
Monolithic as an Adjective

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "monolithic" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Formed of a single large block of stone.
- (of an organization or system) large, powerful, indivisible, and slow to change.
- (of a building) very large and characterless.
- (of a solid-state circuit) composed of active and passive components formed in a single chip.
- Characterized by massiveness and rigidity and total uniformity.
- Imposing in size or bulk or solidity.
