<b>freak</b>	Someone who is so ardently devoted to something that it resembles an addiction. <i>A <b>freak</b> red cabbage with side shoots coming from the leaves.</i>
<b>freak of nature</b>	A person or animal that is markedly unusual or deformed. (in an insect or amphibian) the process of transformation from an immature form to an adult form in two or more distinct stages. <i>In insects with a complete <b>metamorphosis</b> the wings arise from thickenings of the epidermis.</i>
<b><u>metamorphosis</u></b>	
<b><u>modification</u></b>	The action of modifying something. <i>The parts supplied should fit with little or no <b>modification</b>.</i>
<b>monster</b>	Someone or something that is abnormally large and powerful. <i>He was an unfeeling treacherous <b>monster</b>.</i>
<b><u>monstrosity</u></b>	A person or animal that is markedly unusual or deformed. <i>They regarded the atom bomb as a <b>monstrosity</b>.</i>
<b><u>mutant</u></b>	A mutant form. <i>Frequently only a small percentage of the offspring of <b>mutants</b> resemble their parents.</i>
<b>sea change</b>	Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume.
<b>sport</b>	Someone who engages in sports. <i>A poor <b>sport</b>.</i>
<b>transfiguration</b>	The Church festival commemorating Christ's transfiguration held on 6 August. <i>In this light the junk undergoes a <b>transfiguration</b> it shines.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	A metamorphosis during the life cycle of an animal. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transmutation</b>	The supposed alchemical process of changing base metals into gold. <i>The <b>transmutation</b> of the political economy of the post war years was complete.</i>
<b><u>variant</u></b>	Something a little different from others of the same type. <i>A <b>variant</b> of the same word.</i>

**variation**

A change in the value of a function due to small changes in the values of its argument or arguments.

*He makes the preparation for his **variation** with utmost care and accuracy.*

<b>bunk</b>	Provide with a bunk. <i>They <b>bunk</b> together in the dormitory.</i>
<b>chromosome</b>	A threadlike structure of nucleic acids and protein found in the nucleus of most living cells, carrying genetic information in the form of genes. <i>Humans have 22 <b>chromosome</b> pairs plus two sex <b>chromosomes</b>.</i>
<b>clone</b>	Propagate an organism or cell as a clone. <i>Guitarists who are labelled Hendrix <b>clones</b>.</i>
<b>dna</b>	(biochemistry) a long linear polymer found in the nucleus of a cell and formed from nucleotides and shaped like a double helix; associated with the transmission of genetic information.
<b>eugenics</b>	The study of how to arrange reproduction within a human population to increase the occurrence of heritable characteristics regarded as desirable. Developed largely by Sir Francis Galton as a method of improving the human race eugenics was increasingly discredited as unscientific and racially biased during the 20th century especially after the adoption of its doctrines by the Nazis in order to justify their treatment of Jews disabled people and other minority groups.
<b>fingerprint</b>	Take an impression of a person's fingerprints. <i>The faint chemical <b>fingerprint</b> of plastic explosives.</i>
<b>fool</b>	Foolish silly. <i>He <b>fooled</b> nightclub managers into believing he was a successful businessman.</i>
<b>gene</b>	Genetics a segment of DNA that is involved in producing a polypeptide chain it can include regions preceding and following the coding DNA as well as introns between the exons it is considered a unit of heredity. <i><b>Genes</b> were formerly called factors.</i>
<b>gibberish</b>	Unintelligible or meaningless speech or writing; nonsense. <i>He talks <b>gibberish</b>.</i>
<b>hereditary</b>	(of a set) defined such that every element which has a given relation to a member of the set is also a member of the set. <i>A <b>hereditary</b> peer.</i>
<b>heredity</b>	The passing on of physical or mental characteristics genetically from one generation to another. <i>He wears a Cossack tunic to emphasize his Russian <b>heredity</b>.</i>
<b>histocompatibility</b>	Condition in which the cells of one tissue can survive in the presence of cells of another tissue. <i>A successful graft or transplant requires a high degree of <b>histocompatibility</b>.</i>

<b>homologous</b>	(of organs) similar in position, structure, and evolutionary origin but not necessarily in function. <i>A seal's flipper is <b>homologous</b> with the human arm.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking sense or clear, sound reasoning. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<u><b>irrational</b></u>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i><b>Irrational</b> animals.</i>
<b>metabolic</b>	Undergoing metamorphosis. <i>A <b>metabolic</b> disorder.</i>
<u><b>modification</b></u>	The grammatical relation that exists when a word qualifies the meaning of the phrase. <i>The neighborhood had undergone few <b>modifications</b> since his last visit years ago.</i>
<u><b>mumble</b></u>	Bite or chew (something) with toothless gums or without making much use of the teeth. <i>She <b>mumbled</b> a piece of black bread.</i>
<u><b>nonsense</b></u>	Used to show strong disagreement. <i>He was talking absolute <b>nonsense</b>.</i>
<b>prattle</b>	Idle or foolish and irrelevant talk. <i>She began to <b>prattle</b> on about her visit to the dentist.</i>
<b>protein</b>	Proteins collectively especially as a dietary component. <i>A diet high in <b>protein</b>.</i>
<b>recessive</b>	A recessive trait or gene. <i><b>Recessive</b> stress is characteristic of British English.</i>
<b>reproducible</b>	Able to be reproduced or copied. <i>Astonishingly <b>reproducible</b> results can be obtained.</i>
<b>ridiculous</b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>That <b>ridiculous</b> tartan cap.</i>
<b>silly</b>	Used to convey that an activity or process has been engaged in to such a degree that someone is no longer capable of thinking or acting sensibly. <i>A <b>silly</b> idea.</i>
<u><b>superstitious</b></u>	Having or showing a belief in superstitions. <i>Finally realized that the horror he felt was <b>superstitious</b> in origin.</i>
