abatement	The act of abating. <i>It was resolved to serve an abatement notice.</i>
<u>adaptation</u>	The process of change by which an organism or species becomes better suited to its environment. <i>A three part adaptation of Hard Times.</i>
adjustment	The process of adapting or becoming used to a new situation. <i>I ve made a few adjustments to my diet.</i>
<u>alteration</u>	The action or process of altering or being altered. <i>Alterations had to be made.</i>
<u>amendment</u>	An article added to the US Constitution. <i>You can add some soil texturizing amendments to improve soil drainage.</i>
change	Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units. <i>Activities related to environmental change.</i>
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The rate of decrease became greater.</i>
improvement	The action of improving or being improved. <i>It s an improvement on the last cake I made.</i>

lessening	A change downward.
limiting	The grammatical relation that exists when a word qualifies the meaning of the phrase.
lowering	The act of causing something to move to a lower level. <i>Society has allowed a lowering of standards.</i>
mitigation	The action of lessening in severity or intensity. <i>The identification and mitigation of pollution.</i>
<u>moderation</u>	A change for the better. <i>He urged the police to show moderation.</i>
qualification	The qualification stage of a sporting event. <i>I left school at 15 with no qualifications.</i>
qualifying	The qualification stage of a sporting event. <i>The day starts with as many as five dozen racers running in the qualifying.</i>
recasting	Changing a particular word or phrase.
<u>reconstruction</u>	The action or process of reconstructing or being reconstructed. <i>The economic reconstruction of Russia.</i>
reduction	The action of remedying a dislocation or fracture by returning the affected part of the body to its normal position. <i>The reduction of classical genetics to molecular biology.</i>
<u>refinement</u>	The improvement or clarification of something by the making of small changes. <i>He described a refinement of this technique.</i>
reorganization	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>After the takeover there was a thorough reorganization.</i>
restriction	The limitation or control of someone or something, or the state of being restricted. <i>The restriction of the infection to a focal area.</i>
revision	A revised edition or form of something. <i>A revision of the Hegelian concept of history.</i>
reworking	An altered or revised version of something. <i>Section 2 2 is a reworking of material prepared some time ago for a UK audience.</i>
softening	The process of becoming softer. <i>He observed the softening of iron by heat.</i>
tempering	A sudden outburst of anger.

variation

(astronomy) any perturbation of the mean motion or orbit of a planet or satellite (especially a perturbation of the earth's moon).
*Regional **variations** in house prices.*

Make an alteration to.
*This dress needs to be **altered**.*

alteration

The act of revising or altering (involving reconsideration and modification).
***Alterations** had to be made.*

change

Change clothes put on different clothes.
*The Virginia creeper was just beginning to **change** from green to gold.*

changed

Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism.
*He s an altered or **changed** man since his election to Congress.*

chromosome

A threadlike strand of DNA in the cell nucleus that carries the genes in a linear order.
*Humans have 22 **chromosome** pairs plus two sex **chromosomes**.*

conversion

A spiritual enlightenment causing a person to lead a new life.
*Keeping things simple will improve **conversion**.*

convert

A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief.
*Smith **converted** and his team won.*

edit	A version of written recorded or filmed material made as a result of editing. <i>The system has no word wrap feature so even small edits involved extensive rekeying.</i>
fluctuation	The quality of being unsteady and subject to changes. <i>Fluctuations in the yearly values could be caused by a variety of factors.</i>
metamorphose	(of an insect or amphibian) undergo metamorphosis, especially into the adult form. <i>In Kafka s story a person metamorphoses into a bug.</i>
modify	Add a modifier to a constituent. <i>Please modify this letter to make it more polite.</i>
mutant	A mutant form. <i>A mutant gene.</i>
mutate	Change in form or nature. <i>Cells mutate.</i>
mutation	A distinct form resulting from genetic mutation. <i>His first novel went through several mutations.</i>
recessive	A recessive trait or gene. <i>This variant was a low status and recessive feature.</i>
remold	Give new treads to (a tire.
revision	Something that has been written again. <i>A revision of the Hegelian concept of history.</i>
rewrite	Rewrite so as to make fit to suit a new or different purpose. <i>The rewrite was much better.</i>
script	Write a script for. <i>Russian script.</i>
splice	Join together so as to form new genetic combinations. <i>The couple got spliced on Hawaii.</i>
transfigure	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>The treatment and diet transfigured her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
transform	Change a mathematical entity by transformation. <i>He transformed into a monster.</i>
transformation	The heritable modification of a cell from its normal state to a malignant state. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>

transition	Cause to convert or undergo a transition. <i>A transition to multiparty democracy.</i>
transmogrify	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<u>transmute</u>	Change in outward structure or looks. <i>The discovery that elements can transmute by radioactivity.</i>
<u>variant</u>	A variable quantity that is random. <i>Letters variant in size.</i>
variation	The act of changing or altering something slightly but noticeably from the norm or standard. <i>He patented a variation on the sandal.</i>
