## **Morale as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Morale" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “morale” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The confidence, enthusiasm, and discipline of a person or group at a particular time.*
- *A state of individual psychological well-being based upon a sense of confidence and usefulness and purpose.*
- *The spirit of a group that makes the members want the group to succeed.*



## Synonyms of "Morale" as a noun (5 Words)

- confidence** A secret that is confided or entrusted to another.  
*The priest could not reveal her **confidences**.*
- esprit de corps** Liveliness of mind or spirit.
- self-confidence** Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities.
- self-esteem** A feeling of pride in yourself.
- team spirit** Two or more draft animals that work together to pull something.



## Usage Examples of "Morale" as a noun

- *The team's morale was high.*



## Associations of "Morale" (30 Words)

- absenteeism** The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason.  
*High levels of **absenteeism** caused by low job motivation.*
- ambition** Have as one's ambition.  
*Her **ambition** was to become a pilot.*
- aspiration** A cherished desire.  
*Bathing solutions were changed by careful **aspiration**.*
- attendance** The act of being present (at a meeting or event etc).  
*She is being blamed for the museum's low **attendances**.*
- baggy** (of clothing) loose and hanging in folds.  
***Baggy** trousers.*

<b>bid</b>	Make a statement during the auction undertaking to make a certain number of tricks with a stated suit as trumps if the bid is successful and one becomes the declarer. <i>At the fur tables several buyers make <b>bids</b> for the pelts.</i>
<b><u>bidding</u></b>	The prices offered during the course of bidding for something. <i>Other companies in the <b>bidding</b> include General Electric.</i>
<b>bolster</b>	Prop up with a pillow or bolster. <i>The fall in interest rates is starting to <b>bolster</b> confidence.</i>
<b>command</b>	The power or authority to command. <i>A gruff voice <b>commanded</b> us to enter.</i>
<b>conceit</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He could always come up with some inspired off the wall <b>conceit</b>.</i>
<b><u>contingent</u></b>	Being determined by conditions or circumstances that follow. <i>That men are living creatures is a <b>contingent</b> fact.</i>
<b>deployment</b>	The movement of troops or equipment to a place or position for military action. <i>The authorities announced <b>deployment</b> of extra security forces in towns and cities to prevent violence.</i>
<b>desire</b>	Something that is desired. <i>There had been a time years ago when he had <b>desired</b> her.</i>
<b>droop</b>	Droop sink or settle from or as if from pressure or loss of tautness. <i>A long black cloak <b>drooped</b> from his shoulders.</i>
<b>egotism</b>	The fact of being excessively conceited or absorbed in oneself. <i>In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.</i>
<b>esprit</b>	The quality of being lively, vivacious, or witty.
<b>exhortation</b>	A communication intended to urge or persuade the recipients to take some action. <i>No amount of <b>exhortation</b> had any effect.</i>
<b><u>flag</u></b>	Flagpole used to mark the position of the hole on a golf green. <i>The disease was <b>flagged</b> up as a priority area for research.</i>
<b>greed</b>	Reprehensible acquisitiveness; insatiable desire for wealth (personified as one of the deadly sins). <i>Mercenaries who had allowed <b>greed</b> to overtake their principles.</i>
<b><u>hubris</u></b>	(in Greek tragedy) excessive pride towards or defiance of the gods, leading to nemesis. <i>The self assured <b>hubris</b> among economists was shaken in the late 1980s.</i>
<b>improve</b>	Develop or increase in mental capacity by education or experience. <i>I subscribed to two magazines to <b>improve</b> my mind.</i>

<b>increment</b>	A regular increase in salary on an incremental scale. <i>All sizes from 4 30 mm in 1 mm <b>increments</b>.</i>
<b><u>loose</u></b>	Become loose or looser or less tight. <i><b>Loose</b> bowels.</i>
<b><u>pride</u></b>	The best state of something; the prime. <i>He swallowed his <b>pride</b> and asked for help.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>Balls standing <b>proud</b> of the fabric.</i>
<b><u>reinforcement</u></b>	Information that makes more forcible or convincing. <i>Glass fibre <b>reinforcement</b>.</i>
<b>sag</b>	Cause to sag. <i>Exports are forging ahead while home sales <b>sag</b>.</i>
<b><u>sloppy</u></b>	Wet or smeared with a spilled liquid or moist material. <i>She wore a <b>sloppy</b> sweater and jeans.</i>
<b><u>squad</u></b>	A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>The vice <b>squad</b>.</i>
<b>troop</b>	A cavalry unit corresponding to an infantry company. <i>The girls <b>trooped</b> in for dinner.</i>
