**ask for** Require or ask for as a price or condition.

**ask for money** Direct or put; seek an answer to.

**beg**Acquire food or money from someone by begging.

I must **beg** of you not to act impulsively.

**borrow** in one's own language or work.

cadge Ask for and get free; be a parasite.

He **cadge**d fivers off old school friends.

**grub** Ask for and get free; be a parasite.

**loiter** Stand or wait around without apparent purpose.

**potter**Do random, unplanned work or activities or spend time idly.

skulk Move stealthily or furtively.

He spent most of his time **skulk**ing about the corridors.

Wipe or clean with a wet sponge or cloth.

**sponge** She repainted the walls white then **sponge**d them in turquoise green and

lilac.
