack of equality <b>impelled</b> the oppressed to fight.</i>
<u><b>incite</b></u>	Urge or persuade (someone) to act in a violent or unlawful way. <i>They conspired to <b>incite</b> riots.</i>
<u><b>induce</b></u>	Produce electric current by electrostatic or magnetic processes. <i>The pickets <b>induced</b> many workers to stay away.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Give rise to. <i>The lung cancer patient cannot <b>inspire</b> air very well.</i>
<b>make ready</b>	Amount to.
<b>marshal</b>	Methodically assemble and arrange (facts, ideas, objects, etc). <i>She is one of those people who can <b>marshal</b> their thoughts quickly and articulate them clearly.</i>
<u><b>mass</b></u>	Assemble or cause to assemble into a single body or mass. <i>Both countries began <b>massing</b> troops in the region.</i>
<b>mobilise</b>	Cause to move around.
<b>muster</b>	(of a group of people) gather together. <i><b>Muster</b> the courage to do something.</i>
<u><b>organize</b></u>	Arrange by systematic planning and united effort. <i>Julie <b>organized</b> food and drink for the band.</i>
<u><b>prepare</b></u>	To prepare verbally either for written or spoken delivery. <i><b>Prepare</b> for war.</i>

<b>prompt</b>	Give an incentive for action. <i>She <b>prompted</b> me to call my relatives.</i>
<b><u>provoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Her behavior <b>provoked</b> a quarrel between the couple.</i>
<b><u>rally</u></b>	Drive in a rally. <i>A series of meetings to <b>rally</b> support for the union.</i>
<b>ready</b>	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <i>Get the children <b>ready</b> for school.</i>
<b>resort to</b>	Move, travel, or proceed toward some place.
<b>stimulate</b>	Act as a stimulant. <i>This herbal infusion doesn't <b>stimulate</b>.</i>
<b>stir up</b>	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic.
<b><u>summon</u></b>	Urgently demand (help). <i>If the person <b>summoned</b> does not appear he may be arrested.</i>
<b>urge</b>	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>He <b>urged</b> her to come and stay with us.</i>
<b>waken</b>	Stop sleeping. <i>She <b>wakened</b> the child and dressed her.</i>
<b>whip up</b>	Strike as if by whipping.

- *The government mobilized regular forces, reservists, and militia.*
- *Acid rain mobilizes the aluminium in forest soils.*
- *At sea we will mobilize any amount of resources to undertake a rescue.*
- *It would be hard for worker representatives to mobilize the workforce against the employers.*
- *The physiotherapist might mobilize the patient's shoulder girdle.*

Armor plate that protects the chest; the front part of a cuirass.  
*The negotiations were conducted under the **aegis** of the UN.*

### **arranged**

Deliberately arranged for effect.  
*The carefully **arranged** chessmen.*

### **beckon**

Summon someone by beckoning to them.  
*The going is tough and soft options **beckon**.*

### **convoke**

Call together.  
*She sent messages **convoking** a Council of Ministers.*

### **crowd**

Cause to herd drive or crowd together.  
*I've broken away from that whole junkie **crowd**.*

### **demonstration**

A show of military force or preparedness.  
*The lecture was accompanied by dramatic **demonstrations**.*



<b><u>elicit</u></b>	Evoked or draw out (a reaction, answer, or fact) from someone. <i>I tried to <b>elicit</b> a smile from Joanna.</i>
<b><u>evoke</u></b>	Evoked or provoke to appear or occur. <i>This remark <b>evoked</b> sadness.</i>
<b>extradition</b>	The surrender of an accused or convicted person by one state or country to another (usually under the provisions of a statute or treaty). <i>They fought to prevent his <b>extradition</b> to the US.</i>
<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Give rise to; evoke. <i>The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely <b>invoked</b> in England.</i>
<b><u>mass</u></b>	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Both countries began <b>massing</b> troops in the region.</i>
<b><u>methodical</u></b>	(of a person) orderly or systematic in thought or behaviour. <i>A <b>methodical</b> approach to the evaluation of computer systems.</i>
<b>mob</b>	A large crowd of people, especially one that is disorderly and intent on causing trouble or violence. <i>He stood out from the rest of the <b>mob</b> with his silver hair and stacked shoes.</i>
<b>musicology</b>	The study of music as an academic subject, as distinct from training in performance or composition; scholarly research into music.
<b>muster</b>	Collect or assemble (a number or amount). <i>He was thrown in the brig for missing <b>muster</b>.</i>
<b>ordered</b>	Marked by an orderly, logical, and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>An <b>ordered</b> sequence.</i>
<b>organized</b>	Methodical and efficient in arrangement or function. <i>She used to be so <b>organized</b>.</i>
<b><u>planned</u></b>	Planned in advance. <i>The <b>planned</b> outlays for new equipment.</i>
<b><u>rally</u></b>	Drive in a rally. <i>A traction engine <b>rally</b>.</i>
<b><u>reciprocity</u></b>	The practice of exchanging things with others for mutual benefit, especially privileges granted by one country or organization to another. <i>The Community intends to start discussions on <b>reciprocity</b> with third countries.</i>
<b><u>reinstate</u></b>	Restore to the previous state or rank. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not <b>reinstated</b>.</i>
<b>repatriate</b>	A person who has been repatriated. <i>The last German POWs were <b>repatriated</b> in November 1948.</i>

<b><u>riot</u></b>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>A <b>riot</b> of emotions raged through Fabia.</i>
<b><u>summon</u></b>	Make ready for action or use. <i>She managed to <b>summon</b> up a smile.</i>
<b>summons</b>	Serve someone with a summons. <i>A <b>summons</b> for non payment of a parking ticket.</i>
<b><u>systematic</u></b>	Done or acting according to a fixed plan or system; methodical. <i>The investigation was very <b>systematic</b>.</i>
<b><u>thorough</u></b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Made a <b>thorough</b> search.</i>
<b>troop</b>	Soldiers or armed forces. <i>UN peacekeeping <b>troops</b>.</i>
<b>warrant</b>	Show to be reasonable or provide adequate ground for. <i>The dealer <b>warrants</b> all the cars he sells.</i>
<b>writ</b>	A form of written command in the name of a court or other legal authority to act or abstain from acting in a particular way. <i>The two reinstated officers issued a <b>writ</b> for libel against the applicants.</i>
