Synonyms of "Moreover" as an adverb (10 Words)

additionally	Used to introduce a new fact or argument. <i>Brokers finance themselves additionally by short term borrowing.</i>
also	In addition; too. <i>A brilliant linguist he was also interested in botany.</i>
as well	To the same degree (often followed by `as.
besides	Making an additional point; anyway. <i>I don t want to go to a restaurant besides we can t afford it.</i>
furthermore	In addition. <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
in addition	To or toward the inside of.

more	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>For them enthusiasm is more important than talent.</i>
over and above that	Over the entire area.
too	To a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively. <i>She is a grown woman and a strong one too.</i>
what's more	Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent.

Usage Examples of "Moreover" as an adverb

- *The cellar was dark; moreover, mice nested there.*
- *Moreover, statistics show that competition for places is growing.*

also	In addition; too. <i>Also a car is very expensive to run.</i>
another	Any of various alternatives; some other. <i>Put it off to another or some other day.</i>
anyhow	Used to indicate that a statement explains or supports a previous statement. <i>Two suitcases flung anyhow.</i>
anyway	In any way whatsoever. <i>Anyway there is another factor to consider.</i>

etcetera	Continuing in the same way. <i>His report was full of etceteras.</i>

except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>
exclude	Lack or fail to include. <i>The unruly student was excluded from the game.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Need extra help.</i>
<u>far</u>	Remote in time. <i>A far trek.</i>
forth	From a particular thing or place or position forth is obsolete. <i>From that time forth.</i>
<u>further</u>	In addition or furthermore. <i>They are further along in their research than we expected.</i>
<u>furthermore</u>	In addition. <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
<u>increasingly</u>	Advancing in amount or intensity. <i>She became increasingly depressed.</i>
instead	On the contrary. <i>He didn't call rather or instead he wrote her a letter.</i>
<u>likewise</u>	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>I stuck out my tongue and Frankie did likewise.</i>
<u>maybe</u>	By chance. <i>Maybe I won't go back.</i>
more	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>More than a gallon.</i>
<u>over</u>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>The affair is over ended finished.</i>
<u>probably</u>	Easy to believe on the basis of available evidence. <i>He is probably out of the country.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They're not really my aunt and uncle.</i>
similarly	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>He was similarly affected.</i>
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.

too

To a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively.

*She is a grown woman and a strong one **too**.*

undue

Not appropriate or proper (or even legal) in the circumstances.

*I didn't want to show **undue** excitement.*

whatever

At all; of any kind (used for emphasis).

*Give me **whatever** peaches you don't want.*

wherever

In or to whatever place (emphasizing a lack of restriction).

*Meet me **wherever** you like.*
