<b>a great deal</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>a lot</b>	Anything (straws or pebbles etc.) taken or chosen at random.
<b>alp</b>	A high mountain, especially a snow-capped one.
<b>batch</b>	A group of records processed as a single unit, usually without input from a user. <i>A <b>batch</b> of letters.</i>
<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>The captain was entrusted with the <b>deal</b> of provisions.</i>
<b><u>elevation</u></b>	The height of a dancer's leap or jump. <i>There was snow at the higher <b>elevations</b>.</i>
<b>eminence</b>	A title or form of address given to a Roman Catholic cardinal. <i>An <b>eminence</b> commanding the River Emme.</i>
<b><u>excess</u></b>	Excessive indulgence. <i>As regards other cancers in this age group there is a small <b>excess</b> during 1984 90.</i>
<b><u>flock</u></b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A <b>flock</b> of sheep.</i>

<b>glut</b>	An excessively abundant supply of something. <i>There is a <b>glut</b> of cars on the market.</i>
<b>good deal</b>	Articles of commerce.
<b>great deal</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>hatful</b>	A large number or amount or extent.
<b>heap</b>	A collection of objects laid on top of each other. <i>They climbed back in the <b>heap</b> and headed home.</i>
<b>height</b>	(of a standing person) the distance from head to foot. <i>It would be the <b>height</b> of bad manners not to attend the wedding.</i>
<b>horn</b>	A device having the shape of a horn. <i>Powdered rhino <b>horn</b>.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>Schemes to improve the <b>lot</b> of the disadvantaged.</i>
<b>mass</b>	A large amount of material. <i>Seaside towns that catered for the <b>masses</b>.</i>
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>The sergeants <b>mess</b>.</i>
<b>mickle</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.
<b>mint</b>	A candy that is flavored with a mint oil. <i>He made a <b>mint</b> on the stock market.</i>
<b>mound</b>	Structure consisting of an artificial heap or bank usually of earth or stones. <i>The dead were cremated and then buried at the centre of a great <b>mound</b>.</i>
<b>mount</b>	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. <i>A <b>mount</b> for a pair of binoculars.</i>
<b>mountaintop</b>	The area at the top of a mountain. <i>A snow covered <b>mountaintop</b>.</i>
<b>muckle</b>	A large number or amount or extent.
<b>overabundance</b>	An excessive quantity. <i>The country suffers from an <b>overabundance</b> of laws.</i>
<b>oversupply</b>	The quality of being so overabundant that prices fall. <i><b>Oversupply</b> causes prices to fall.</i>
<b>passel</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>See the rest of the winners in our huge <b>passel</b> of photos.</i>
<b>peak</b>	A stiff brim at the front of a cap. <i>Package holiday sales hit a <b>peak</b> of around 12 million.</i>

<b>peck</b>	A stroke or bite by a bird with its beak. <i>The bird managed to give its attacker a sharp <b>peck</b>.</i>
<b>pile</b>	A funeral pyre. <i>A Victorian Gothic <b>pile</b>.</i>
<b><u>pinnacle</u></b>	A slender upright spire at the top of a buttress of tower. <i>Catapulted Einstein to the <b>pinnacle</b> of fame.</i>
<b><u>plenty</u></b>	A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>Such natural phenomena as famine and <b>plenty</b>.</i>
<b>prominence</b>	Relative importance. <i>The commission gave the case a <b>prominence</b> which it might otherwise have escaped.</i>
<b>raft</b>	A small inflatable rubber or plastic boat, especially one for use in emergencies. <i>Great <b>rafts</b> of cormorants often 5 000 strong.</i>
<b>sight</b>	A person's view or consideration. <i>We are all equal in the <b>sight</b> of God.</i>
<b><u>slew</u></b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>A <b>slew</b> of journalists.</i>
<b>spate</b>	A large number of similar things coming in quick succession. <i>A <b>spate</b> of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<b><u>stack</u></b>	A chimney, especially one on a factory, or a vertical exhaust pipe on a vehicle. <i>The demand for items from the <b>stacks</b>.</i>
<b><u>summit</u></b>	A meeting of heads of governments. <i>The <b>summit</b> of his ambition.</i>
<b>surfeit</b>	The state of being more than full. <i>He died of a <b>surfeit</b>.</i>
<b><u>surplus</u></b>	A quantity much larger than is needed. <i>A trade <b>surplus</b> of 1 395 million.</i>
<b>tidy sum</b>	Receptacle that holds odds and ends (as sewing materials).

