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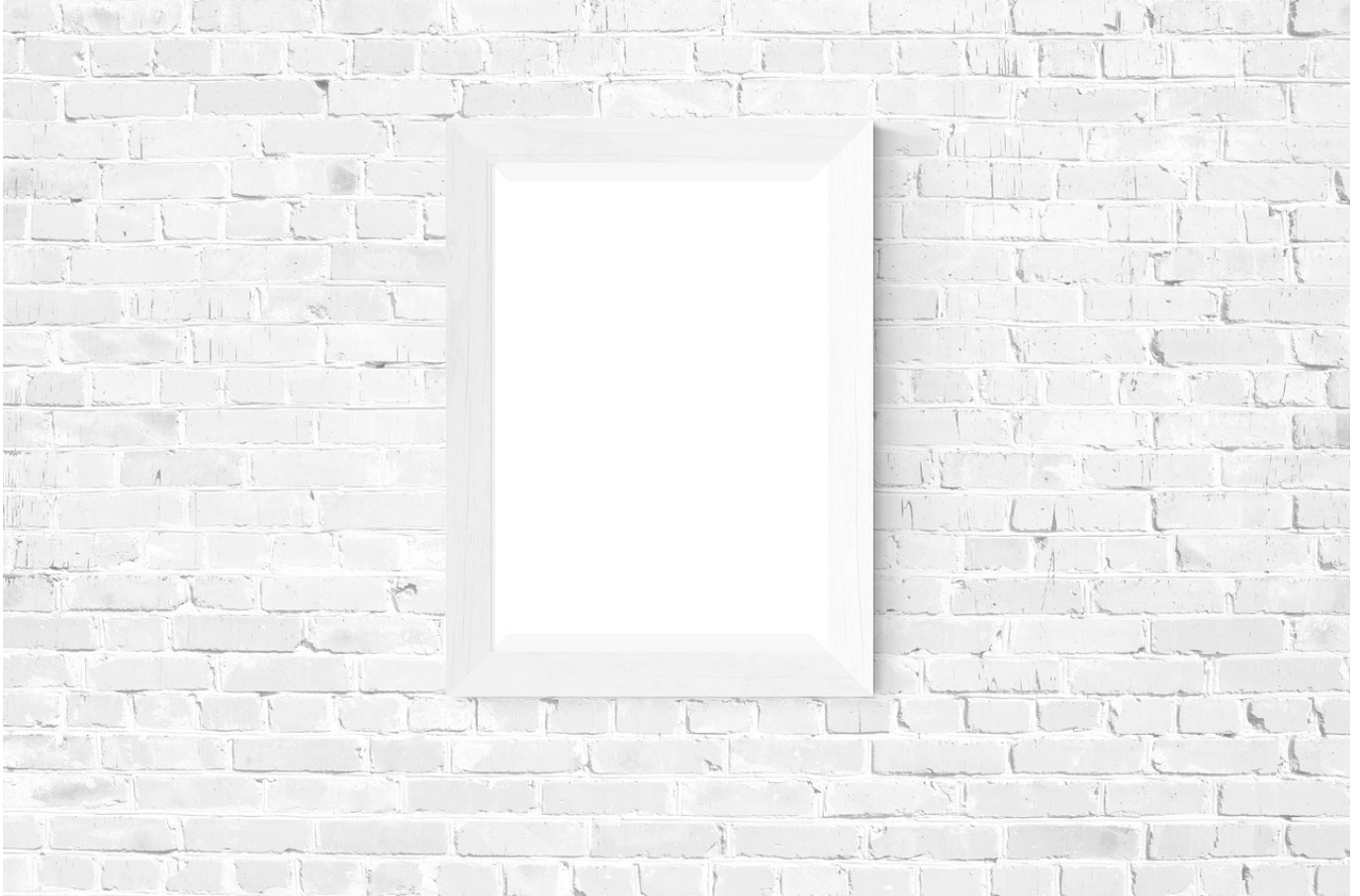

- *Tease or laugh at in a scornful or contemptuous manner.*
- *Make (something) seem laughably unreal or impossible.*
- *Mimic (someone or something) scornfully or contemptuously.*
- *Imitate with mockery and derision.*
- *Treat with contempt.*

