<b>fleshly</b>	Relating to human desire or bodily appetites; sensual. <i><b>Fleshly</b> desire.</i>
<b>humdrum</b>	Not challenging; dull and lacking excitement. <i>A <b>humdrum</b> existence all work and no play.</i>
<b>material</b>	Having material or physical form or substance Benjamin Jowett. <i>Facts likely to influence the judgment are called <b>material</b> facts.</i>
<b>monotonous</b>	Sounded or spoken in a tone unvarying in pitch. <i>Nothing is so <b>monotonous</b> as the sea.</i>
<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i><b>Normal</b> diplomatic relations.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	With no special or distinctive features; normal. <i>An <b>ordinary</b> wine.</i>
<b>pedestrian</b>	Lacking wit or imagination. <i>A <b>pedestrian</b> movie plot.</i>
<b>prosaic</b>	Lacking wit or imagination. <i><b>Prosaic</b> language can't convey the experience.</i>
<b>quotidian</b>	Denoting the malignant form of malaria. <i>There's nothing quite like a real train conductor to add color to a <b>quotidian</b> commute.</i>
<b>regular</b>	In accord with regular practice or procedure. <i>He's a <b>regular</b> guy not a glamour puss.</i>
<b>repetitious</b>	Characterized by repetition. <i>Many hours of <b>repetitious</b> labour.</i>
<b>repetitive</b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>A <b>repetitive</b> task.</i>
<b>routine</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>It was a <b>routine</b> day.</i>
<b>run-of-the-mill</b>	Not special in any way.
<b>secular</b>	Of or denoting slow changes in the motion of the sun or planets. <i>There is evidence that the slump is not cyclical but <b>secular</b>.</i>

<b>sensual</b>	Sexually exciting or gratifying. <i>A <b>sensual</b> delight in eating.</i>
<b>tedious</b>	Too long, slow, or dull; tiresome or monotonous. <i><b>Tedious</b> days on the train.</i>
<b>temporal</b>	Characteristic of or devoted to the temporal world as opposed to the spiritual world. <i>The spatial and <b>temporal</b> dimensions of human interference in complex ecosystems.</i>
<b>terrene</b>	Of or like earth. <i>So <b>terrene</b> a being as himself.</i>
<b>terrestrial</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of the planet Earth or its inhabitants. <i>He developed an immense <b>terrestrial</b> practicality.</i>
<b>tiresome</b>	Causing one to feel bored or annoyed. <i>The <b>tiresome</b> chirping of a cricket.</i>
<b>uneventful</b>	Marked by no noteworthy or significant events. <i>A place where dull people lead <b>uneventful</b> lives.</i>
<b>unexciting</b>	Not stimulating. <i>Many school prospectuses are dull and <b>unexciting</b>.</i>
<b>uninteresting</b>	Characteristic or suggestive of an institution especially in being uniform or dull or unimaginative. <i>The scenery is dull and <b>uninteresting</b>.</i>
<b>unremarkable</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>His early childhood was <b>unremarkable</b>.</i>
<b>unvaried</b>	Not involving change. <i>A plain <b>unvaried</b> diet.</i>
<b>unvarying</b>	Unvarying in nature. <i>The <b>unvarying</b> routine of parsonage life.</i>
<b>usual</b>	Commonly encountered. <i>He carried out his <b>usual</b> evening routine.</i>
<b>wearisome</b>	Causing one to feel tired or bored. <i>They insisted on his presence at <b>wearisome</b> musical soir es.</i>
<b>workaday</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>The <b>workaday</b> world of timecards and performance reviews.</i>
<b>worldly</b>	(of a person) experienced and sophisticated. <i>She was much more <b>worldly</b> than Nora and dismissed the slur.</i>

<b><u>accustomed</u></b>	In the habit of or adapted to. <i>His <b>accustomed</b> route.</i>
<b>checkup</b>	A thorough physical examination; includes a variety of tests depending on the age and sex and health of the person.
<b>common</b>	Common sense. <i>Problems <b>common</b> to both communities.</i>
<b>commonplace</b>	A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>The usual <b>commonplace</b> remarks.</i>
<b>customary</b>	(in South Africa) relating to black African traditional custom or law. <i>Sealed the deal with the <b>customary</b> handshake.</i>

<b>daily</b>	A newspaper published every day except Sunday. A <b>daily</b> newspaper.
<b>day-to-day</b>	The time after sunrise and before sunset while it is light outside.
<b>earthly</b>	Used for emphasis. All <b>earthly</b> happiness is but vanity.
<b>featureless</b>	Lacking distinguishing characteristics or features. A <b>featureless</b> landscape of snow and ice.
<b>habitual</b>	Done constantly or as a habit. A <b>habitual</b> late sleeper.
<b>layperson</b>	Someone who is not a clergyman or a professional person. His highly successful lectures were meant for an audience of <b>laypersons</b> interested in the natural sciences.
<b>mediocre</b>	Lacking exceptional quality or ability. There have been good and <b>mediocre</b> and bad artists.
<b>mediocrity</b>	Ordinariness as a consequence of being average and not outstanding. The team suddenly came good after years of <b>mediocrity</b> .
<b>nondescript</b>	A nondescript person or thing. Women dressed in <b>nondescript</b> clothes.
<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. Many previously <b>normal</b> people exhibit psychotic symptoms after a few nights without sleep.
<b>ordinary</b>	A member of the clergy, such as an archbishop in a province or a bishop in a diocese, with immediate jurisdiction. Their clichés were vested with enough emotion to elevate them above the <b>ordinary</b> .
<b>patter</b>	A quick succession of light rapid sounds. The <b>patter</b> of tiny feet.
<b>quotidian</b>	Ordinary or everyday; mundane. His story is an achingly human one mired in <b>quotidian</b> details.
<b>regular</b>	One of the regular clergy. The <b>regular</b> clergy.
<b>routine</b>	Organize according to a routine. I settled down into a <b>routine</b> of work and sleep.
<b>secular</b>	A secular priest. <b>Secular</b> buildings.

<b>traditional</b>	Consisting of or derived from tradition. <i>The simple security of <b>traditional</b> assumptions has vanished.</i>
<b>tuscan</b>	A dialect of Italian spoken in Tuscany (especially Florence).
<u>typical</u>	Representative as a symbol; symbolic. <i>A <b>typical</b> example of 1930s art deco.</i>
<b>unexceptional</b>	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. <i>A <b>unexceptional</b> incident as can be found in a lawyer's career.</i>
<u>unremarkable</u>	Not particularly interesting or surprising. <i>An <b>unremarkable</b> house.</i>
