<u>sea</u>	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>A ban on dumping radioactive wastes in the sea.</i>
<u>swarm</u>	A large number of minor celestial objects occurring together in space, especially a dense shower of meteors. <i>A swarm of journalists.</i>
ten thousand	One of four playing cards in a deck with ten pips on the face.
throng	A large, densely packed crowd of people or animals. <i>He pushed his way through the throng.</i>

unlimited	(of a problem) having an infinite number of solutions. <i>Offshore reserves of gas and oil are not unlimited.</i>
unnumberable	Incapable of being numbered; innumerable.
unnumbered	Too numerous to be counted. <i>She had drunk the last of her unnumbered cups of tea.</i>
unnumerable	Incapable of being numbered; innumerable.
untold	Too much to be measured. <i>No event however boring is left untold.</i>
various	Having or showing different properties or qualities. <i>Various experiments have failed to disprove the theory.</i>
