- *Formed of a single large block of stone.*
- *(of an organization or system) large, powerful, indivisible, and slow to change.*
- *(of a building) very large and characterless.*
- *(of a solid-state circuit) composed of active and passive components formed in a single chip.*
- *Characterized by massiveness and rigidity and total uniformity.*
- *Imposing in size or bulk or solidity.*

huge	Extremely popular or successful. <i>While he may be unknown in the American mainstream he s huge in Britain.</i>
immense	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i>At vast or immense expense.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	Not able to be moved. <i>The immovable hills.</i>
impenetrable	Impossible to understand. <i>Impenetrable jargon.</i>
inflexible	Unwilling to change or compromise. <i>Once she had made up her mind she was inflexible.</i>
intractable	(of a person) difficult or stubborn. <i>Intractable economic problems.</i>
mammoth	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A mammoth ship.</i>
massive	Exceptionally large. <i>Massive oak doors.</i>
monumental	Of outstanding significance. <i>A monumental scale.</i>
rigid	Fixed and unmoving- Connor Cruise O'Brien. <i>Rigid bureaucratic controls.</i>
unbending	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>An unbending will to dominate.</i>
<u>unchanging</u>	Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i>
vast	Of very great extent or quantity; immense. <i>The vast accumulation of knowledge which we call civilization.</i>

craggy	(of a landscape) having many crags. <i>A craggy coastline.</i>
effigy	A roughly made model of a person that is made in order to be damaged or destroyed as a protest. <i>Angry campaigners plan to burn an effigy of the social security minister.</i>
engrave	Carve, cut, or etch into a material or surface. <i>The event engraved itself into her memory.</i>
gargantuan	Enormous. <i>A gargantuan appetite.</i>
gargoyle	A grotesque carved human or animal face or figure projecting from the gutter of a building, typically acting as a spout to carry water clear of a wall.
gigantic	Of very great size or extent; huge or enormous. <i>Gigantic disappointment.</i>
huge	Of great importance or seriousness. <i>While he may be unknown in the American mainstream he s huge in Britain.</i>
immense	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>The Los Angeles aqueduct winds like an immense snake along the base of the mountains.</i>
inscription	A short message (as in a book or musical work or on a photograph) dedicating it to someone or something. <i>The inscription of memorable utterances on durable materials.</i>
kernel	A single whole grain of a cereal. <i>Pine kernels.</i>
large	A garment size for a large person. <i>Taking the large view.</i>
leviathan	Monstrous sea creature symbolizing evil in the Old Testament. <i>The great leviathans of the deep.</i>
lump	A large piece of something without definite shape. <i>Hong Kong and Bangkok tend to be lumped together in holiday brochures.</i>
massive	Being the same substance throughout. <i>Massive changes.</i>
memorial	A record or memoir. <i>The Council sent a strongly worded memorial to the Chancellor of the Exchequer.</i>
monolith	A large block of concrete sunk in water, e.g. in the building of a dock. <i>Independent voices have been crowded out by the media monoliths.</i>

<u>monument</u>	An enduring and memorable example of something. <i>A simple stone monument marked the nearby crash site.</i>
monumental	Great in importance, extent, or size. <i>Einstein s monumental contributions to physics.</i>
mountainous	(of a region) having many mountains. <i>Struggling under mountainous debts.</i>
<u>museum</u>	A depository for collecting and displaying objects having scientific or historical or artistic value. <i>A museum curator.</i>
rock	A large piece of rock which has become detached from a cliff or mountain a boulder. <i>Rock the cradle.</i>
<u>sculpture</u>	Form or shape as if by sculpture especially with strong smooth curves. <i>A collection of sculpture.</i>
statuary	Of or relating to or suitable for statues. <i>Classical statuary.</i>
<u>statue</u>	A carved or cast figure of a person or animal, especially one that is life-size or larger.
<u>stone</u>	Kill by throwing stones at. <i>Stone stretch trousers.</i>