<b>ape</b>	Imitate uncritically and in every aspect. <i>Her little brother <b>apes</b> her behavior.</i>
<b>be sarcastic about</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>bemock</b>	Treat with contempt.
<b>caricature</b>	Make or give a caricature of. <i>The drawing <b>caricatured</b> the President.</i>
<b>chaff</b>	Be silly or tease one another.
<b>deride</b>	Treat or speak of with contempt. <i>The decision was <b>derided</b> by environmentalists.</i>
<b>guy</b>	Steady or support with a guy wire or cable. <i>The Italians <b>guyed</b> the Tower of Pisa to prevent it from collapsing.</i>
<b>imitate</b>	Copy or simulate. <i>The mime <b>imitated</b> the passers by.</i>

<b>jeer at</b>	Laugh at with contempt and derision.
<b>jibe at</b>	Shift from one side of the ship to the other.
<b>lampoon</b>	Ridicule with satire. <i>The actor was <b>lampooned</b> by the press.</i>
<b>laugh at</b>	Produce laughter.
<b>laugh to scorn</b>	Produce laughter.
<b>make a monkey of</b>	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.
<b>make fun of</b>	Constitute the essence of.
<b>make jokes about</b>	Perform or carry out.
<b><u>mimic</u></b>	(of a drug) replicate the physiological effects of (another substance). <i>The actor <b>mimicked</b> the President very accurately.</i>
<b><u>parody</u></b>	Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was <b>parodying</b> schoolgirl fiction.</i>
<b>pillory</b>	Put someone in a pillory. <i>He found himself pilloried by members of his own party.</i>
<b>poke fun at</b>	Stir by poking.
<b>rag</b>	Apply paint to a surface with a rag. <i><b>Rag</b> that old tune.</i>
<b><u>ridicule</u></b>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>The satirists <b>ridiculed</b> the plans for a new opera house.</i>
<b>satirize</b>	Ridicule with satire. <i>The writer <b>satirized</b> the politician's proposal.</i>
<b>scoff at</b>	Laugh at with contempt and derision.
<b>scorn</b>	Refuse to do something because one is too proud. <i>A letter <b>scorning</b> his offer of intimacy.</i>
<b>sneer at</b>	Smile contemptuously.
<b>take off</b>	Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route.
<b>taunt</b>	Reproach (someone) with something in a contemptuous way. <i>You once <b>taunted</b> me <b>taunted</b> me with cowardice because I dared not face the world and conquer it.</i>
<b>taunting</b>	Harass with persistent criticism or carping.
<b>tease</b>	Mock or make fun of playfully. <i>The children <b>teased</b> the boy because of his stammer.</i>
<b>treat contemptuously</b>	Provide with a gift or entertainment.

**treat with contempt** Regard or consider in a specific way.

## Mock as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Mock" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "mock" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Constituting a copy or imitation of something.*
- *(of an examination, battle, etc.) arranged for training or practice.*
- *Not authentic or real, but without the intention to deceive.*



## Synonyms of "Mock" as an adjective (24 Words)

<b>artificial</b>	Artificially formal. <i>The <b>artificial</b> division of people into age groups.</i>
<b>bogus</b>	Not genuine or true (used in a disapproving manner when deception has been attempted). <i>A <b>bogus</b> insurance claim.</i>
<b>counterfeit</b>	Not genuine; imitating something superior. <i><b>Counterfeit</b> 10 notes.</i>
<b>ersatz</b>	(of a product) made or used as a substitute, typically an inferior one, for something else. <i><b>Ersatz</b> emotion.</i>
<b>fake</b>	(of a person) claiming to be something that one is not. <i>It isn't <b>fake</b> anything it's real synthetic fur.</i>

