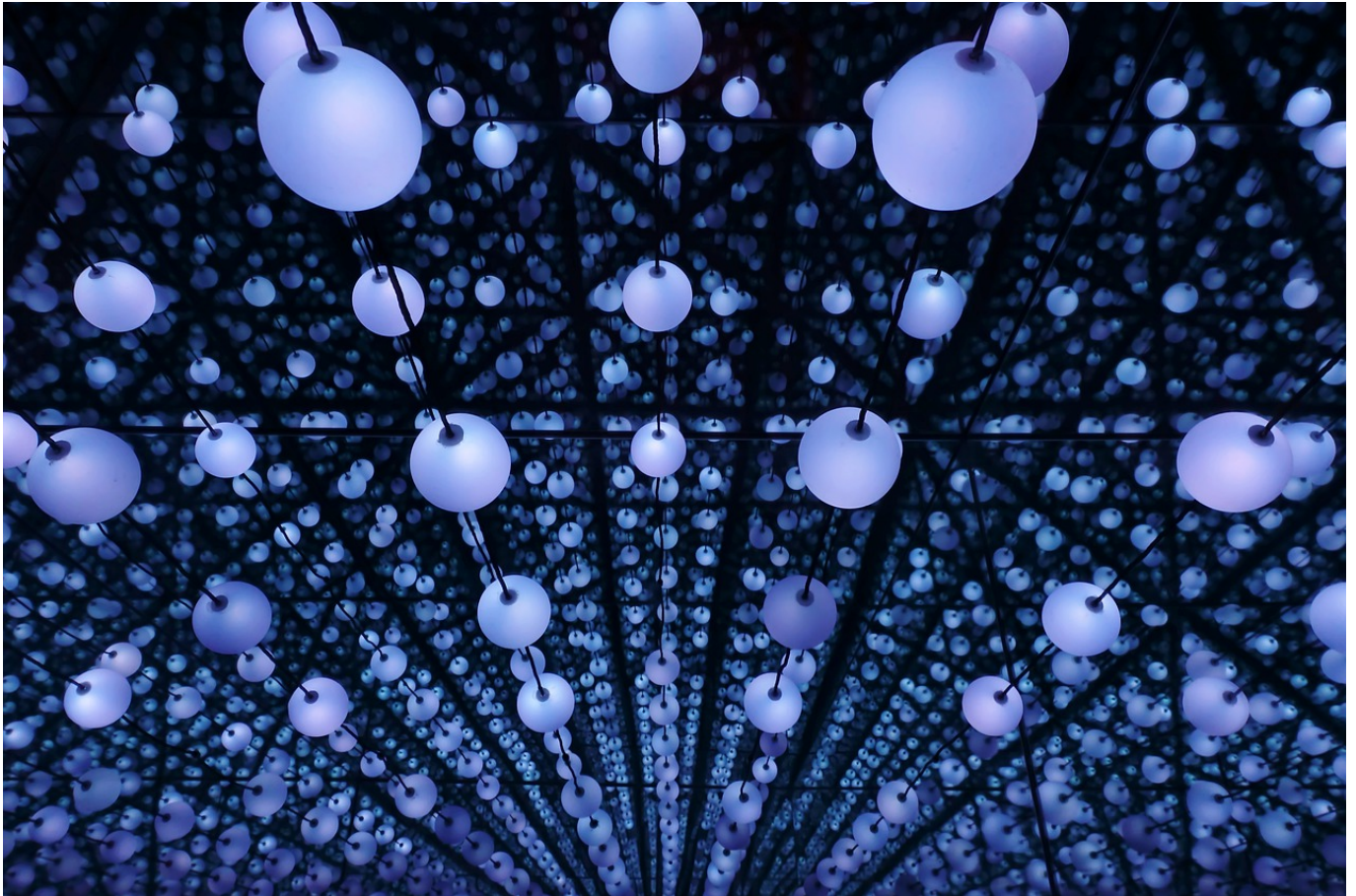

| gathering | The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i> |
| group | (chemistry) two or more atoms bound together as a single unit and forming part of a molecule. <i>The bulbs should be planted in groups.</i> |
| hoi polloi | The common people generally. |
| <u>horde</u> | A moving crowd. <i>A horde of beery rugby fans.</i> |

