### cavil

An evasion of the point of an argument by raising irrelevant distinctions or objections.

### complaint

A statement that something is unsatisfactory or unacceptable.

*I have no **complaints** about the hotel.*

### demur

The action of objecting to or hesitating over something.

*They accepted this ruling without **demur**.*

### exception

An instance that does not conform to a rule or generalization.

*He always plays top tunes and tonight was no **exception**.*

<b><u><a href="#">grievance</a></u></b>	A complaint about a (real or imaginary) wrong that causes resentment and is grounds for action. <i>He was nursing a <b>grievance</b>.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">grouse</a></u></b>	The flesh of the grouse as food.
<b><u><a href="#">grumble</a></u></b>	A loud low dull continuous noise. <i>In the distance I heard a <b>grumble</b> of thunder.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">grumbling</a></u></b>	A loud low dull continuous noise. <i>Despite his <b>grumbling</b> he tried to exercise every day.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">moan</a></u></b>	A sound resembling a human moan. <i>The <b>moan</b> of the wind in the chimneys.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">murmur</a></u></b>	A low continuous background noise. <i>She had been born with a heart <b>murmur</b>.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">murmuration</a></u></b>	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>The <b>murmuration</b> of a flock of warblers.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">murmuring</a></u></b>	An abnormal sound of the heart; sometimes a sign of abnormal function of the heart valves. <i><b>Murmurings</b> of discontent from the fans.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">mussitation</a></u></b>	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech.
<b><u><a href="#">muttering</a></u></b>	A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>There were disloyal <b>mutterings</b> about his leadership.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">objection</a></u></b>	An expression or feeling of disapproval or opposition; a reason for disagreeing. <i>His view is open to <b>objection</b>.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">outcry</a></u></b>	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. <i>An <b>outcry</b> of spontaneous passion.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">protest</a></u></b>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>Two senior scientists resigned in <b>protest</b>.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">protestation</a></u></b>	A formal and solemn declaration of objection. <i>He was warned by the referee for his loud <b>protestations</b>.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">quibble</a></u></b>	A slight objection or criticism about a trivial matter. <i>The only <b>quibble</b> about this book is the price.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">remonstrance</a></u></b>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest. <i>He shut his ears to any <b>remonstrance</b>.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">remonstration</a></u></b>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest.

An individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language.

A **sound** studio.

**word**

A command password or signal.

Someone gave me the **word** to start playing.

## Mutter as a Verb

### Definitions of "Mutter" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "mutter" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice.*
- *Talk or grumble in secret or in private.*
- *Say something in a low or barely audible voice, especially in dissatisfaction or irritation.*
- *Make complaining remarks or noises under one's breath.*

### Synonyms of "Mutter" as a verb (18 Words)

**bleat**

Speak or complain in a weak, querulous, or foolish way.  
*The lambs were **bleating**.*

**carp**

Raise trivial objections.

**complain**

Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness.  
*Let the warbling flute **complain**.*

**croak**

Of a person make a sound similar to a croak when speaking or laughing.  
*Without **croaking** it may be observed that our government is upon a dangerous experiment.*

**gnarl**

Make complaining remarks or noises under one's breath.  
*The wind has **gnarled** this old tree.*

**grouse**

Hunt grouse.

**grumble**

(of an internal organ) give intermittent discomfort.  
*Stones **grumbled** down the cliff.*

**maunder**

Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice.  
*He **maunders** through the bank composing his thoughts.*

**moan**

Make a sound resembling a human moan.  
*Just then their patient **moaned** and opened his eyes.*

**mumble**

Grind with the gums; chew without teeth and with great difficulty.  
*The old man had no teeth left and **mumbled** his food.*

**murmur**

Speak softly or indistinctly.  
*How interesting he **murmured** quietly.*

**mussitate**

Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice.

**speak in an undertone**

Express in speech.

**speak in hushed tones**

Exchange thoughts; talk with.

**speaking sotto voce**

Use language.

**talk under one's breath**

Exchange thoughts; talk with.

