<b>introduce</b>	Introduce. <i>A longer more lyrical opening which <b>introduces</b> a courting song.</i>
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>His name was <b>mentioned</b> in connection with the invention.</i>
<b>present</b>	Represent abstractly for example in a painting drawing or sculpture. <i>We <b>presented</b> the arguments to him.</i>
<b>propose</b>	Propose or intend. <i>She <b>proposed</b> a new theory of relativity.</i>
<b>propound</b>	Put forward (an idea or theory) for consideration by others. <i>He began to <b>propound</b> the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
<b>put forward</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language.
<b>raise</b>	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. <i>God <b>raised</b> Jesus from the dead.</i>
<b>submit</b>	Accept as inevitable. <i>He <b>submitted</b> himself to a body search.</i>
<b>suggest</b>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>The evidence <b>suggests</b> a need for more clarification.</i>
<b>turn over</b>	To break and turn over earth especially with a plow.
<b>ventilate</b>	Kill (someone) by shooting. <i><b>Ventilate</b> the greenhouse well.</i>

## Moot as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Moot" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "moot" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Of no legal significance (as having been previously decided).*
- *Subject to debate, dispute, or uncertainty.*
- *Open to argument or debate.*
- *Having little or no practical relevance, typically because the subject is too uncertain to*

allow a decision.

## Synonyms of "Moot" as an adjective (23 Words)

<b>arguable</b>	Open to disagreement; not obviously correct. <i>A highly <b>arguable</b> assumption.</i>
<b><u>contentious</u></b>	Causing or likely to cause an argument; controversial. <i>The socio economic plan had been the subject of <b>contentious</b> debate.</i>
<b>contestable</b>	Capable of being contested.
<b><u>controversial</u></b>	Marked by or capable of arousing controversy. <i>Years of wrangling over a <b>controversial</b> bypass.</i>
<b><u>debatable</u></b>	Open to doubt or debate. <i>It is <b>debatable</b> whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
<b>disputable</b>	Not established as a fact, and so open to question or debate. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be <b>disputable</b>.</i>
<b>disputed</b>	Subject to disagreement and debate.
<b>doubtful</b>	Feeling uncertain about something. <i>The candidate s <b>doubtful</b> past.</i>
<b>open</b>	Open and observable not secret or hidden. <i>An <b>open</b> and trusting nature.</i>
<b>open to debate</b>	Open to or in view of all.
<b>open to discussion</b>	Not sealed or having been unsealed.
<b>open to doubt</b>	Possibly accepting or permitting.
<b>open to question</b>	Open to or in view of all.
<b>problematic</b>	Making great mental demands; hard to comprehend or solve or believe. <i>A <b>problematic</b> situation at home.</i>
<b>problematical</b>	Open to doubt or debate. <i>A highly <b>problematical</b> relationship.</i>
<b><u>questionable</u></b>	Subject to question. <i>A fire of <b>questionable</b> origin.</i>
<b>unconcluded</b>	Not yet brought to a conclusion. <i><b>Unconcluded</b> agreements.</i>
<b><u>undecided</u></b>	Not yet having made a commitment. <i>The match was still <b>undecided</b>.</i>
<b>undetermined</b>	Not authoritatively decided or settled. <i>Of <b>undetermined</b> species.</i>

<b>unresolved</b>	Characterized by musical dissonance harmonically unresolved. <i>A number of issues remain <b>unresolved</b>.</i>
<b>unsettled</b>	Not yet settled. <i>An <b>unsettled</b> issue.</i>
<b>up in the air</b>	Open.
<b>vexed</b>	Causing difficulty in finding an answer or solution; much disputed. <i>The <b>vexed</b> parents of an unruly teenager.</i>

- *Whether they had been successful or not was a moot point.*
- *That is a moot question.*
- *The whole matter is becoming increasingly moot.*
- *It is a moot point whether such a controversial scheme would have succeeded.*

<b>ancient</b>	A person who lived in ancient times. <i><b>Ancient</b> Greece.</i>
<b>antediluvian</b>	A very old person. <i>Gigantic bones of <b>antediluvian</b> animals.</i>
<b>antiquated</b>	So extremely old as seeming to belong to an earlier period. <i>This <b>antiquated</b> central heating system.</i>
<b>antique</b>	Shop for antiques. <i>Sanding will change the lustre of the sanded spot especially if the finish has been <b>antiqued</b>.</i>

<b>century</b>	A period of a hundred years reckoned from the traditional date of the birth of Christ. <i>A <b>century</b> ago most people walked to work.</i>
<b>dilapidated</b>	In deplorable condition. <i>The tank was now rather <b>dilapidated</b>.</i>
<b>disputable</b>	Open to argument or debate. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be <b>disputable</b>.</i>
<b>elder</b>	Used to distinguish between related famous people with the same name. <i>Schoolchildren were no less fascinated than their <b>elders</b>.</i>
<b>elderly</b>	Advanced in years; (‘aged’ is pronounced as two syllables). <i>A couple of <b>elderly</b> cars.</i>
<b>historical</b>	Used of the study of a phenomenon (especially language) as it changes through time. <i>Doubt that a <b>historical</b> Camelot every existed.</i>
<b>irrelevant</b>	Not connected with or relevant to something. <i><b>Irrelevant</b> allegations.</i>
<b>negligent</b>	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern. <i><b>Negligent</b> parents.</i>
<b>obsolescent</b>	Becoming obsolete. <i><b>Obsolescent</b> equipment.</i>
<b>obsolete</b>	Cause a product or idea to become obsolete by replacing it with something new. <i>The phrase was <b>obsolete</b> after 1625.</i>
<b>old</b>	Used informally especially for emphasis old adj of a very early stage in development. <i>The <b>older</b> soldiers.</i>
<b>ossified</b>	Having become rigid or fixed in attitude or position. <i><b>Ossified</b> business practices.</i>
<b>outdated</b>	Out of date; obsolete. <i><b>Outdated</b> equipment.</i>
<b>paleolithic</b>	Second part of the Stone Age beginning about 750,00 to 500,000 years BC and lasting until the end of the last ice age about 8,500 years BC. <i><b>Paleolithic</b> artifacts.</i>
<b>paleontology</b>	The earth science that studies fossil organisms and related remains.
<b>prehistoric</b>	No longer fashionable. <i><b>Prehistoric</b> peoples.</i>

<b>prehistory</b>	The events or conditions leading up to a particular occurrence or phenomenon. <i>The <b>prehistory</b> of capitalism.</i>
<b>stodgy</b>	(of food) heavy, filling, and high in carbohydrates. <i>A <b>stodgy</b> dinner party.</i>
<b>stuffy</b>	(of a person) not receptive to new or unusual ideas; conventional and narrow-minded. <i>A <b>stuffy</b> overcrowded office.</i>
<b>superannuated</b>	Outdated or obsolete through age or new developments. <i>A <b>superannuated</b> hippy.</i>
<b>traditional</b>	Consisting of or derived from tradition. <i>The simple security of <b>traditional</b> assumptions has vanished.</i>
<b><u>useless</u></b>	Having no ability or skill in a specified activity or area. <i>We tried to pacify him but it was <b>useless</b>.</i>
