by and large	So as to pass a given point.
chiefly	Mainly. <i>He is remembered chiefly for his organ sonatas.</i>
commonly	Very often; frequently. <i>A commonly used industrial chemical.</i>

customarily	In a way which follows customs or usual practices; usually. <i>The leaves are customarily used for animal fodder.</i>
for the most part	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.
<u>generally</u>	In general terms; without regard to particulars or exceptions. <i>The best scheme is generally reckoned to be the Canadian one.</i>
in general	To or toward the inside of.
in the main	To or toward the inside of.
<u>largely</u>	In large part; mainly or chiefly. <i>He was soon arrested largely through the efforts of Tom Poole.</i>
<u>mainly</u>	For the most part. <i>He is mainly interested in butterflies.</i>
more often than not	Used to form the comparative of some adjectives and adverbs.
most of the time	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.
most often	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.
<u>normally</u>	Under normal or usual conditions; as a rule. <i>Normally it takes three or four years to complete the training.</i>
on the whole	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly').
ordinarily	Under normal conditions. <i>An effort to behave ordinarily.</i>
predominantly	Much greater in number or influence. <i>The patients are predominantly indigenous.</i>
<u>primarily</u>	Of primary import. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used primarily for word processing.</i>
principally	For the most part; chiefly. <i>He was principally a landscape painter.</i>
substantially	In a strong substantial way. <i>Painting the room white made it seem considerably or substantially larger.</i>
<u>typically</u>	With the distinctive qualities of a particular type of person or thing. <i>A typically English village wedding.</i>
usually	Under normal conditions; generally. <i>He usually arrives home about one o'clock.</i>

Usage Examples of "Mostly" as an adverb

- *The culprits are mostly, but not exclusively, male.*
- *I made some good friends, but mostly met closed-minded people.*

Associations of "Mostly" (30 Words)

accepted	Generally believed or recognized to be valid or correct. <i>Several accepted techniques for treating the condition.</i>
always	As a last resort; failing all else. <i>She is always making derogatory remarks.</i>
basically	In essence; at bottom or by one's (or its) very nature. <i>He is basically dishonest.</i>
broadly	In general and without considering minor details. <i>The climate is broadly similar in the two regions.</i>
chiefly	For the most part; mostly. <i>An audience consisting chiefly of women between the ages of 18 and 54.</i>
commonly	Under normal conditions. <i>Shift workers commonly complain of not getting enough sleep.</i>
consist	Be consistent with. <i>The crew consists of five men.</i>
essentially	Used to emphasize the basic, fundamental, or intrinsic nature of a person or thing. <i>Essentially they are amateurs.</i>
exceptionally	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour exceptionally for a very important case.</i>
generally	In general terms; without regard to particulars or exceptions. <i>The term of a lease is generally 99 years.</i>
habitually	By way of habit; customarily. <i>Does he lie habitually.</i>
irresistibly	In a way that is too attractive and tempting to be resisted. <i>I am irresistibly reminded of the advice of a friend of mine.</i>
largely	To a great extent; on the whole; mostly. <i>These accounts are largely inactive.</i>
mainly	More than anything else. <i>The west will be mainly dry.</i>

norm	Adjust something to conform to a norm. <i>It set the norm for American homes.</i>
<u>normally</u>	At right angles to a given line or surface. <i>Try to breathe normally.</i>
ordinarily	Usually. <i>An effort to behave ordinarily.</i>
<u>originally</u>	Before now. <i>The suggestions so originally and persuasively outlined.</i>
<u>overwhelmingly</u>	To a very great degree or with a great majority. <i>The candy looked overwhelmingly desirable to the dieting man.</i>
pantechnicon	A large moving van (especially one used for moving furniture).
predominantly	Much greater in number or influence. <i>It is predominantly a coastal bird.</i>
<u>primarily</u>	For the most part. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used primarily for word processing.</i>
principal	An actor who plays a principal role. <i>The singing style of the principals.</i>
principally	For the most part; chiefly. <i>He was principally a landscape painter.</i>
<u>public</u>	Open to or shared by all the people of an area or country. <i>A public library.</i>
<u>routinely</u>	As part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>Large scale producers routinely vaccinate their birds against the disease.</i>
<u>typically</u>	In most cases; usually. <i>David lit up many gatherings with his typically forthright comments.</i>
universally	By everyone; in every case. <i>Progress is not always universally welcomed.</i>
usually	Under normal conditions; generally. <i>He usually arrives home about one o'clock.</i>
<u>wont</u>	An established custom. <i>Wont thy heart to thoughts hereof.</i>
