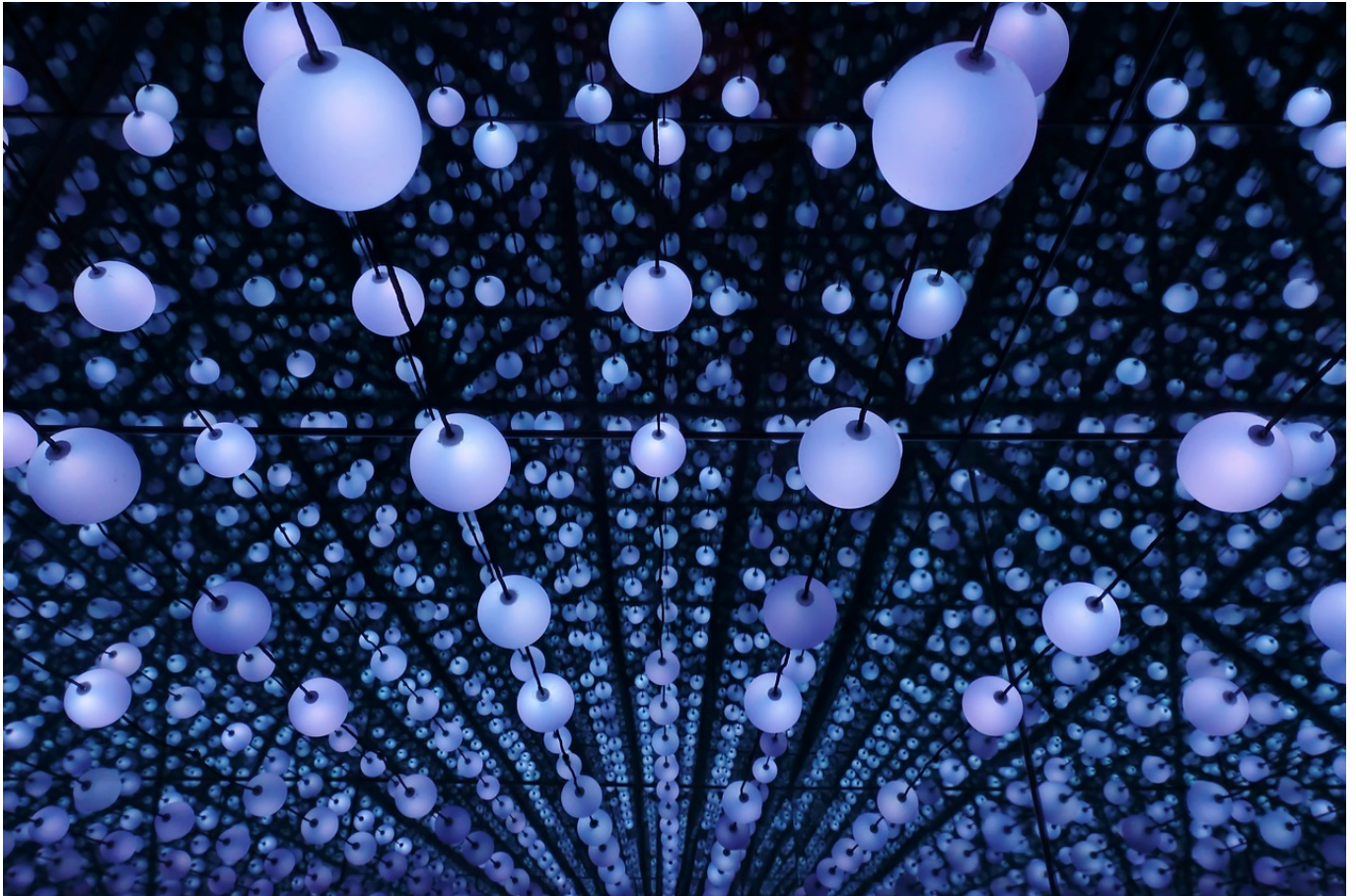

<b><a href="#">congregation</a></b>	A group of people regularly attending a particular place of worship. <i>A great <b>congregation</b> of birds flew over.</i>
<b>crowd</b>	A large number of things or people considered together. <i>He still hangs out with the same <b>crowd</b>.</i>
<b>droves</b>	A stonemason's chisel with a broad edge for dressing stone.
<b><a href="#">flock</a></b>	A number of birds of one kind feeding, resting, or travelling together. <i>A <b>flock</b> of gulls.</i>
<b>gathering</b>	The act of gathering something. <i>A family <b>gathering</b>.</i>
<b>group</b>	(chemistry) two or more atoms bound together as a single unit and forming part of a molecule. <i>The bulbs should be planted in <b>groups</b>.</i>
<b>hoi polloi</b>	The common people generally.
<b><a href="#">horde</a></b>	A moving crowd. <i>A <b>horde</b> of beery rugby fans.</i>