**whine**

Make a high-pitched, screeching noise.  
*The dog **whined** and scratched at the back door.*

**whisper**

Be rumoured.  
*He managed to **whisper** a faint goodbye.*

## Usage Examples of "Mutter" as a verb

- 'I knew she was a troublemaker,' Rebecca muttered.

- *He muttered something under his breath.*
- *Back-benchers were muttering about the next reshuffle.*

## Associations of "Mutter" (30 Words)

<b>babble</b>	Gibberish resembling the sounds of a baby. <i>Her soft voice stopped his <b>babble</b>.</i>
<b>babbling</b>	Talking rapidly and continuously in a foolish, excited, or incomprehensible way. <i>The <b>babbling</b> of a nearby river.</i>
<b>chatter</b>	Make noise as if chattering away. <i>Parrots <b>chattered</b> in the sunlight.</i>
<b>complain</b>	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>My mother <b>complains</b> all day.</i>
<b><u>equivocate</u></b>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>The government have <b>equivocated</b> too often in the past.</i>
<b>equivocation</b>	Falsification by means of vague or ambiguous language. <i>I say this without <b>equivocation</b>.</i>
<b><u>evasive</u></b>	Avoiding or escaping from difficulty or danger especially enemy fire. <i>Pilots are taught to take <b>evasive</b> action.</i>
<b>gibber</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>They shrieked and <b>gibbered</b> as flames surrounded them.</i>
<b>gibberish</b>	Unintelligible talking. <i>He talks <b>gibberish</b>.</i>
<b>gripe</b>	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>My only <b>gripe</b> is the size of the page numbers.</i>
<b>grouch</b>	A habitually grumpy person. <i>Rock s foremost poet and ill mannered <b>grouch</b>.</i>
<b><u>grumble</u></b>	Make a low rumbling sound. <i>In the distance I heard a <b>grumble</b> of thunder.</i>
<b><u>impediment</u></b>	Any structure that makes progress difficult. <i>A serious <b>impediment</b> to scientific progress.</i>
<b><u>incoherent</u></b>	Not logical or internally consistent. <i>The film is ideologically <b>incoherent</b>.</i>
<b>maunder</b>	Talk in a rambling manner. <i>Dennis <b>maundered</b> on about the wine.</i>

<b><u>mumble</u></b>	A soft indistinct utterance. <i>Sorry she <b>mumbled</b>.</i>
<b><u>murmur</u></b>	Make a low continuous sound. <i>Now they do not simply <b>murmur</b> against him they quarrel noisily with him.</i>
<b>muttering</b>	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>There were disloyal <b>mutterings</b> about his leadership.</i>
<b><u>nonsense</u></b>	Ornamental objects of no great value. <i>He was talking absolute <b>nonsense</b>.</i>
<b>palaver</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>We get endless <b>palaver</b> sometimes in blank verse.</i>
<b>palter</b>	Trifle with. <i>This great work should not be <b>paltered</b> with.</i>
<b>prattle</b>	Foolish or inconsequential talk. <i>Do you intend to keep up this childish <b>prattle</b>.</i>
<b>prevaricate</b>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>He seemed to <b>prevaricate</b> when journalists asked pointed questions.</i>
<b><u>rumble</u></b>	Make a continuous deep, resonant sound. <i>A <b>rumble</b> between two gangs of street hoodlums.</i>
<b><u>slur</u></b>	Of words or speech be slurred. <i>His speech was beginning to <b>slur</b>.</i>
<b>speak</b>	Express in speech. <i>Twenty thousand people attended to hear him <b>speak</b>.</i>
<b>stammer</b>	A tendency to stammer. <i>He turned red and started <b>stammering</b>.</i>
<b><u>stutter</u></b>	A tendency to stutter while speaking. <i>The child was <b>stuttering</b> in fright.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Persuade or cause someone to do something by talking. <i>Peace <b>talks</b>.</i>
<b><u>whisper</u></b>	A soft or confidential tone of voice a whispered word or phrase. <i><b>Whispers</b> of a blossoming romance.</i>
