Mutual as an Adjective

Definitions of "Mutual" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “mutual” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Concerning each of two or more persons or things; especially given or done in return.*
- *(of a feeling or action) experienced or done by each of two or more parties towards the other or others.*
- *Held in common by two or more parties.*
- *(of two or more people) having the same specified relationship to each other.*
- *Denoting a building society or insurance company owned by its members and dividing some or all of its profits between them.*
- *Common to or shared by two or more parties.*



Synonyms of "Mutual" as an adjective (6 Words)

common	Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual. <i>She s so common.</i>
<u>complementary</u>	Relating to complementary medicine. <i>They had different but complementary skills.</i>
correlative	(of words such as neither and nor) corresponding to each other and regularly used together. <i>Rights whether moral or legal can involve correlative duties.</i>
interactive	Allowing a two-way flow of information between a computer and a computer-user; responding to a user's input. <i>A fully interactive map of the area.</i>
<u>interchangeable</u>	(mathematics, logic) such that the arguments or roles can be interchanged. <i>Interchangeable parts.</i>

reciprocal

Of or relating to the multiplicative inverse of a quantity or function.
Reciprocal trade.

- *His contract with City has been terminated by mutual consent.*
- *The mutual interests of management and labor.*
- *Mutual respect.*
- *A partnership based on mutual respect and understanding.*
- *My father hated him from the start and the feeling was mutual.*
- *The world's oldest mutual insurance company.*
- *Scottish Amicable may switch from mutual to plc status.*
- *We were introduced by a mutual friend.*



Associations of "Mutual" (30 Words)

affiliated

Being joined in close association.

*Microsoft and its **affiliated** companies.*

bilateral

Having two sides or parts.

***Bilateral** hearing is essential for sound location.*

both

Used before the first of two alternatives to emphasize that the statement being made applies to each (the other alternative being introduced by 'and).

*Studies of zebra finches **both** in the wild and in captivity.*

common

Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual.

*The **common** people in those days suffered greatly.*

communal

(of conflict) between different communities, especially those having different religions or ethnic origins.

*A **communal** settlement in which all earnings and food were shared.*

<u>complementary</u>	Relating to complementary medicine. <i>They had different but complementary skills.</i>
connection	A link between electrical components or pipes. <i>The primitive Methodists broke with the Wesleyan connection in 1810.</i>
cordiality	A cordial disposition.
correlative	A word or concept that has a mutual relationship with another word or concept. <i>The child's right to education is a correlative of the parent's duty to send the child to school.</i>
<u>friendship</u>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>This is an ideal group for finding support and friendship.</i>
hinge	Of a door or part of a structure hang and turn on a hinge. <i>The future of the industry could hinge on the outcome of next month's election.</i>
inborn	Existing from birth. <i>People think doctors have inborn compassion.</i>
inherence	The state of inhering; the state of being a fixed characteristic. <i>The inherence of polysemy in human language.</i>
interaction	The transfer of energy between elementary particles or between an elementary particle and a field or between fields; mediated by gauge bosons. <i>He built tools to analyse user interactions on social networks.</i>
interactive	Allowing a two-way flow of information between a computer and a computer-user; responding to a user's input. <i>A fully interactive map of the area.</i>
interconnect	Be interwoven or interconnected. <i>The bones are interconnected via the muscle.</i>
<u>interdependent</u>	(of two or more people or things) dependent on each other. <i>We in Europe are all increasingly interdependent.</i>
joint	Fit as if by joints. <i>A joint winner.</i>
<u>link</u>	Create a hyperlink between web pages or hypertext documents. <i>She linked up with an artistic group.</i>
linked	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
multilateral	Having members or contributors from several groups, especially several different countries. <i>Multilateral nuclear disarmament.</i>

mutuality	<p>The sharing of a feeling, action, or relationship between two or more parties. <i>Co operation has been based on the principle of mutuality.</i></p>
mutually	<p>With mutual action; in a mutual relationship. <i>Adoption and fostering are not necessarily mutually exclusive alternatives.</i></p>
rapprochement	<p>A relationship of mutual understanding or trust and agreement between people. <i>There was little rapprochement between them.</i></p>
<u>reciprocal</u>	<p>Mathematics one of a pair of numbers whose product is 1 the reciprocal of 2 3 is 3 2 the multiplicative inverse of 7 is 1 7. <i>Risk is the reciprocal of safety.</i></p>
<u>reciprocity</u>	<p>The practice of exchanging things with others for mutual benefit, especially privileges granted by one country or organization to another. <i>The Community intends to start discussions on reciprocity with third countries.</i></p>
related	<p>Being connected either logically or causally or by shared characteristics. <i>Painting and the related arts.</i></p>
relation	<p>A person related by blood or marriage. <i>His attorney argued for the relation back of the amended complaint to the time the initial complaint was filed.</i></p>
<u>socialization</u>	<p>The action of establishing on a socialist basis. <i>There was too much socialization with the enlisted men.</i></p>
together	<p>So as to touch or combine. <i>They split up after ten years together.</i></p>
