Definitions of "Mosaic" as a noun

- *Transducer formed by the light-sensitive surface on a television camera tube.*
- *An arrangement of photosensitive elements in a television camera.*
- *A virus disease that results in leaf variegation in tobacco, maize, sugar cane, and other plants.*
- *An individual (especially an animal) composed of cells of two genetically different types.*
- *A freeware browser.*
- *A combination of diverse elements forming a more or less coherent whole.*
- *Arrangement of aerial photographs forming a composite picture.*
- *A pattern resembling a mosaic.*
- *Art consisting of a design made of small pieces of colored stone or glass.*
- *A colourful and variegated pattern.*
- *A picture or pattern produced by arranging together small pieces of stone, tile, glass, etc.*

- *Viral disease in solanaceous plants (tomatoes, potatoes, tobacco) resulting in mottling and often shriveling of the leaves.*

aerial mosaic	Arrangement of aerial photographs forming a composite picture.
assortment	A miscellaneous collection of things or people. <i>A great assortment of cars was on display.</i>
blend	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>Nearly all Scotch whiskies are blends.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>Withdrawal of the Sunday collections.</i>
<u>composite</u>	A composite constructional material. <i>The next decade may well see the introduction of more designer polymers and composites.</i>
<u>compound</u>	A thing that is composed of two or more separate elements; a mixture. <i>The air smelled like a compound of diesel and petrol fumes.</i>

<u>conglomeration</u>	A number of different things, parts or items that are grouped together; collection. <i>A loose conglomeration of pieces.</i>
farrago	A motley assortment of things. <i>A farrago of fact and myth about Abraham Lincoln.</i>
hash	A mixture of jumbled incongruous things; a mess. <i>A hash of raw tomatoes chillies and coriander.</i>
<u>hodgepodge</u>	A motley assortment of things. <i>Rob s living room was a hodgepodge of modern furniture and antiques.</i>
hotchpotch	A confused mixture. <i>A hotchpotch of uncoordinated services.</i>
jumble	Articles collected for a jumble sale. <i>We are collecting jumble for charity.</i>
medley	A musical composition consisting of a series of songs or other musical pieces from various sources. <i>The junior 4×50 m medley relay.</i>
melange	A motley assortment of things. <i>A melange of tender vegetables and herbs.</i>
miscellany	A group or collection of different items; a mixture. <i>A miscellany of houses.</i>
mishmash	A motley assortment of things. <i>A mishmash of outmoded ideas.</i>
mix	A version of a recording in which the component tracks are mixed in a different way from the original. <i>A group of young women groove in a circle to a DJ mix of Missy Elliot the Young Gunz and Kelis.</i>
<u>mixture</u>	An event that combines things in a mixture. <i>A gradual mixture of cultures.</i>
motley collection	A garment made of motley (especially a court jester's costume).
patchwork	A quilt made by sewing patches of different materials together. <i>A patchwork of stone walls and green fields.</i>
photomosaic	Arrangement of aerial photographs forming a composite picture.
pot-pourri	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things.
ragbag	A bag in which scraps of fabric and old clothes are kept for use. <i>A ragbag of reforms is now being discussed.</i>

art	The products of human creativity works of art collectively. <i>His collection of modern art.</i>
blotch	Cover with blotches. <i>Her face was blotched and swollen with crying.</i>
coloring	The act or process of changing the color of something.
dappled	Marked with spots or rounded patches. <i>The horse s dappled flank.</i>
decorated	Provided with something intended to increase its beauty or distinction.
dotted	Marked with or in the form of dots. <i>A dotted background.</i>
fleck	Mark or dot with small patches of colour or particles of something. <i>A fleck of red.</i>

fresco	The method of painting frescoes used in Roman times and by the great masters of the Italian Renaissance including Giotto Raphael and Michelangelo. <i>Four scenes had been frescoed on the wall.</i>
kiln	A furnace or oven for burning, baking, or drying, especially one for calcining lime or firing pottery.
<u>masterpiece</u>	A piece of work by a craftsman accepted as qualification for membership of a guild as an acknowledged master. <i>A great literary masterpiece.</i>
<u>mild</u>	Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. <i>A mild sedative.</i>
mottle	A spot or patch forming part of a mottled arrangement. <i>It was not dull grey as distance had suggested but a mottle of khaki and black and olive green.</i>
mottled	Having spots or patches of color. <i>A bird with mottled brown plumage.</i>
mural	Relating to or resembling a wall. <i>Mural thrombosis.</i>
muralist	A painter of murals.
<u>paint</u>	Make a painting of. <i>She couldn't have been more than fourteen but her face was thickly painted.</i>
<u>painting</u>	A painted picture. <i>You can finish the job of painting faster with a roller than with a brush.</i>
patterned	Having patterns (especially colorful patterns). <i>She wore leather trousers and a patterned shirt.</i>
slate	A flat plate of slate formerly used for writing on in schools. <i>He slated his talk for 9 AM.</i>
speckle	A small spot or patch of colour. <i>Speckle the wall with tiny yellow spots.</i>
plotch	Blotch or spot. <i>A splotch of red in a larger area of yellow.</i>
<u>spot</u>	Mark or become marked with spots. <i>I'll spot you 300.</i>
<u>spotted</u>	Having spots or patches (small areas of contrasting color or texture). <i>A black and white spotted cow.</i>

streak	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>The theatre is on a winning streak.</i>
striped	Marked or decorated with stripes. <i>A green striped coat.</i>
tessellated	Having a checkered or mottled appearance. <i>A tessellated pavement.</i>
tile	Cover with tiles. <i>Tile the wall and the floor of the bathroom.</i>
variegated	Marked by variety. <i>Variegated yellow bricks.</i>
vitreous	Having the surface made shiny and nonporous by fusing a vitreous solution to it. <i>Vitreous china.</i>
vitriify	Change into glass or a glass-like substance by applying heat. <i>The option of vitriifying nuclear waste presents problems.</i>
