## Associations of "Much less" (30 Words)

<b>abundance</b>	The ratio of the total mass of an element in the earth’s crust to the total mass of the earth’s crust; expressed as a percentage or in parts per million. <i>Estimates of the <b>abundance</b> of harp seals.</i>
<b>appreciably</b>	To an appreciable extent; considerably. <i>An <b>appreciably</b> higher risk.</i>
<b>bevy</b>	A large group of people or things of a particular kind. <i>He was surrounded by a <b>bevy</b> of beauties in bathing attire.</i>
<b>considerably</b>	By a notably large amount or to a notably large extent; greatly. <i>Painting the room white made it seem <b>considerably</b> or substantially larger.</i>
<b>countless</b>	Too numerous to be counted. <i>She d apologized <b>countless</b> times before.</i>
<b>dozen</b>	Denoting a quantity consisting of 12 items or units. <i>She has <b>dozens</b> of admirers.</i>
<b>fairly</b>	With justice. <i>He <b>fairly</b> snarled at her.</i>
<b>galore</b>	In great numbers. <i>Whiskey <b>galore</b>.</i>
<b>greatly</b>	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him <b>greatly</b>.</i>
<b>incalculable</b>	(of a person or their character) unpredictable. <i>An archive of <b>incalculable</b> value.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>It s just one <b>lot</b> of rich people stealing from another.</i>
<b>many</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `as’ or `too’ or `so’ or `that’; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>A great <b>many</b>.</i>

<b><u>moderately</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Growth continues <b>moderately</b>.</i>
<b>more</b>	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i><b>More</b> beautiful.</i>
<b><u>most</u></b>	Almost. <i>We re <b>almost</b> finished.</i>
<b>multiplicity</b>	The property of being multiple. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a <b>multiplicity</b> of factors.</i>
<b>numberless</b>	Too many to be counted; innumerable. <i>There are <b>numberless</b> questions to be asked.</i>
<b>numerous</b>	Great in number; many. <i>She had complained to the council on <b>numerous</b> occasions.</i>
<b>overdo</b>	Exhaust oneself by overwork or overexertion. <i>She rather <b>overdoes</b> the early cockney scenes.</i>
<b><u>plenty</u></b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>Such natural phenomena as famine and <b>plenty</b>.</i>
<b><u>pretty</u></b>	Make pretty or attractive. <i>He looked <b>pretty</b> fit for his age.</i>
<b><u>quite</u></b>	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i>He s <b>quite</b> an attractive man.</i>
<b><u>rather</u></b>	Used to express a recommended alternative, but without a than clause and used with verbs other than would; instead. <i>Prospective buyers should meet the seller in person <b>rather</b>.</i>
<b>reasonably</b>	To certain extent or degree. <i>She played the piano <b>reasonably</b> well.</i>
<b><u>slightly</u></b>	In a slim or slender manner. <i>The children argued because one slice of cake was <b>slightly</b> larger than the other.</i>
<b><u>some</u></b>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>That was <b>some</b> party.</i>
<b><u>somewhat</u></b>	To a small degree or extent. <i>Matters have improved <b>somewhat</b> since then.</i>
<b>substantially</b>	To a great extent or degree. <i>Painting the room white made it seem considerably or <b>substantially</b> larger.</i>
<b>untold</b>	Too much to be measured. <i><b>Untold</b> suffering.</i>
