| <b>break of day</b>     | The act of breaking something.  |
| <b>break of the day</b> | Breaking of hard tissue such as bone.   |

| <b>sunup</b>          | The time in the morning when the sun appears or full daylight arrives.<br><i>They worked from <b>sunup</b> to sundown.</i>  |

| <b>february</b>  | The month following January and preceding March.   |
| <b>friday</b>    | The sixth day of the week; the fifth working day.  |
| <b>hour</b>      | A time of day specified as an exact number of hours from midnight or midday.<br><i>The job will take more than an <b>hour</b>.</i> |
| <b>january</b>   | The first month of the year; begins 10 days after the winter solstice.   |
| <b>lunchtime</b> | The time in the middle of the day when lunch is eaten.<br><i>The <b>lunchtime</b> television news.</i>                             |
| <b>midday</b>    | The middle of the day; noon.<br><i>He awoke at <b>midday</b>.</i>  |
| <b>midnight</b>  | Twelve o'clock at night.<br><i>The <b>midnight</b> hours.</i>  |

| <b>saturday</b>  | The seventh and last day of the week; observed as the Sabbath by Jews and some Christians.   |
| <b>sunday</b>    | United States evangelist (1862-1935).  |
| <b>sunny</b>     | (of a place) receiving much sunlight.<br><i>Seefeld is set high on a <b>sunny</b> plateau.</i>                                     |
| <b>sunrise</b>   | Atmospheric phenomena accompanying the daily appearance of the sun.<br><i>High technology <b>sunrise</b> industries.</i>           |
| <b>thursday</b>  | The fifth day of the week; the fourth working day.   |
| <b>tonight</b>   | During the night of the present day.<br><i>Drop by <b>tonight</b>.</i>   |
| <b>tuesday</b>   | The third day of the week; the second working day.   |
| <b>wake</b>      | Be awake be alert be there.<br><i>His workers absented themselves for the local <b>wakes</b>.</i>                                  |
