## Must as a Verb

#### Definitions of "Must" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "must" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Be obliged to; should (expressing necessity.*
- Used in ironic questions expressing irritation.
- Expressing insistence.
- Expressing an opinion about something that is logically very likely.







# Synonyms of "Must" as a verb (8 Words)

be compelled to	Spend or use time.
be obliged to	Spend or use time.
be required to	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be under an obligation to	Be identical or equivalent to.
have got to	Have as a feature.
have to	Organize or be responsible for.
need to	Require as useful, just, or proper.
should	Used to give or ask advice or suggestions. It is astonishing that we <b>should</b> find violence here.



### Usage Examples of "Must" as a verb

- You must be tired.
- There must be something wrong.



- You must try some of this fish.
- The essay mustn't be over 2,000 words.
- She said she must be going.
- If you must smoke you could at least go in the living room.
- You must show your ID card.
- Charlotte, must you put spanners in the works?



# Associations of "Must" (30 Words)

accountability	The fact or condition of being accountable; responsibility. Lack of <b>accountability</b> has corroded public respect for business and political leaders.
compel	Force to come or go in a particular direction. <i>His striking appearance <b>compel</b>led attention</i> .
<u>compulsory</u>	Involving or exercising compulsion; coercive. <b>Compulsory</b> military service.



demand	The act of demanding. I <b>demand</b> an explanation.
duty	A payment levied on the import, export, manufacture, or sale of goods. A strong sense of <b>duty</b> .
essential	Basic and fundamental. <i>He was quick to grasp the <b>essential</b>s of an opponent s argument.</i>
flatly	Showing little interest or emotion. I applied the paint <b>flatly</b> .
impel	Drive, force, or urge (someone) to do something. A lack of equality <b>impel</b> led the oppressed to fight.
indispensability	The quality possessed by something that you cannot possibly do without.
<u>indispensable</u>	Absolutely necessary; vitally necessary. <i>He made himself <b>indispensable</b> to the parish priest.</i>
ineluctable	Unable to be resisted or avoided; inescapable. An <b>ineluctable</b> destiny.
<u>inevitable</u>	Incapable of being avoided or prevented. The <b>inevitable</b> changes of the seasons.
<u>inevitably</u>	In such a manner as could not be otherwise. <b>Inevitably</b> some details are already out of date.
<u>integral</u>	The result of a mathematical integration F x is the integral of f x if dF dx f x. Systematic training should be <b>integral</b> to library management.
mandatory	A territory surrendered by Turkey or Germany after World War I and put under the tutelage of some other European power until they are able to stand by themselves. <i>He did not want the guidelines to be mandatory.</i>
<u>necessarily</u>	In such a manner as could not be otherwise. The prognosis can <b>necessarily</b> be only an educated guess.
necessary	(of an agent) having no independent volition. They granted the <b>necessary</b> planning permission.
need	Have need of. <b>Need</b> I say more.
obligate	Commit (assets) as security. <i>Obligate</i> money.
<u>obligated</u>	Caused by law or conscience to follow a certain course. Was <b>obligated</b> to pay off the student loan.



obligatory	Required by obligation or compulsion or convention. An <b>obligatory</b> contribution.
oblige	Be indebted or grateful. My father had <b>oblige</b> d me to the improvement of my stock.
<u>perfunctory</u>	Hasty and without attention to detail; not thorough. <i>Perfunctory courtesy</i> .
<u>prerequisite</u>	Something that is required in advance. Latin was a <b>prerequisite</b> for admission.
require	Require as useful just or proper. It would have <b>require</b> d much research to produce a comprehensive list.
required	Required by rule. <i>Required</i> reading.
requisite	Made necessary by particular circumstances or regulations. A place where the <b>requisite</b> s of water fuel and fodder can be obtained.
<u>unavoidable</u>	Impossible to avoid or evade. The natural and <b>unavoidable</b> consequences of growing old.
unconditionally	Without conditions or limits. To be loved <b>unconditionally</b> is to be loved for who we are.
<u>vital</u>	Performing an essential function in the living body. The loss of <b>vital</b> heat in shock.
