Definitions of "Moniker" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “moniker” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A name.*
- *A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person’s given name).*

Synonyms of "Moniker" as a noun (9 Words)

byname	A nickname, especially one given to distinguish a person from others with the same given name. <i>Surnames started off as bynames to distinguish two persons in the same locality.</i>
cognomen	A name or nickname.
denomination	The rank of a playing card within a suit, or of a suit relative to others. <i>High denomination banknotes.</i>
honorific	A title or word implying or expressing respect. <i>The Japanese use many honorifics.</i>

label	A radioactive isotope that is used in a compound in order to trace the mechanism of a chemical reaction. <i>Independent labels.</i>
<u>nickname</u>	A familiar or humorous name given to a person or thing instead of or as well as the real name. <i>Joe's mother would not use his nickname and always called him Joseph.</i>
sobriquet	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the sobriquet Duchesse.</i>
soubriquet	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name).
<u>title</u>	A descriptive or distinctive name that is earned or chosen. <i>His title to fame.</i>

Usage Examples of "Moniker" as a noun

- *His real moniker is Dave Kennedy.*

Associations of "Moniker" (30 Words)

<u>adopt</u>	Choose (someone) as a candidate for office. <i>This approach has been adopted by many big banks.</i>
<u>affectionate</u>	Readily feeling or showing fondness or tenderness. <i>An affectionate kiss.</i>
<u>alias</u>	Misidentify (a signal frequency), introducing distortion or error. <i>Mr Smith alias Mr Lafayette.</i>
alphabetically	In alphabetical order. <i>Books are now arranged alphabetically by author.</i>
black	Make or become black. <i>Man has written one of his blackest records as a destroyer on the oceanic islands.</i>
call	Lure by imitating the characteristic call of an animal. <i>I think teachers really good teachers are called to teach.</i>
<u>code</u>	Convert ordinary language into code. <i>Each box had a label with the code SC 90.</i>

cognomen	The name used to identify the members of a family (as distinguished from each member's given name.
descendants	All of the offspring of a given progenitor.
<u>designate</u>	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>The Wye Valley is designated an area of outstanding natural beauty.</i>
dub	The new sounds added by dubbing. <i>The media dubbed anorexia the slimming disease.</i>
edition	The form in which a text (especially a printed book) is published. <i>The first edition appeared in 1920.</i>
<u>epithet</u>	An epithet used as a term of abuse. <i>People jeered and hurled racial epithets.</i>
father	Appear as or admit that one is the father or originator of. <i>Keep the faith of our forefathers.</i>
given	Acknowledged as a supposition. <i>At a couture house attentive service is a given.</i>
incognito	Without revealing one's identity. <i>She is locked in her incognito.</i>
<u>name</u>	Identify correctly by name. <i>They named their son David.</i>
<u>nickname</u>	Give a nickname to. <i>Mallender's fair complexion gave rise to his nickname Ghost.</i>
nominate	Put forward nominate for appointment to an office or for an honor or position. <i>The nominate race and two subspecies occur.</i>
officially	In public and for official purposes but not necessarily so in reality. <i>There is a possibility he was murdered officially he died in a car smash.</i>
ordained	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>An ordained priest.</i>
patronymic	Of or derived from a personal or family name. <i>The patronymic naming of children.</i>
<u>pseudonym</u>	A fictitious name used when the person performs a particular social role. <i>I wrote under the pseudonym of Evelyn Hervey.</i>
<u>sir</u>	Term of address for a man. <i>Excuse me sir.</i>

sobriquet	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name. <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the sobriquet Duchesse.</i>
stature	Importance or reputation gained by ability or achievement. <i>An architect of international stature.</i>
surname	Give a surname to. <i>He changed his surname from Kaye to Kasmin.</i>
title	Give a title to. <i>A grocery family had title to the property.</i>
version	Create a new version of. <i>His version of the fight was different from mine.</i>
