abundance	The ratio of the total mass of an element in the earth’s crust to the total mass of the earth’s crust; expressed as a percentage or in parts per million. <i>Estimates of the abundance of harp seals.</i>
appreciably	To an appreciable extent; considerably. <i>An appreciably higher risk.</i>
bevy	A large group of people or things of a particular kind. <i>He was surrounded by a bevy of beauties in bathing attire.</i>
considerably	By a notably large amount or to a notably large extent; greatly. <i>Painting the room white made it seem considerably or substantially larger.</i>
countless	Too numerous to be counted. <i>She d apologized countless times before.</i>
dozen	Denoting a quantity consisting of 12 items or units. <i>She has dozens of admirers.</i>
fairly	With justice. <i>He fairly snarled at her.</i>
galore	In great numbers. <i>Whiskey galore.</i>
greatly	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him greatly.</i>
incalculable	(of a person or their character) unpredictable. <i>An archive of incalculable value.</i>
lot	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>It s just one lot of rich people stealing from another.</i>
many	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `as’ or `too’ or `so’ or `that’; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>A great many.</i>

<u>moderately</u>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Growth continues moderately.</i>
more	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>More beautiful.</i>
<u>most</u>	Almost. <i>We re almost finished.</i>
multiplicity	The property of being multiple. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a multiplicity of factors.</i>
numberless	Too many to be counted; innumerable. <i>There are numberless questions to be asked.</i>
numerous	Great in number; many. <i>She had complained to the council on numerous occasions.</i>
overdo	Exhaust oneself by overwork or overexertion. <i>She rather overdoes the early cockney scenes.</i>
<u>plenty</u>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>Such natural phenomena as famine and plenty.</i>
<u>pretty</u>	Make pretty or attractive. <i>He looked pretty fit for his age.</i>
<u>quite</u>	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i>He s quite an attractive man.</i>
<u>rather</u>	Used to express a recommended alternative, but without a than clause and used with verbs other than would; instead. <i>Prospective buyers should meet the seller in person rather.</i>
reasonably	To certain extent or degree. <i>She played the piano reasonably well.</i>
<u>slightly</u>	In a slim or slender manner. <i>The children argued because one slice of cake was slightly larger than the other.</i>
<u>some</u>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>That was some party.</i>
<u>somewhat</u>	To a small degree or extent. <i>Matters have improved somewhat since then.</i>
substantially	To a great extent or degree. <i>Painting the room white made it seem considerably or substantially larger.</i>
untold	Too much to be measured. <i>Untold suffering.</i>
