- freak of nature** Someone who is so ardently devoted to something that it resembles an addiction.
- monster** An inhumanly cruel or wicked person.
*He was an unfeeling treacherous **monster**.*
- monstrosity** A thing, especially a building, which is very large and unsightly.
*Had my tone of reason in the face of **monstrosity** finally registered.*

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| <u>mutation</u> | A distinct form resulting from genetic mutation. <i>His first novel went through several mutations.</i> |
| oddy | A strange or peculiar person or thing. <i>She was regarded as a bit of an oddy.</i> |
| sport | Someone who engages in sports. <i>I have heard there is good sport to be had in Buttermere.</i> |
| <u>variant</u> | Something a little different from others of the same type. <i>Clinically distinct variants of malaria.</i> |
| variation | A version of a theme, modified in melody, rhythm, harmony, or ornamentation, so as to present it in a new but still recognizable form. <i>Hurling is an Irish variation of hockey.</i> |

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| abruptly | Steeply; precipitously. <i>The film ends rather abruptly.</i> |
| <u>alter</u> | Make an alteration to. <i>This dress needs to be altered.</i> |
| <u>alteration</u> | The act of making something different (as e.g. the size of a garment). <i>Alterations had to be made.</i> |
| change | Undergo a change become different in essence losing one's or its original nature. <i>Electronic cigarettes use liquid nicotine which changes into vapour when heated.</i> |

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| changed | Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism. <i>A greatly changed country after the war.</i> |
| correction | A change that rectifies an error or inaccuracy. <i>I checked the typing for errors and sent it back for correction.</i> |

| <u>deformed</u> | So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly. <i>His deformed hands.</i> |
| disfigure | Mar or spoil the appearance of. <i>Litter disfigures the countryside.</i> |
| <u>distorted</u> | Affected by electrical distortion. <i>Distorted guitars.</i> |
| <u>error</u> | A measure of the estimated difference between the observed or calculated value of a quantity and its true value. <i>Spelling errors.</i> |
| failing | Below acceptable in performance. <i>Received failing grades.</i> |
| flaw | Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>There were fundamental flaws in the case for reforming local government.</i> |
| <u>flawed</u> | Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection. <i>A flawed hero.</i> |
| mistake | To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>Don't mistake her for her twin sister.</i> |
| <u>modification</u> | The act of making something different (as e.g. the size of a garment). <i>The neighborhood had undergone few modifications since his last visit years ago.</i> |
| modified | Mediocre. <i>The performance of the modified aircraft was much improved.</i> |
| mutate | Change in form or nature. <i>Cells mutate.</i> |

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| phenotype | The set of observable characteristics of an individual resulting from the interaction of its genotype with the environment. |
| revision | A revised edition or form of something. <i>The scheme needs drastic revision.</i> |
| stumble | An unsteady uneven gait. <i>She stumbled over the words.</i> |
| suddenly | Happening unexpectedly. <i>He stopped suddenly.</i> |
| transformation | A metamorphosis during the life cycle of an animal. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i> |
| transformed | Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the transformed landscape.</i> |
| <u>variant</u> | Something a little different from others of the same type. <i>A variant spelling.</i> |
| variation | Any perturbation of the mean motion or orbit of a planet or satellite (especially a perturbation of the earth's moon). <i>Who is responsible for these variations in taxation.</i> |
| <u>varied</u> | Incorporating a number of different types or elements; showing variation or variety. <i>A long and varied career.</i> |
