material	Having material or physical form or substance Benjamin Jowett. Facts likely to influence the judgment are called <b>material</b> facts.
<u>monotonous</u>	Sounded or spoken in a tone unvarying in pitch. Nothing is so <b>monotonous</b> as the sea.
normal	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Normal diplomatic relations.</i>
ordinary	With no special or distinctive features; normal. An <b>ordinary</b> wine.
<u>pedestrian</u>	Lacking wit or imagination. A <b>pedestrian</b> movie plot.
prosaic	Lacking wit or imagination. <b>Prosaic</b> language can t convey the experience.
quotidian	Denoting the malignant form of malaria. There s nothing quite like a real train conductor to add color to a <b>quotidian</b> commute.
regular	In accord with regular practice or procedure. He s a <b>regular</b> guy not a glamour puss.
repetitious	Characterized by repetition. Many hours of <b>repetitious</b> labour.
<u>repetitive</u>	Repetitive and persistent. A <b>repetitive</b> task.

terrene	Of or like earth. So <b>terrene</b> a being as himself.
<u>terrestrial</u>	Of or relating to or characteristic of the planet Earth or its inhabitants. <i>He developed an immense</i> <b>terrestrial</b> <i>practicality.</i>
<u>tiresome</u>	Causing one to feel bored or annoyed. The <b>tiresome</b> chirping of a cricket.
<u>uneventful</u>	Marked by no noteworthy or significant events. A place where dull people lead <b>uneventful</b> lives.
unexciting	Not stimulating. Many school prospectuses are dull and <b>unexciting</b> .
uninteresting	Characteristic or suggestive of an institution especially in being uniform or dull or unimaginative. <i>The scenery is dull and <b>uninteresting</b></i> .
<u>unremarkable</u>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>His early childhood was <b>unremarkable</b>.</i>
unvaried	Not involving change. A plain <b>unvaried</b> diet.
unvarying	Unvarying in nature. The <b>unvarying</b> routine of parsonage life.
<u>usual</u>	Commonly encountered. <i>He carried out his <b>usual</b> evening routine.</i>
wearisome	Causing one to feel tired or bored. They insisted on his presence at <b>wearisome</b> musical soir es.
