## Mortality as a Noun

### Definitions of "Mortality" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “mortality” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The number of deaths in a given area or period, or from a particular cause.*
- *The quality or state of being mortal.*
- *The ratio of deaths in an area to the population of that area; expressed per 1000 per year.*
- *The state of being subject to death.*
- *Death, especially on a large scale.*



## Synonyms of "Mortality" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>death</b>	The personification of death. <i>The animal died a painful <b>death</b>.</i>
<b>death rate</b>	The permanent end of all life functions in an organism or part of an organism.
<b>deathrate</b>	The ratio of deaths in an area to the population of that area; expressed per 1000 per year.
<b>dying</b>	The time when something ends. <i>A <b>dying</b> of old hopes.</i>
<b>ephemerality</b>	The property of lasting for a very short time.
<b>fatality rate</b>	The quality of being able to cause death or fatal disasters.
<b>impermanence</b>	The property of not existing for indefinitely long durations. <i>She describes the <b>impermanence</b> of human existence.</i>
<b>impermanency</b>	The property of not existing for indefinitely long durations.

<b>loss of life</b>	The act of losing someone or something.
<b>mortality rate</b>	The ratio of deaths in an area to the population of that area; expressed per 1000 per year.
<b>perishability</b>	Food that will decay rapidly if not refrigerated.
<b>temporality</b>	A secular possession, especially the properties and revenues of a religious body or a member of the clergy. <i>Like spatial position <b>temporality</b> is an intrinsic property of the object.</i>
<b>transience</b>	The state or fact of lasting only for a short time; transitoriness. <i>The <b>transience</b> of life and happiness.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Mortality" as a noun

- *Post-operative mortality was 90 per cent for some operations.*
- *The causes of mortality among infants and young children.*
- *The work is increasingly haunted by thoughts of mortality.*



## Associations of "Mortality" (30 Words)

<b>avoid</b>	Prevent from happening. <i><b>Avoid</b> excessive exposure to the sun.</i>
<b><u>brevity</u></b>	The use of brief expressions. <i>The <b>brevity</b> of human life.</i>
<b>casualty</b>	A decrease of military personnel or equipment. <i>He went to <b>casualty</b> to have a cut stitched.</i>
<b>conciseness</b>	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
<b>death</b>	The personification of death. <i>The animal died a painful <b>death</b>.</i>

<b><u>decease</u></b>	The event of dying or departure from life. <i>He held the post until his untimely <b>decease</b> in 1991.</i>
<b>deceased</b>	The recently dead person in question. <i>The <b>deceased</b> man's family.</i>
<b><u>demise</u></b>	Transmit (a sovereign's title) by death or abdication. <i>Mr Grisenthwaite's tragic <b>demise</b>.</i>
<b>die</b>	Cut or shape with a die. <i>The fire had <b>died</b> and the room was cold.</i>
<b>euthanasia</b>	The act of killing someone painlessly (especially someone suffering from an incurable illness).
<b>expiry</b>	The end of a fixed period of time. <i>The <b>expiry</b> of the six month period.</i>
<b>finis</b>	The concluding part of any performance. <i>The market was up at the <b>finish</b>.</i>
<b><u>infant</u></b>	Denoting something in an early stage of its development. <i>Their first year at <b>infant</b> school.</i>
<b>intestacy</b>	The situation of being or dying without a legally valid will.
<b>intestate</b>	Having made no legally valid will before death or not disposed of by a legal will. <i>He died <b>intestate</b>.</i>
<b>mortuary</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of death. <i><b>Mortuary</b> rituals.</i>
<b>neonatal</b>	Relating to or affecting the infant during the first month after birth. <i>Special attention is given to mortality in the <b>neonatal</b> period.</i>
<b>perish</b>	(of rubber, food, etc.) lose its normal qualities; rot or decay. <i>An abandoned tyre whose rubber had <b>perished</b>.</i>
<b>pithiness</b>	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
<b>quietus</b>	Something that has a calming or soothing effect.
<b>remembrance</b>	The ability to recall past occurrences. <i>A flash of <b>remembrance</b> passed between them.</i>
<b>rip</b>	The act of rending or ripping or splitting something. <i>The skirt of her frock <b>ripped</b>.</i>
<b>sepulchral</b>	Relating to a tomb or interment. <i>Hollow <b>sepulchral</b> tones.</i>
<b>stillborn</b>	Showing no signs of life at birth; not liveborn. <i>One of the twins was <b>stillborn</b>.</i>



<b>succinctness</b>	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
<b>temporary</b>	A worker especially in an office hired on a temporary basis. A <b>temporary</b> job.
<b>testator</b>	A person who makes a will.
<b>transience</b>	An impermanence that suggests the inevitability of ending or dying. The <b>transience</b> of life and happiness.
<b><u>transient</u></b>	Lasting a very short time. <b>Transient</b> laborers.
<b>widowed</b>	Single because of death of the spouse. Her <b>widowed</b> mother.