<b><u>host</u></b>	A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Innsbruck once played <b>host</b> to the Winter Olympics.</i>
<b>large number</b>	A garment size for a large person.
<b><u>legion</u></b>	A vast multitude. <i><b>Legions</b> of photographers and TV cameras.</i>
<b><u>mass</u></b>	The property of something that is great in magnitude. <i>A huge ice <b>mass</b>.</i>
<b>masses</b>	The property of a body that causes it to have weight in a gravitational field.
<b>mob</b>	A group of people in the same place or with something in common. <i>A <b>mob</b> of cattle.</i>
<b><u>mountain</u></b>	A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill. <i>They sought refuge in the <b>mountains</b>.</i>
<b><u>pack</u></b>	A convenient package or parcel as of cigarettes or film. <i>We picked up our <b>packs</b> and trudged off.</i>
<b>people</b>	The common people generally. <i>Old <b>people</b>.</i>
<b><u>plurality</u></b>	The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>A <b>plurality</b> of critical approaches.</i>
<b>profusion</b>	An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>The <b>profusion</b> of detail.</i>
<b><u>sea</u></b>	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>Heavy <b>seas</b>.</i>
<b><u>swarm</u></b>	A series of similar-sized earthquakes occurring together, typically near a volcano. <i>A <b>swarm</b> of journalists.</i>
<b>the common people</b>	A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area.
<b>the crowd</b>	A large number of things or people considered together.
<b>the great unwashed</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>the masses</b>	The common people generally.
<b>the people</b>	The body of citizens of a state or country.
<b>the populace</b>	People in general considered as a whole.
<b>the public</b>	People in general considered as a whole.

<b>the rank and file</b>	The ordinary members of an organization (such as the enlisted soldiers of an army).
<b>the third estate</b>	The base that must be touched third by a base runner in baseball.

<b>assorted</b>	Of many different kinds purposefully arranged but lacking any uniformity. <i>An arrangement of <b>assorted</b> spring flowers.</i>
<b>assortment</b>	The act of distributing things into classes or categories of the same type. <i>A great <b>assortment</b> of cars was on display.</i>
<b>batch</b>	Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>I had nothing to do but <b>batch</b> the reports.</i>
<b>battalion</b>	An army unit usually consisting of a headquarters and three or more companies. <i>A <b>battalion</b> of ants.</i>
<b>cohort</b>	A group of people with a shared characteristic. <i>Young Jack arrived with three of his <b>cohorts</b>.</i>
<b>cram</b>	Prepare (students) hastily for an impending exam. <i><b>Cram</b> books into the suitcase.</i>

<b>crowd</b>	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>As demands <b>crowd</b> in on you it becomes difficult to keep things in perspective.</i>
<b>diversity</b>	Noticeable heterogeneity. <i>Newspapers were obliged to allow a <b>diversity</b> of views to be printed.</i>
<u>horde</u>	A large group of people. <i>A <b>horde</b> of beery rugby fans.</i>
<u>innumerable</u>	Too numerous to be counted. <i><b>Innumerable</b> difficulties.</i>
<u>jam</u>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>They were <b>jamming</b> broadcasts by the pirate radio ships.</i>
<u>legion</u>	A division of 3,000–6,000 men, including a complement of cavalry, in the ancient Roman army. <i>Palomar s fans are <b>legion</b>.</i>
<b>lot</b>	Divide into lots as of land for example. <i>A vacant <b>lot</b>.</i>
<b>many</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `as' or `too' or `so' or `that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>Music for the <b>many</b>.</i>
<u>mass</u>	Formed of separate units gathered into a mass or whole. <i>A <b>mass</b> of cyclists.</i>
<b>miscellany</b>	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>A <b>miscellany</b> of houses.</i>
<b>mob</b>	The ordinary people. <i>A cuckoo flew over to be <b>mobbed</b> at once by two reed warblers.</i>
<b>multiplicity</b>	The property of being multiple. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a <b>multiplicity</b> of factors.</i>
<b>numerous</b>	Amounting to a large indefinite number. <i>The orchestra and chorus were <b>numerous</b>.</i>
<b>onlooker</b>	Someone who looks on. <i>A crowd of fascinated <b>onlookers</b>.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>For uniform color and texture tailors cut velvet with the <b>pile</b> running the same direction.</i>
<u>plenty</u>	Used to emphasize the degree of something. <i>It must have cost <b>plenty</b>.</i>

<b>pluralism</b>	A theory or system that recognizes more than one ultimate principle.
<b>plurality</b>	The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>Some languages add an extra syllable to mark <b>plurality</b>.</i>
<b>rally</b>	Drive in a rally. <i>After a short <b>rally</b> Connors won the point.</i>
<b>simultaneously</b>	At the same instant. <i>The telethon was broadcast <b>simultaneously</b> on 31 US networks.</i>
<b>swarm</b>	Of flying insects move in or form a swarm. <i>A plague of locusts <b>swarmed</b> across the countryside.</i>
<b>throng</b>	Flock or be present in great numbers. <i>He pushed his way through the <b>throng</b>.</i>
<b>variety</b>	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>It s the <b>variety</b> that makes my job so enjoyable.</i>
<b>various</b>	Considered individually. <i>Dresses of <b>various</b> colours.</i>
