Synonyms of "Motionless" as an adjective (19 Words)

<u>frozen</u>	(used of foods) preserved by freezing sufficiently rapidly to retain flavor and nutritional value. <i>Frozen foods.</i>
halted	Disabled in the feet or legs.
immobile	Securely fixed in place. <i>An immobile workforce.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	(of property) consisting of land, buildings, or other permanent items. <i>All immovable objects have graffiti sprayed on them.</i>
inactive	Not engaging in political or other activity. <i>Dreamy and inactive by nature.</i>
inanimate	Belonging to the class of nouns denoting nonliving things. <i>The word car is inanimate.</i>
<u>inert</u>	Lacking the ability or strength to move. <i>Inert matter.</i>
<u>lifeless</u>	Lacking animation or excitement or activity. <i>The lifeless landscapes of the moon.</i>
not moving a muscle	Used of a series of photographs presented so as to create the illusion of motion.
paralysed	(of a person or part of the body) partly or wholly incapable of movement; disabled. <i>He became partially paralysed.</i>
quiescent	Not active or activated. <i>The quiescent level of centimeter wave length solar radiation.</i>
rooted to the spot	Absolutely still.
<u>static</u>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>An electrostatic generator produces high voltage static electricity.</i>
<u>stationary</u>	Standing still. <i>A car collided with a stationary vehicle.</i>
still	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>A still autumn day.</i>
stock-still	Absolutely still.
stopped	(of a nose) blocked. <i>A stopped or stopped up nose.</i>
<u>transfixed</u>	Having your attention fixated as though by a spell.

unmoving

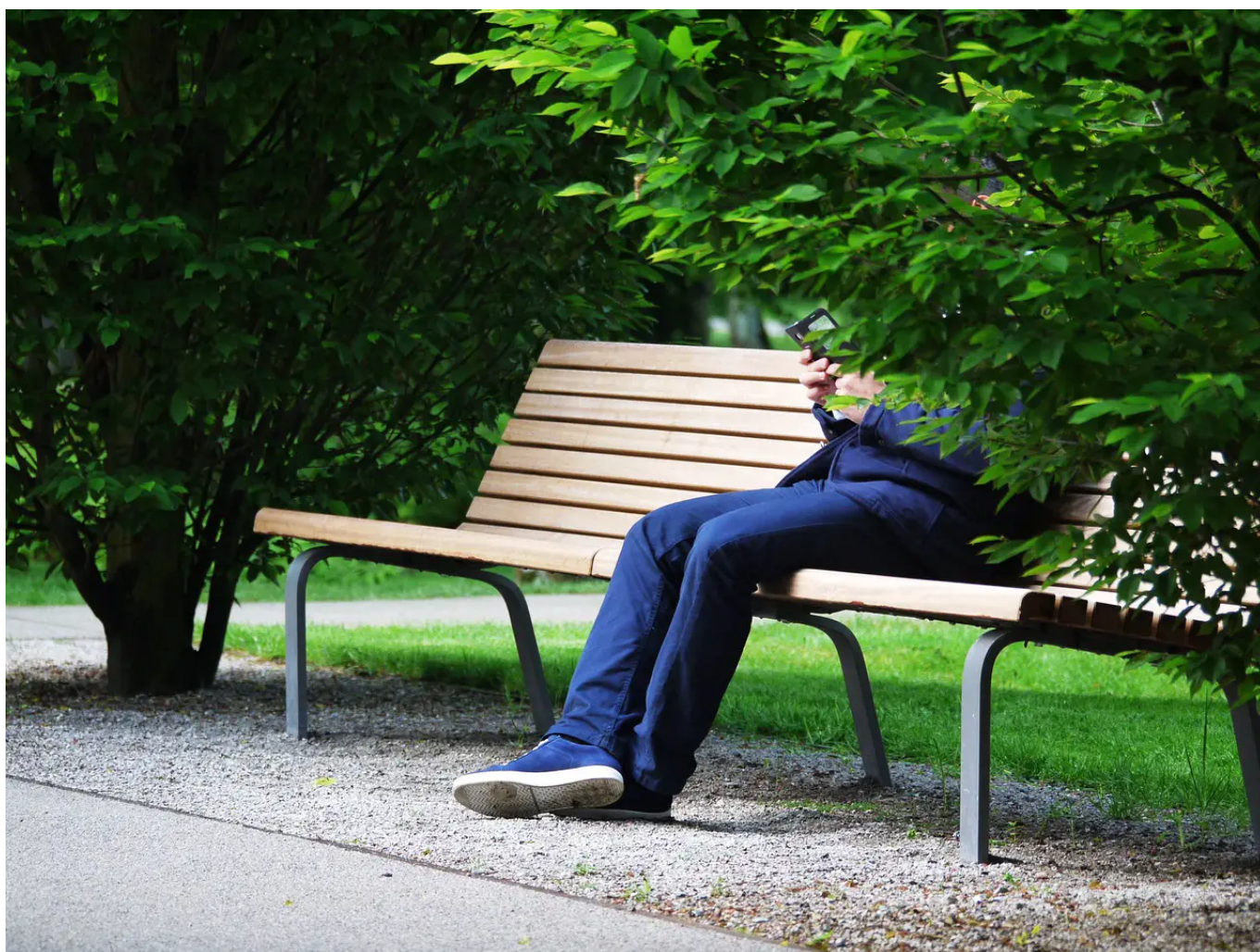
Not stirring any emotion.