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| host | A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Innsbruck once played host to the Winter Olympics.</i> |
| large number | A garment size for a large person. |
| legion | A vast multitude. <i>Legions of photographers and TV cameras.</i> |
| mass | The property of something that is great in magnitude. <i>A huge ice mass.</i> |
| masses | The property of a body that causes it to have weight in a gravitational field. |
| mob | A group of people in the same place or with something in common. <i>A mob of cattle.</i> |
| mountain | A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill. <i>They sought refuge in the mountains.</i> |
| pack | A convenient package or parcel as of cigarettes or film. <i>We picked up our packs and trudged off.</i> |
| people | The common people generally. <i>Old people.</i> |
| plurality | The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>A plurality of critical approaches.</i> |
| profusion | An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>The profusion of detail.</i> |
| sea | Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>Heavy seas.</i> |
| swarm | A series of similar-sized earthquakes occurring together, typically near a volcano. <i>A swarm of journalists.</i> |
| the common people | A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area. |
| the crowd | A large number of things or people considered together. |
| the great unwashed | A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field. |
| the masses | The common people generally. |
| the people | The body of citizens of a state or country. |
| the populace | People in general considered as a whole. |
| the public | People in general considered as a whole. |

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| the rank and file | The ordinary members of an organization (such as the enlisted soldiers of an army). |
| the third estate | The base that must be touched third by a base runner in baseball. |
| throng | A large gathering of people. A throng of birds. |

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| assorted | Of many different kinds purposefully arranged but lacking any uniformity. <i>An arrangement of assorted spring flowers.</i> |
| assortment | The act of distributing things into classes or categories of the same type. <i>A great assortment of cars was on display.</i> |
| batch | Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>I had nothing to do but batch the reports.</i> |
| battalion | An army unit usually consisting of a headquarters and three or more companies. <i>A battalion of ants.</i> |
| cohort | A group of people with a shared characteristic. <i>Young Jack arrived with three of his cohorts.</i> |
| cram | Prepare (students) hastily for an impending exam. <i>Cram books into the suitcase.</i> |

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| crowd | Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>As demands crowd in on you it becomes difficult to keep things in perspective.</i> |
| diversity | Noticeable heterogeneity. <i>Newspapers were obliged to allow a diversity of views to be printed.</i> |
| <u>horde</u> | A large group of people. <i>A horde of beery rugby fans.</i> |
| <u>innumerable</u> | Too numerous to be counted. <i>Innumerable difficulties.</i> |
| <u>jam</u> | A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>They were jamming broadcasts by the pirate radio ships.</i> |
| <u>legion</u> | A division of 3,000–6,000 men, including a complement of cavalry, in the ancient Roman army. <i>Palomar s fans are legion.</i> |
| lot | Divide into lots as of land for example. <i>A vacant lot.</i> |
| many | A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `as' or `too' or `so' or `that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>Music for the many.</i> |
| <u>mass</u> | Formed of separate units gathered into a mass or whole. <i>A mass of cyclists.</i> |
| miscellany | A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>A miscellany of houses.</i> |
| mob | The ordinary people. <i>A cuckoo flew over to be mobbed at once by two reed warblers.</i> |
| multiplicity | The property of being multiple. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a multiplicity of factors.</i> |
| numerous | Amounting to a large indefinite number. <i>The orchestra and chorus were numerous.</i> |
| onlooker | Someone who looks on. <i>A crowd of fascinated onlookers.</i> |
| pile | Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>For uniform color and texture tailors cut velvet with the pile running the same direction.</i> |
| <u>plenty</u> | Used to emphasize the degree of something. <i>It must have cost plenty.</i> |

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| pluralism | A theory or system that recognizes more than one ultimate principle. |
| plurality | The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>Some languages add an extra syllable to mark plurality.</i> |
| rally | Drive in a rally. <i>After a short rally Connors won the point.</i> |
| simultaneously | At the same instant. <i>The telethon was broadcast simultaneously on 31 US networks.</i> |
| swarm | Of flying insects move in or form a swarm. <i>A plague of locusts swarmed across the countryside.</i> |
| throng | Flock or be present in great numbers. <i>He pushed his way through the throng.</i> |
| variety | A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>It s the variety that makes my job so enjoyable.</i> |
| various | Considered individually. <i>Dresses of various colours.</i> |