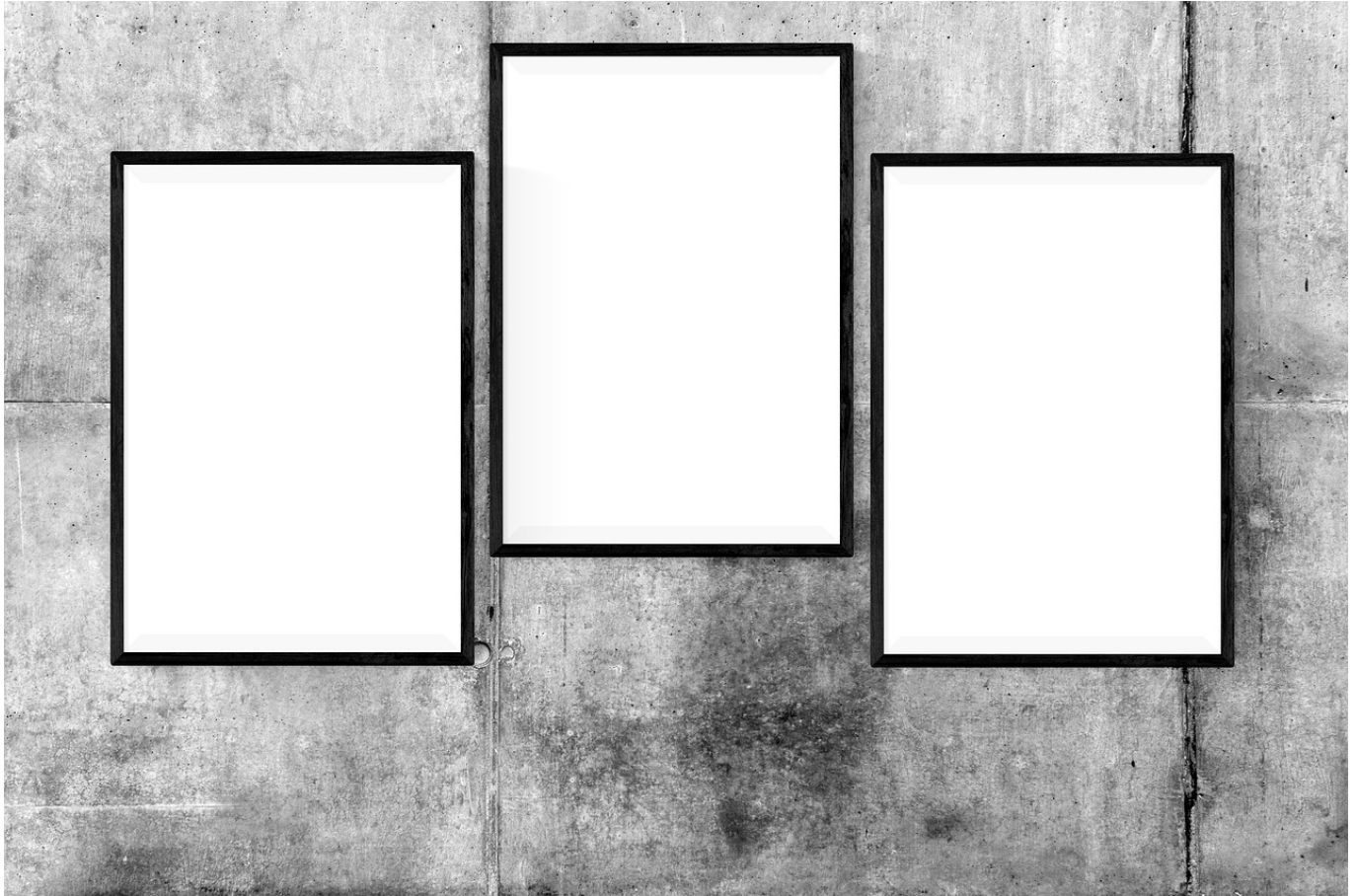
<b>false</b>	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e g false oat. <i><b>False</b> eyelashes.</i>
<b><u>faux</u></b>	Not genuine or real; being an imitation of the genuine article. <i>A rope of <b>faux</b> pearls.</i>
<b>feigned</b>	Simulated or pretended; insincere. <i><b>Feigned</b> sympathy.</i>
<b>forged</b>	Reproduced fraudulently. <i>A <b>forged</b> twenty dollar bill.</i>
<b>fraudulent</b>	Intended to deceive - S.T.Coleridge. <i><b>Fraudulent</b> share dealing.</i>
<b><u>imitation</u></b>	Not genuine or real being an imitation of the genuine article. <i>Decorated with <b>imitation</b> palm leaves.</i>
<b>make-believe</b>	Imagined as in a play.
<b>man-made</b>	Not of natural origin; prepared or made artificially.
<b>manufactured</b>	(of something abstract) made or produced in a merely mechanical way. <i><b>Manufactured</b> consumer goods.</i>
<b>model</b>	Worthy of imitation. <i><b>Model</b> citizens.</i>
<b><u>plastic</u></b>	Made of plastic. <i>Rendering the material more <b>plastic</b>.</i>
<b>pretended</b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Eating ice cream with <b>pretended</b> unconcern.</i>
<b>pseudo</b>	Not genuine but having the appearance of. <i>We are talking about real journalists and not the <b>pseudo</b> kind.</i>
<b><u>sham</u></b>	Bogus; false. <i>A clergyman who arranged a <b>sham</b> marriage.</i>
<b>simulated</b>	Imitating the conditions of something, especially as a training exercise. <i>A <b>simulated</b> leather handbag.</i>
<b>so-called</b>	Doubtful or suspect.
<b>spurious</b>	Intended to deceive. <i>A <b>spurious</b> argument.</i>
<b>synthetic</b>	Involving or of the nature of synthesis (combining separate elements to form a coherent whole) as opposed to analysis. <i><b>Synthetic</b> leather.</i>

