- *(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.*

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| a great deal | A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field. |
| a lot | Anything (straws or pebbles etc.) taken or chosen at random. |
| alp | A high mountain, especially a snow-capped one. |
| batch | A group of records processed as a single unit, usually without input from a user. <i>A batch of letters.</i> |
| deal | The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>The captain was entrusted with the deal of provisions.</i> |
| <u>elevation</u> | The height of a dancer's leap or jump. <i>There was snow at the higher elevations.</i> |
| eminence | A title or form of address given to a Roman Catholic cardinal. <i>An eminence commanding the River Emme.</i> |
| <u>excess</u> | Excessive indulgence. <i>As regards other cancers in this age group there is a small excess during 1984 90.</i> |
| <u>flock</u> | A large number or amount or extent. <i>A flock of sheep.</i> |

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| glut | An excessively abundant supply of something. <i>There is a glut of cars on the market.</i> |
| good deal | Articles of commerce. |
| great deal | A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field. |
| hatful | A large number or amount or extent. |
| heap | A collection of objects laid on top of each other. <i>They climbed back in the heap and headed home.</i> |
| height | (of a standing person) the distance from head to foot. <i>It would be the height of bad manners not to attend the wedding.</i> |
| horn | A device having the shape of a horn. <i>Powdered rhino horn.</i> |
| lot | A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>Schemes to improve the lot of the disadvantaged.</i> |
| mass | A large amount of material. <i>Seaside towns that catered for the masses.</i> |
| mess | A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>The sergeants mess.</i> |
| mickle | (often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. |
| mint | A candy that is flavored with a mint oil. <i>He made a mint on the stock market.</i> |
| mound | Structure consisting of an artificial heap or bank usually of earth or stones. <i>The dead were cremated and then buried at the centre of a great mound.</i> |
| mount | A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. <i>A mount for a pair of binoculars.</i> |
| mountaintop | The area at the top of a mountain. <i>A snow covered mountaintop.</i> |
| muckle | A large number or amount or extent. |
| overabundance | An excessive quantity. <i>The country suffers from an overabundance of laws.</i> |
| oversupply | The quality of being so overabundant that prices fall. <i>Oversupply causes prices to fall.</i> |
| passel | (often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>See the rest of the winners in our huge passel of photos.</i> |
| peak | A stiff brim at the front of a cap. <i>Package holiday sales hit a peak of around 12 million.</i> |

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| peck | A stroke or bite by a bird with its beak. <i>The bird managed to give its attacker a sharp peck.</i> |
| pile | A funeral pyre. <i>A Victorian Gothic pile.</i> |
| <u>pinnacle</u> | A slender upright spire at the top of a buttress of tower. <i>Catapulted Einstein to the pinnacle of fame.</i> |
| <u>plenty</u> | A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>Such natural phenomena as famine and plenty.</i> |
| prominence | Relative importance. <i>The commission gave the case a prominence which it might otherwise have escaped.</i> |
| raft | A small inflatable rubber or plastic boat, especially one for use in emergencies. <i>Great rafts of cormorants often 5 000 strong.</i> |
| sight | A person's view or consideration. <i>We are all equal in the sight of God.</i> |
| <u>slew</u> | (often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>A slew of journalists.</i> |
| spate | A large number of similar things coming in quick succession. <i>A spate of attacks on holidaymakers.</i> |
| <u>stack</u> | A chimney, especially one on a factory, or a vertical exhaust pipe on a vehicle. <i>The demand for items from the stacks.</i> |
| <u>summit</u> | A meeting of heads of governments. <i>The summit of his ambition.</i> |
| surfeit | The state of being more than full. <i>He died of a surfeit.</i> |
| <u>surplus</u> | A quantity much larger than is needed. <i>A trade surplus of 1 395 million.</i> |
| tidy sum | Receptacle that holds odds and ends (as sewing materials). |

Associations of "Mountain" (30 Words)

- alpine** A plant native to mountain districts, often suitable for growing in rock gardens.
Alpine flowers.
- ascend** Become king or queen.
*The lift **ascended** from his sight.*
- ash** Convert into ashes.
*I turned over the **ashes**.*
- basalt** A dark fine-grained volcanic rock that sometimes displays a columnar structure, typically composed largely of plagioclase with pyroxene and olivine.
- brae** A steep bank or hillside.
*A figure was spied struggling up the **brae**.*
- clamber** Climb or move in an awkward and laborious way, typically using both hands and feet.
*Reaching the crest was a real **clamber**.*

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| cliff | A steep high face of rock. <i>He stood on a high cliff overlooking the town.</i> |
| climb | A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>The stock market climbed 23 9 points.</i> |
| climber | Someone seeking social prominence by obsequious behavior. <i>A rock climber.</i> |
| climbing | The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>Climbing equipment.</i> |
| crater | Form a crater in the ground or a planet. <i>Using the rounded end of a rolling pin make craters over the surface of the cake.</i> |
| crest | Reach the top of (a hill or wave). <i>Biopsy specimens of the iliac crest were obtained under local anaesthesia.</i> |
| foothill | A low hill at the base of a mountain or mountain range. <i>The camp lies in the foothills of the Andes.</i> |
| hike | Increase (something, especially a price) sharply. <i>They hiked across the moors.</i> |
| hill | Form into a hill. <i>They loved to roam the hills of West Virginia.</i> |
| ledge | A window ledge. <i>A reef ledge.</i> |
| pounce | Notice and take swift advantage of a mistake or sign of weakness. <i>The paper pounced on her admission that she is still a member of CND.</i> |
| precipice | A very steep rock face or cliff, especially a tall one. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the precipice.</i> |
| ridge | Of a surface form into or rise up as a ridge. <i>Buff your nails in order to smooth ridges.</i> |
| scale | Remove the scales from. <i>Scale fish.</i> |
| ski | Travel over snow on skis take part in the sport or recreation of skiing. <i>They skied down the mountain.</i> |
| skiing | The action of travelling over snow on skis especially as a sport or recreation Competitive skiing falls into two categories Nordic cross country racing jumping and biathlon and Alpine downhill or straight racing and slalom racing round a series of markers. |
| steep | A steep mountain slope. <i>Steep the blossoms in oil.</i> |

- surmount** Get on top of; deal with successfully.
*The scarf **surmounted** the gown.*
- trek** Fish using a trek net.
*A **trek** to the South Pole.*
- tundra** A vast treeless plain in the Arctic regions where the subsoil is permanently frozen.
***Tundra** vegetation.*
- volcanic** Explosively unstable.
*A **volcanic** temper.*
- volcano** A state or situation which is liable to erupt into anger or violence.
*Clare had been building up a silent **volcano** of resentment.*
