- *The quiet or subdued expression of a particular feeling by a group of people.*

complaint	A pleading describing some wrong or offense. <i>There were complaints that the building was an eyesore.</i>
drone	A musical instrument or part of one sounding a continuous note of low pitch in particular also drone pipe a pipe in a bagpipe or also drone string a string in an instrument such as a hurdy gurdy or a sitar. <i>A photographer used a drone to take some unconventional photos of the countryside.</i>
grouse	The flesh of the grouse as food.
grumble	A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>The main grumble is that he spends too much time away.</i>
grumbling	A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>There were grumbings from the trustees.</i>
gurgle	A gurgling sound. <i>Catherine gave a gurgle of laughter.</i>
heart murmur	The courage to carry on.
hum	A humming noise. <i>A low hum of conversation.</i>
humming	A humming noise.
moan	A sound resembling a human moan. <i>She gave a low moan of despair.</i>
mumble	A quiet and indistinct utterance. <i>Rosie had replied in a mumble.</i>
murmur vowel	A schwa that is incidental to the pronunciation of a consonant.
murmuration	The action of murmuring. <i>The murmuration of a flock of warblers.</i>
murmuring	A schwa that is incidental to the pronunciation of a consonant. <i>The murmuring of the River Derwent.</i>
mussitation	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech.
mutter	A barely audible utterance, especially one expressing dissatisfaction or irritation. <i>A little mutter of disgust.</i>
muttering	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>There were disloyal mutterings about his leadership.</i>
purl	An ornamental edging of lace or ribbon.

sigh	A sound like a person sighing. <i>She let out a long sigh of despair.</i>
thrum	A thrumming sound. <i>He could hear the thrum of a banjo.</i>
undertone	An underlying quality or feeling. <i>They were talking in undertones.</i>
whir	A whirring sound. <i>The whir of the propellers.</i>
whisper	A soft or confidential tone of voice a whispered word or phrase. <i>The thunder of the surf became a muted whisper.</i>

- *Speak softly or indistinctly.*
- *Make a low continuous sound.*



Synonyms of "Murmur" as a verb (23 Words)

bleat

Talk whiningly.
*The lambs were **bleating**.*

burble

Speak continuously and at length in an unintelligible or confused way.
*The air no longer flows smoothly over the wing but **burbles** and slows down decreasing lift.*

carp

Raise trivial objections.

complain

Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness.
*Let the warbling flute **complain**.*

croak

Of a person make a sound similar to a croak when speaking or laughing.
*Without **croaking** it may be observed that our government is upon a dangerous experiment.*

gnarl	Twist into a state of deformity. <i>The wind has gnarled this old tree.</i>
grouse	Hunt grouse.
<u>grumble</u>	Make a low rumbling sound. <i>He grumbled a rude response.</i>
moan	Make a sound resembling a human moan. <i>Just then their patient moaned and opened his eyes.</i>
<u>mumble</u>	Say something indistinctly and quietly, making it difficult for others to hear. <i>She mumbled a piece of black bread.</i>
<u>mutter</u>	Say something in a low or barely audible voice, especially in dissatisfaction or irritation. <i>He muttered something under his breath.</i>
purl	Knit with a purl stitch. <i>Knit one purl one.</i>
<u>rumble</u>	(especially of a large vehicle) move with a rumbling sound. <i>Heavy lorries rumbled through the streets.</i>
rustle	Move with a rustling sound. <i>Rustle cattle.</i>
<u>sigh</u>	Heave or utter a sigh breathe deeply and heavily. <i>Harry sank into a chair and sighed with relief.</i>
speak in an undertone	Express in speech.
speak in hushed tones	Express in speech.
speak softly	Make a characteristic or natural sound.
speak sotto voce	Use language.
talk under one's breath	Reveal information.
whine	Complain in a feeble or petulant way. <i>The dog whined and scratched at the back door.</i>
whir	Make a soft swishing sound. <i>The motor whirred.</i>
<u>whisper</u>	(of leaves, wind, or water) rustle or murmur softly. <i>Alison was whispering in his ear.</i>

- *'How interesting,' he murmured quietly.*
- *She murmured softly to the baby in her arms.*
- *Now they do not simply murmur against him, they quarrel noisily with him.*
- *Nina murmured an excuse and hurried away.*

equivocal	(of a person) using ambiguous or evasive language. <i>Popularity is an equivocal crown.</i>
<u>equivocate</u>	Use ambiguous language so as to conceal the truth or avoid committing oneself. <i>The government have equivocated too often in the past.</i>
equivocation	Falsification by means of vague or ambiguous language. <i>I say this without equivocation.</i>
evasion	The act of physically escaping from something (an opponent or a pursuer or an unpleasant situation) by some adroit maneuver. <i>His evasion of his clear duty was reprehensible.</i>
<u>evasive</u>	Avoiding or escaping from difficulty or danger especially enemy fire. <i>They decided to take evasive action.</i>
gibber	Speak rapidly and unintelligibly, typically through fear or shock. <i>They shrieked and gibbered as flames surrounded them.</i>
<u>grumble</u>	Make a low rumbling sound. <i>Stones grumbled down the cliff.</i>
hesitate	Interrupt temporarily an activity before continuing. <i>Authorities hesitate to quote exact figures.</i>
<u>incoherent</u>	Not logical or internally consistent. <i>Incoherent with grief.</i>
inconclusive	Not leading to a firm conclusion or result; not ending doubt or dispute. <i>Inconclusive evidence.</i>
indeterminate	Not capable of being determined. <i>A zillion is a large indeterminate number.</i>
maunder	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>Dennis maundered on about the wine.</i>
<u>mumble</u>	Say something indistinctly and quietly, making it difficult for others to hear. <i>The old man had no teeth left and mumbled his food.</i>
<u>mutter</u>	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>Back benchers were muttering about the next reshuffle.</i>
<u>nonsense</u>	Ornamental objects of no great value. <i>The proposal would make a nonsense of their plans.</i>
palaver	Flattery intended to persuade. <i>An hour of aimless palaver.</i>

palter	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>If you palter or double in your answers I will have thee hung alive in an iron chain.</i>
prattle	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>Do you intend to keep up this childish prattle.</i>
prevaricate	Speak or act in an evasive way. <i>He seemed to prevaricate when journalists asked pointed questions.</i>
prevarication	Intentionally vague or ambiguous.
<u>slur</u>	Mark notes with a slur. <i>Essential attributes are being slurred over or ignored.</i>
smudge	Make a smudge on soil by smudging. <i>He had a smudge on his cheek.</i>
<u>stutter</u>	A tendency to stutter while speaking. <i>She flinched as a machine gun stuttered nearby.</i>
<u>unclear</u>	Poorly stated or described. <i>Their future remains unclear.</i>
<u>vague</u>	Thinking or communicating in an unfocused or imprecise way. <i>Saw a vague outline of a building through the fog.</i>