Relating to or characteristic of a burlesque.
- burlesque** *A mock heroic farce that **burlesques** the affectations of Restoration heroic drama.*
- catcall** Utter catcalls at.  
*He walked out to jeers and **catcalls**.*
- charade** A word acted out in an episode of the game of charades.  
*Talk of unity was nothing more than a **charade**.*
- deride** Express contempt for; ridicule.  
*The decision was **derided** by environmentalists.*

<b>derision</b>	Contemptuous laughter. <i>My stories were greeted with <b>derision</b> and disbelief.</i>
<b><u>disrepute</u></b>	The state of being held in low esteem. <i>Because of the scandal the school has fallen into <b>disrepute</b>.</i>
<b>flout</b>	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i>The women pointed and <b>flouted</b> at her.</i>
<b>gibe</b>	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i>Some cynics in the media might <b>gibe</b>.</i>
<b>hoot</b>	With reference to a car horn siren etc make or cause to make a hoot. <i>The toughs and blades of the city <b>hoot</b> and bang their drums drink arak play dice and dance.</i>
<b><u>irony</u></b>	A trope that involves incongruity between what is expected and what occurs. <i><b>Irony</b> is wasted on the stupid.</i>
<b>irreverence</b>	An irreverent mental attitude. <i>An attitude of <b>irreverence</b> towards politicians.</i>
<b><u>jeer</u></b>	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>Councillors were <b>jeered</b> and heckled.</i>
<b>lampoon</b>	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The magazine fired at God Royalty and politicians using cartoons and <b>lampoons</b>.</i>
<b><u>mockery</u></b>	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>In her bitterness she felt that all rejoicing was <b>mockery</b>.</i>
<b><u>parody</u></b>	Make a parody of. <i>His provocative use of <b>parody</b>.</i>
<b>persiflage</b>	Light teasing. <i>An air of <b>persiflage</b>.</i>
<b>playfully</b>	In a playful manner. <i>Lily laughed and <b>playfully</b> slapped him across the chest.</i>
<b><u>ridicule</u></b>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>He is held up as an object of <b>ridicule</b>.</i>
<b>sarcasm</b>	Witty language used to convey insults or scorn-Jonathan Swif. <i>She didn't like the note of <b>sarcasm</b> in his voice.</i>
<b><u>satire</u></b>	A play novel film or other work which uses satire. <i>A number of articles on Elizabethan <b>satire</b>.</i>
<b>satirize</b>	Ridicule with satire. <i>The movie <b>satirized</b> the notion of national superiority.</i>

- scoff** An object of ridicule.  
*Patrick professed to **scoff** at soppy love scenes in films.*
- skit** A short theatrical episode.  
*A **skit** on daytime magazine programmes.*
- sneer** A contemptuous or scornful remark.  
*She **sneered** her contempt.*
- spoof** Make a parody of.  
*That meant that the Americans might not be able to jam or **spoof** his systems.*
- taunt** Harass with persistent criticism or carping.  
*Pupils will play truant rather than face the **taunts** of classmates about their ragged clothes.*
- teasing** Arousing sexual desire without intending to satisfy it.  
*Her lazy **teasing** smile.*
- travesty** Make a travesty of.  
*Michael has betrayed the family by **travesty**ing them in his plays.*