- already** Used after a word or phrase to express impatience.
*Anna has suffered a great deal **already**.*
- complacency** A feeling of smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements.
*His **complacency** was absolutely disgusting.*
- confirmed** Having been established or made firm or received the rite of confirmation.
*A **confirmed** invalid.*

constancy	The quality of being enduring and free from change or variation. <i>She did not think much of married bliss yet she approved of constancy.</i>
fixed	Fixed and unmoving. <i>A fixed iron ladder down the port side.</i>
idleness	The quality of lacking substance or value. <i>He was punished for his idleness at school.</i>
immobile	Not capable of movement or of being moved. <i>She sat immobile for a long time.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	Immovable property. <i>All immovable objects have graffiti sprayed on them.</i>
<u>inaction</u>	Lack of action where some is expected or appropriate. <i>Future generations will condemn us for inaction.</i>
inactive	Not exerting influence or change. <i>An inactive member.</i>
inactivity	The state of being inactive; idleness. <i>Don't suddenly take up violent exercise after years of inactivity.</i>
<u>inert</u>	Unable to move or resist motion. <i>She lay inert in her bed.</i>
lull	A pause during which things are calm or activities are diminished. <i>The rhythm of the boat lulled her to sleep.</i>
<u>nonetheless</u>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was nonetheless attended by some 6 000.</i>
preside	Act as president. <i>The prime minister will preside at an emergency cabinet meeting.</i>
prudish	Having or revealing a tendency to be easily shocked by matters relating to sex or nudity; excessively concerned with sexual propriety. <i>The prudish moral climate of the late 19th century.</i>
quiescence	Inactivity or dormancy. <i>This method has been shown to induce sleep like quiescence in adult animals.</i>
quiescent	(pathology) causing no symptoms. <i>A quiescent tumor.</i>
<u>sedentary</u>	Requiring sitting or little activity. <i>A tribe of sedentary agriculturists.</i>
settled	Not changeable. <i>With details of the wedding settled she could now sleep at night.</i>

standing	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. <i>Two teams desperate to improve their league standings.</i>
<u>static</u>	Relating to statics. <i>She felt the tingle of static from the cat's fur.</i>
statics	The branch of mechanics concerned with bodies at rest and forces in equilibrium.
<u>stationary</u>	Not changing in quantity or condition. <i>A stationary population.</i>
steadfast	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i>Steadfast resolve.</i>
<u>stiff</u>	In a stiff manner. <i>His hands lay stiffly.</i>
still	Make or become still; quieten. <i>He still lives with his mother.</i>
tranquelize	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
unmoving	Not moving; still. <i>This must be the most unmoving performance of Verdi's opera ever recorded.</i>
unshakable	Without flaws or loopholes.
