- clammy** (of air or atmosphere) damp and unpleasant.
*The **clammy** atmosphere of the cave.*
- damp** Slightly wet.
*Clothes **damp** with perspiration.*
- dampish** Slightly wet.
- dank** Unpleasantly cool and humid.
*Huge **dank** caverns.*
- dewy** (of a person's skin) appearing soft and lustrous.
*The girls have yet to lose their **dewy** charm.*
- dewy-eyed** Exhibiting childlike simplicity and credulity.
- dripping** Very wet.
***Dripping** wet hair.*
- drizzling** (of rain) falling lightly in very small drops.

drizzly	Wet with light rain. <i>A sad drizzly day.</i>
humid	Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i>A hot and humid day.</i>
misty	Wet with mist. <i>The misty evening.</i>
muggy	(of the weather) unpleasantly warm and humid. <i>It was a hot very muggy evening.</i>
rainy	Wet by periods of rain. <i>Rainy days.</i>
soggy	Dull and lifeless. <i>The chorus sings powerfully but the interpretation is ultimately soggy.</i>
steamy	Producing, filled with, or clouded with steam. <i>Steamy towels.</i>
sticky	Having the sticky properties of an adhesive. <i>Felt sticky and chilly at the same time.</i>
sweaty	Exuding, soaked in, or inducing sweat. <i>My feet got so hot and sweaty.</i>
tearful	Crying or inclined to cry. <i>Tearful eyes.</i>
teary	Full of tears; tearful. <i>There were teary eyes all round.</i>
watery	Overly diluted; thin and insipid. <i>A watery substance.</i>
wet	(of the weather) rainy. <i>Wet sidewalks.</i>



Usage Examples of "Moist" as an adjective

- *Exposure to the Atlantic on the west gives rise to a cool, moist climate.*
- *A moist breeze.*
- *Her brother's eyes became moist.*
- *Eyes moist with tears.*
- *The moist, fertile soil.*

absorb	Take up mentally. <i>The work absorbed him and continued to make him happy.</i>
absorbent	A substance that soaks up liquid easily. <i>As absorbent as a sponge.</i>
aqueous	Similar to or containing or dissolved in water. <i>An aqueous solution of potassium permanganate.</i>
awash	Covered or flooded with water, especially seawater or rain. <i>The boat rolled violently her decks awash.</i>
damp	Damp air or atmosphere. <i>The damps of the valley.</i>
dampness	A slight wetness. <i>The dampness in the air.</i>
dank	Unpleasantly damp and cold. <i>Huge dank caverns.</i>
drench	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>The war drenched the country in blood.</i>
drenched	Abundantly covered or supplied with; often used in combination. <i>Moon drenched meadows.</i>
dusty	Covered with, full of, or resembling dust. <i>A hot dusty road.</i>
humid	Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i>Humid air.</i>
humidity	A quantity representing the amount of water vapour in the atmosphere or in a gas. <i>The humidity should be supplied by regularly spraying the leaves.</i>
jungle	A situation or place of bewildering complexity or brutal competitiveness. <i>It s a jungle out there.</i>
marshland	Land consisting of marshes. <i>Marshland landscapes.</i>
marshy	Soft and watery. <i>A marshy coastline.</i>
moisture	Wetness caused by water. <i>The air was constantly heavy with moisture.</i>
moisturize	Make (something, especially the skin) less dry. <i>Revitalize your face moisturize your skin.</i>

muddy	Cause to become muddy. <i>Muddy boots.</i>
rain	Rain falls. <i>He fell under the rain of blows.</i>
<u>saturate</u>	Saturated with moisture. <i>The soil is saturated.</i>
<u>saturated</u>	Denoting fats containing a high proportion of fatty acid molecules without double bonds considered to be less healthy in the diet than unsaturated fats. <i>A saturated barium hydroxide solution.</i>
<u>soak</u>	Washing something by allowing it to soak. <i>I m looking forward to a long soak in the bath.</i>
<u>soaked</u>	Extremely wet; saturated. <i>Rain soaked streets.</i>
sodden	Wet through and through; thoroughly wet. <i>His clothes were sodden.</i>
sop	Wet thoroughly; soak. <i>He used some bread to sop up the sauce.</i>
splashing	The act of splashing a liquid substance on a surface.
sponge	Wipe with a sponge so as to clean or moisten. <i>She repainted the walls white then sponged them in turquoise green and lilac.</i>
tropics	The part of the Earth's surface between the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic of Capricorn; characterized by a hot climate.
vapor	The process of becoming a vapor.
<u>wet</u>	Cause to become wet. <i>A wet windy evening.</i>