## Associations of "Mountain" (30 Words)

- alpine** A plant native to mountain districts, often suitable for growing in rock gardens.  
*Alpine* flowers.
- ascend** Become king or queen.  
*The lift **ascended** from his sight.*
- ash** Convert into ashes.  
*I turned over the **ashes**.*
- basalt** A dark fine-grained volcanic rock that sometimes displays a columnar structure, typically composed largely of plagioclase with pyroxene and olivine.
- brae** A steep bank or hillside.  
*A figure was spied struggling up the **brae**.*
- clamber** Climb or move in an awkward and laborious way, typically using both hands and feet.  
*Reaching the crest was a real **clamber**.*

<b>cliff</b>	A steep high face of rock. <i>He stood on a high <b>cliff</b> overlooking the town.</i>
<b>climb</b>	A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>The stock market <b>climbed</b> 23 9 points.</i>
<b>climber</b>	Someone seeking social prominence by obsequious behavior. <i>A rock <b>climber</b>.</i>
<b>climbing</b>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i><b>Climbing</b> equipment.</i>
<b>crater</b>	Form a crater in the ground or a planet. <i>Using the rounded end of a rolling pin make <b>craters</b> over the surface of the cake.</i>
<b>crest</b>	Reach the top of (a hill or wave). <i>Biopsy specimens of the iliac <b>crest</b> were obtained under local anaesthesia.</i>
<b>foothill</b>	A low hill at the base of a mountain or mountain range. <i>The camp lies in the <b>foothills</b> of the Andes.</i>
<b>hike</b>	Increase (something, especially a price) sharply. <i>They <b>hiked</b> across the moors.</i>
<b>hill</b>	Form into a hill. <i>They loved to roam the <b>hills</b> of West Virginia.</i>
<b>ledge</b>	A window ledge. <i>A reef <b>ledge</b>.</i>
<b>pounce</b>	Notice and take swift advantage of a mistake or sign of weakness. <i>The paper <b>pounced</b> on her admission that she is still a member of CND.</i>
<b>precipice</b>	A very steep rock face or cliff, especially a tall one. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the <b>precipice</b>.</i>
<b>ridge</b>	Of a surface form into or rise up as a ridge. <i>Buff your nails in order to smooth <b>ridges</b>.</i>
<b>scale</b>	Remove the scales from. <i><b>Scale</b> fish.</i>
<b>ski</b>	Travel over snow on skis take part in the sport or recreation of skiing. <i>They <b>skied</b> down the mountain.</i>
<b>skiing</b>	The action of travelling over snow on skis especially as a sport or recreation Competitive skiing falls into two categories Nordic cross country racing jumping and biathlon and Alpine downhill or straight racing and slalom racing round a series of markers.
<b>steep</b>	A steep mountain slope. <i><b>Steep</b> the blossoms in oil.</i>

- surmount** Get on top of; deal with successfully.  
*The scarf **surmounted** the gown.*
- trek** Fish using a trek net.  
*A **trek** to the South Pole.*
- tundra** A vast treeless plain in the Arctic regions where the subsoil is permanently frozen.  
***Tundra** vegetation.*
- volcanic** Explosively unstable.  
*A **volcanic** temper.*
- volcano** A state or situation which is liable to erupt into anger or violence.  
*Clare had been building up a silent **volcano** of resentment.*
