### **Definitions of "Musician" as a noun**

- *Someone who plays a musical instrument (as a profession).*
- *A person who plays a musical instrument, especially as a profession, or is musically talented.*
- *Artist who composes or conducts music as a profession.*



## Synonyms of "Musician" as a noun (8 Words)

- accompanist** A person who provides a musical accompaniment to another musician or to a singer.
- conductor** The person who collects fares on a public conveyance.  
*He was appointed principal **conductor** of the Berlin Symphony Orchestra.*
- instrumentalist** A player of a musical instrument.  
*Is the skilled pop **instrumentalist** an endangered species.*
- maestro** A distinguished figure in any sphere.  
*A Vietnam vet turned movie **maestro**.*
- performer** An entertainer who performs a dramatic or musical work for an audience.  
*A circus **performer**.*
- player** A device for playing recorded music or video.  
*She knows Harry is something of a **player**.*

**soloist**

A musician or singer who performs a solo.  
*He appears as a concerto **soloist** with all the great British orchestras.*

**virtuoso**

A musician who is a consummate master of technique and artistry.  
***Virtuoso** guitar playing.*



**Usage Examples of "Musician" as a noun**

- *Aspiring rock and pop musicians.*
- *Your father was a fine musician.*



## Associations of "Musician" (30 Words)

### **acting**

The art or occupation of performing fictional roles in plays, films, or television.

*She studied **acting** in New York.*

### **actor**

A person whose profession is acting on the stage, in films, or on television.

*He s a principal **actor** in this affair.*

### **audition**

Perform an audition.

*I **auditioned** and was lucky enough to get the part.*

### **blues**

A piece of blues music.

*He had a bad case of the **blues**.*

### **comedian**

A professional performer who tells jokes and performs comical acts.

*A stand up **comedian**.*

<b>composer</b>	Someone who composes music as a profession. <i>Mozart was her favourite <b>composer</b>.</i>
<b>conductor</b>	A person who directs the performance of an orchestra or choir. <i>Most polymers are poor <b>conductors</b>.</i>
<b>entertainer</b>	A person, such as a singer, dancer, or comedian, whose job is to entertain others. <i>She is one of Hollywood s highest paid <b>entertainers</b>.</i>
<b>guitar</b>	A stringed instrument usually having six strings; played by strumming or plucking.
<b><u>instrument</u></b>	Equip with instruments for measuring recording or controlling. <i>He was a mere <b>instrument</b> acting under coercion.</i>
<b>instrumentalist</b>	An adherent of instrumentalism. <i>Is the skilled pop <b>instrumentalist</b> an endangered species.</i>
<b>lyricist</b>	A person who writes the words for songs.
<b>minstrel</b>	Celebrate by singing in the style of minstrels. <i>They listened to the <b>minstrels</b> singing songs of knightly prowess.</i>
<b>music</b>	Music the sounds produced by singers or musical instruments or reproductions of such sounds. <i>Couples were dancing to the <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>musicologist</b>	An expert in or student of music as an academic subject, as opposed to someone trained in performance or composition.
<b>novelist</b>	A writer of novels.
<b>percussion</b>	The act of playing a percussion instrument. <i><b>Percussion</b> instruments.</i>
<b>performance</b>	The action or process of performing a task or function. <i>It was a tremendous all round <b>performance</b> by Wigan.</i>
<b>performer</b>	An entertainer who performs a dramatic or musical work for an audience. <i>A circus <b>performer</b>.</i>
<b>pianist</b>	A person who plays the piano, especially professionally.
<b>piano</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music. <i>The <b>piano</b> passages in the composition.</i>
<b><u>singer</u></b>	A person who sings. <i>A pop <b>singer</b>.</i>
<b><u>solo</u></b>	A bid by which a player undertakes to win five tricks in solo whist. <i>His first ride in his aircraft would also be his first <b>solo</b>.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>He bought it for a <b>song</b>.</i>

<b>studio</b>	A studio flat. <i>The music department provided <b>studios</b> for their students.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>Some weeds produce chemicals that <b>stunt</b> the plant's growth.</i>
<b>theater</b>	The art of writing and producing plays. <i>He served in the Vietnam <b>theater</b> for three years.</i>
<b>vaudeville</b>	A light or comic stage play with interspersed songs. <i>A stage show with <b>vaudeville</b> acts and dancing girls.</i>
<b>violinist</b>	A musician who plays the violin. <i>The most renowned virtuoso <b>violinist</b> of his time.</i>
<b>woodwind</b>	Any wind instrument other than the brass instruments. <i>A <b>woodwind</b> instrument.</i>
