Synonyms of "Mutter" as a noun (24 Words)

argument

An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and the value is y .

*It was a strong **argument** that his hypothesis was true.*

cavil

An evasion of the point of an argument by raising irrelevant distinctions or objections.

complaint

A statement that something is unsatisfactory or unacceptable.

*I have no **complaints** about the hotel.*

demur

The action of objecting to or hesitating over something.

*They accepted this ruling without **demur**.*

exception

An instance that does not conform to a rule or generalization.

*He always plays top tunes and tonight was no **exception**.*

<u>grievance</u>	A complaint about a (real or imaginary) wrong that causes resentment and is grounds for action. <i>He was nursing a grievance.</i>
<u>grouse</u>	The flesh of the grouse as food.
<u>grumble</u>	A loud low dull continuous noise. <i>In the distance I heard a grumble of thunder.</i>
<u>grumbling</u>	A loud low dull continuous noise. <i>Despite his grumbling he tried to exercise every day.</i>
<u>moan</u>	A sound resembling a human moan. <i>The moan of the wind in the chimneys.</i>
<u>murmur</u>	A low continuous background noise. <i>She had been born with a heart murmur.</i>
<u>murmuration</u>	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>The murmuration of a flock of warblers.</i>
<u>murmuring</u>	An abnormal sound of the heart; sometimes a sign of abnormal function of the heart valves. <i>Murmurings of discontent from the fans.</i>
<u>mussitation</u>	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech.
<u>muttering</u>	A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>There were disloyal mutterings about his leadership.</i>
<u>objection</u>	An expression or feeling of disapproval or opposition; a reason for disagreeing. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
<u>outcry</u>	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. <i>An outcry of spontaneous passion.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>Two senior scientists resigned in protest.</i>
<u>protestation</u>	A formal and solemn declaration of objection. <i>He was warned by the referee for his loud protestations.</i>
<u>quibble</u>	A slight objection or criticism about a trivial matter. <i>The only quibble about this book is the price.</i>
<u>remonstrance</u>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest. <i>He shut his ears to any remonstrance.</i>
<u>remonstration</u>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest.

sound

An individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language.

A **sound** studio.

word

A command password or signal.

Someone gave me the **word** to start playing.

Definitions of "Mutter" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "mutter" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice.*
- *Talk or grumble in secret or in private.*
- *Say something in a low or barely audible voice, especially in dissatisfaction or irritation.*
- *Make complaining remarks or noises under one's breath.*

Synonyms of "Mutter" as a verb (18 Words)

bleat	Speak or complain in a weak, querulous, or foolish way. <i>The lambs were bleating.</i>
carp	Raise trivial objections.
complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Let the warbling flute complain.</i>
croak	Of a person make a sound similar to a croak when speaking or laughing. <i>Without croaking it may be observed that our government is upon a dangerous experiment.</i>
gnarl	Make complaining remarks or noises under one's breath. <i>The wind has gnarled this old tree.</i>
grouse	Hunt grouse.
grumble	(of an internal organ) give intermittent discomfort. <i>Stones grumbled down the cliff.</i>
maunder	Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice. <i>He maunders through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>
moan	Make a sound resembling a human moan. <i>Just then their patient moaned and opened his eyes.</i>
mumble	Grind with the gums; chew without teeth and with great difficulty. <i>The old man had no teeth left and mumbled his food.</i>
murmur	Speak softly or indistinctly. <i>How interesting he murmured quietly.</i>
mussitate	Talk indistinctly; usually in a low voice.
speak in an undertone	Express in speech.
speak in hushed tones	Exchange thoughts; talk with.
speak sotto voce	Use language.
talk under one's breath	Exchange thoughts; talk with.
whine	Make a high-pitched, screeching noise. <i>The dog whined and scratched at the back door.</i>
whisper	Be rumoured. <i>He managed to whisper a faint goodbye.</i>

- 'I knew she was a troublemaker,' Rebecca muttered.

- *He muttered something under his breath.*
- *Back-benchers were muttering about the next reshuffle.*

Associations of "Mutter" (30 Words)

babble	Gibberish resembling the sounds of a baby. <i>Her soft voice stopped his babble.</i>
babbling	Talking rapidly and continuously in a foolish, excited, or incomprehensible way. <i>The babbling of a nearby river.</i>
chatter	Make noise as if chattering away. <i>Parrots chattered in the sunlight.</i>
complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>My mother complains all day.</i>
<u>equivocate</u>	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>The government have equivocated too often in the past.</i>
equivocation	Falsification by means of vague or ambiguous language. <i>I say this without equivocation.</i>
<u>evasive</u>	Avoiding or escaping from difficulty or danger especially enemy fire. <i>Pilots are taught to take evasive action.</i>
gibber	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>They shrieked and gibbered as flames surrounded them.</i>
gibberish	Unintelligible talking. <i>He talks gibberish.</i>
gripe	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>My only gripe is the size of the page numbers.</i>
grouch	A habitually grumpy person. <i>Rock s foremost poet and ill mannered grouch.</i>
<u>grumble</u>	Make a low rumbling sound. <i>In the distance I heard a grumble of thunder.</i>
<u>impediment</u>	Any structure that makes progress difficult. <i>A serious impediment to scientific progress.</i>
<u>incoherent</u>	Not logical or internally consistent. <i>The film is ideologically incoherent.</i>
maunder	Talk in a rambling manner. <i>Dennis maundered on about the wine.</i>

<u>mumble</u>	A soft indistinct utterance. <i>Sorry she mumbled.</i>
<u>murmur</u>	Make a low continuous sound. <i>Now they do not simply murmur against him they quarrel noisily with him.</i>
muttering	A low continuous indistinct sound; often accompanied by movement of the lips without the production of articulate speech. <i>There were disloyal mutterings about his leadership.</i>
<u>nonsense</u>	Ornamental objects of no great value. <i>He was talking absolute nonsense.</i>
palaver	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>We get endless palaver sometimes in blank verse.</i>
palter	Trifle with. <i>This great work should not be paltered with.</i>
prattle	Foolish or inconsequential talk. <i>Do you intend to keep up this childish prattle.</i>
prevaricate	Be deliberately ambiguous or unclear in order to mislead or withhold information. <i>He seemed to prevaricate when journalists asked pointed questions.</i>
<u>rumble</u>	Make a continuous deep, resonant sound. <i>A rumble between two gangs of street hoodlums.</i>
<u>slur</u>	Of words or speech be slurred. <i>His speech was beginning to slur.</i>
speak	Express in speech. <i>Twenty thousand people attended to hear him speak.</i>
stammer	A tendency to stammer. <i>He turned red and started stammering.</i>
<u>stutter</u>	A tendency to stutter while speaking. <i>The child was stuttering in fright.</i>
talk	Persuade or cause someone to do something by talking. <i>Peace talks.</i>
<u>whisper</u>	A soft or confidential tone of voice a whispered word or phrase. <i>Whispers of a blossoming romance.</i>
