## Synonyms of "Moist" as an adjective (21 Words)

- clammy** (of air or atmosphere) damp and unpleasant.  
*The **clammy** atmosphere of the cave.*
- damp** Slightly wet.  
*Clothes **damp** with perspiration.*
- dampish** Slightly wet.
- dank** Unpleasantly cool and humid.  
*Huge **dank** caverns.*
- dewy** (of a person's skin) appearing soft and lustrous.  
*The girls have yet to lose their **dewy** charm.*
- dewy-eyed** Exhibiting childlike simplicity and credulity.
- dripping** Very wet.  
***Dripping** wet hair.*
- drizzling** (of rain) falling lightly in very small drops.

<b>drizzly</b>	Wet with light rain. <i>A sad <b>drizzly</b> day.</i>
<b>humid</b>	Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i>A hot and <b>humid</b> day.</i>
<b>misty</b>	Wet with mist. <i>The <b>misty</b> evening.</i>
<b>muggy</b>	(of the weather) unpleasantly warm and humid. <i>It was a hot very <b>muggy</b> evening.</i>
<b>rainy</b>	Wet by periods of rain. <i><b>Rainy</b> days.</i>
<b>soggy</b>	Dull and lifeless. <i>The chorus sings powerfully but the interpretation is ultimately <b>soggy</b>.</i>
<b>steamy</b>	Producing, filled with, or clouded with steam. <i><b>Steamy</b> towels.</i>
<b>sticky</b>	Having the sticky properties of an adhesive. <i>Felt <b>sticky</b> and chilly at the same time.</i>
<b>sweaty</b>	Exuding, soaked in, or inducing sweat. <i>My feet got so hot and <b>sweaty</b>.</i>
<b>tearful</b>	Crying or inclined to cry. <i><b>Tearful</b> eyes.</i>
<b>teary</b>	Full of tears; tearful. <i>There were <b>teary</b> eyes all round.</i>
<b>watery</b>	Overly diluted; thin and insipid. <i>A <b>watery</b> substance.</i>
<b>wet</b>	(of the weather) rainy. <i><b>Wet</b> sidewalks.</i>

- *Exposure to the Atlantic on the west gives rise to a cool, moist climate.*
- *A moist breeze.*
- *Her brother's eyes became moist.*
- *Eyes moist with tears.*
- *The moist, fertile soil.*

<b>absorb</b>	Take up mentally. <i>The work <b>absorbed</b> him and continued to make him happy.</i>
<b>absorbent</b>	A substance that soaks up liquid easily. <i>As <b>absorbent</b> as a sponge.</i>
<b>aqueous</b>	Similar to or containing or dissolved in water. <i>An <b>aqueous</b> solution of potassium permanganate.</i>
<b>awash</b>	Covered or flooded with water, especially seawater or rain. <i>The boat rolled violently her decks <b>awash</b>.</i>
<b>damp</b>	Damp air or atmosphere. <i>The <b>damps</b> of the valley.</i>
<b>dampness</b>	A slight wetness. <i>The <b>dampness</b> in the air.</i>
<b>dank</b>	Unpleasantly damp and cold. <i>Huge <b>dank</b> caverns.</i>
<b>drench</b>	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>The war <b>drenched</b> the country in blood.</i>
<b>drenched</b>	Abundantly covered or supplied with; often used in combination. <i>Moon <b>drenched</b> meadows.</i>
<b>dusty</b>	Covered with, full of, or resembling dust. <i>A hot <b>dusty</b> road.</i>
<b>humid</b>	Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i><b>Humid</b> air.</i>
<b>humidity</b>	A quantity representing the amount of water vapour in the atmosphere or in a gas. <i>The <b>humidity</b> should be supplied by regularly spraying the leaves.</i>
<b>jungle</b>	A situation or place of bewildering complexity or brutal competitiveness. <i>It s a <b>jungle</b> out there.</i>
<b>marshland</b>	Land consisting of marshes. <i><b>Marshland</b> landscapes.</i>
<b>marshy</b>	Soft and watery. <i>A <b>marshy</b> coastline.</i>
<b>moisture</b>	Wetness caused by water. <i>The air was constantly heavy with <b>moisture</b>.</i>
<b>moisturize</b>	Make (something, especially the skin) less dry. <i>Revitalize your face <b>moisturize</b> your skin.</i>

<b>muddy</b>	Cause to become muddy. <i><b>Muddy</b> boots.</i>
<b>rain</b>	Rain falls. <i>He fell under the <b>rain</b> of blows.</i>
<b>saturate</b>	Saturated with moisture. <i>The soil is <b>saturated</b>.</i>
<b>saturated</b>	Denoting fats containing a high proportion of fatty acid molecules without double bonds considered to be less healthy in the diet than unsaturated fats. <i>A <b>saturated</b> barium hydroxide solution.</i>
<b>soak</b>	Washing something by allowing it to soak. <i>I m looking forward to a long <b>soak</b> in the bath.</i>
<b>soaked</b>	Extremely wet; saturated. <i>Rain <b>soaked</b> streets.</i>
<b>sodden</b>	Wet through and through; thoroughly wet. <i>His clothes were <b>sodden</b>.</i>
<b>sop</b>	Wet thoroughly; soak. <i>He used some bread to <b>sop</b> up the sauce.</i>
<b>splashing</b>	The act of splashing a liquid substance on a surface.
<b>sponge</b>	Wipe with a sponge so as to clean or moisten. <i>She repainted the walls white then <b>sponged</b> them in turquoise green and lilac.</i>
<b>tropics</b>	The part of the Earth's surface between the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic of Capricorn; characterized by a hot climate.
<b>vapor</b>	The process of becoming a vapor.
<b>wet</b>	Cause to become wet. <i>A <b>wet</b> windy evening.</i>
