<b>augur</b>	(in ancient Rome) a religious official who observed natural signs, especially the behaviour of birds, interpreting these as an indication of divine approval or disapproval of a proposed action.
<b>clairvoyant</b>	Someone who has the power of clairvoyance. <i>She has had a message from a <b>clairvoyant</b> that her son is alive and well.</i>
<b>crystal gazer</b>	A crystalline element used as a component in various electronic devices.
<b>diviner</b>	Someone who claims to discover hidden knowledge with the aid of supernatural powers.
<b>oracle</b>	A response or message given by an oracle especially an ambiguous one. <i>He reigned supreme as the Colonial Office's <b>oracle</b> on Africa.</i>
<b>prognosticator</b>	Someone who makes predictions of the future (usually on the basis of special knowledge). <i>There are many <b>prognosticators</b> predicting the worst.</i>



**prophet**

In Jewish use one of the three canonical divisions of the Hebrew Bible distinguished from the Law and the Hagiographa and comprising the books of Joshua Judges Samuel Kings Jeremiah Ezekiel Isaiah and the twelve minor prophets.

*He is repeatedly hailed as a **prophet** of modernism.*

**prophetess**

A female prophet.

**psychic**

A person considered or claiming to have psychic powers a medium.

*Pier end palmists and fake **psychics**.*

**religious mystic**

A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.

**seer**

A person who sees something specified.

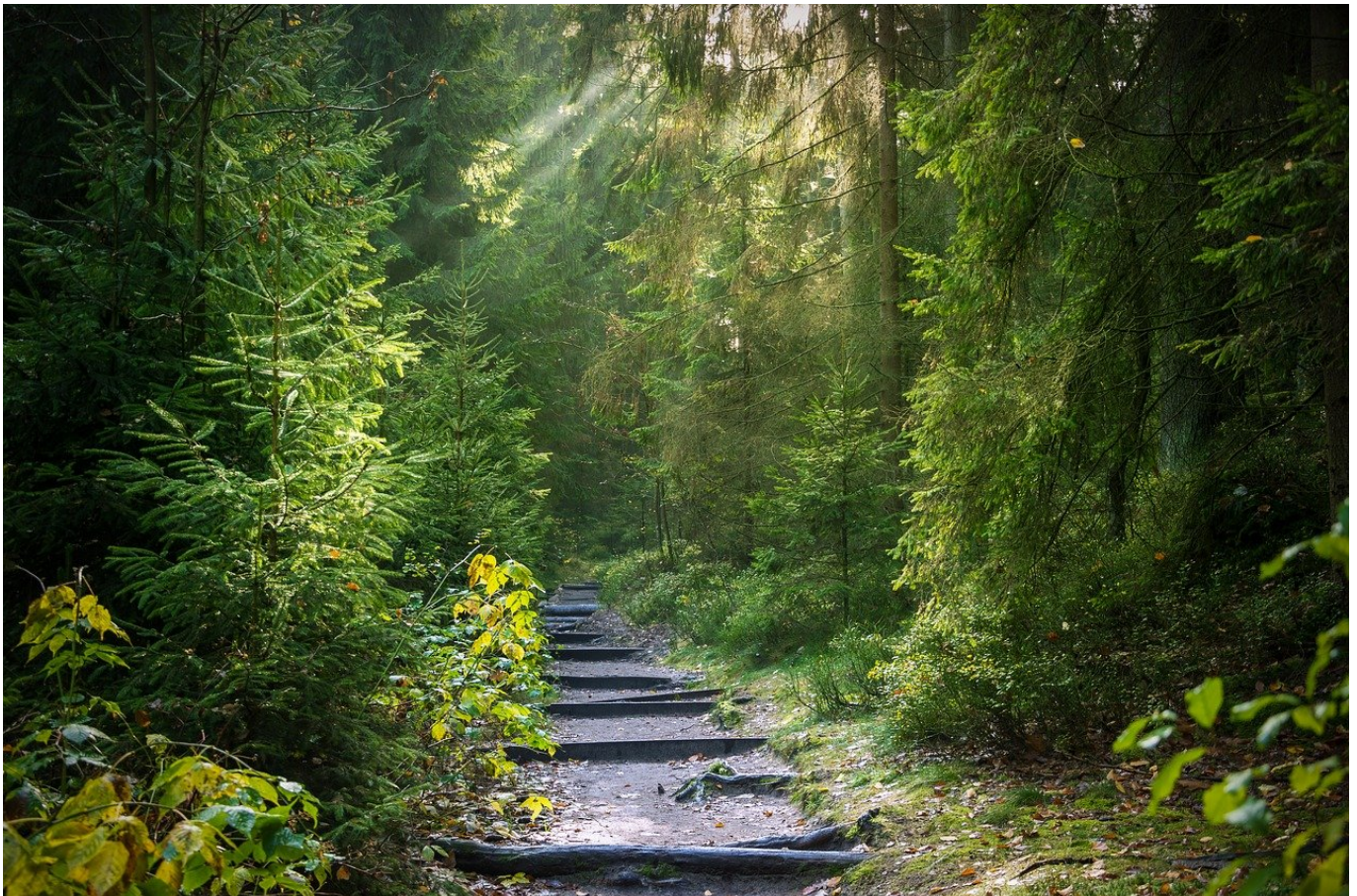
*A **seer** of the future.*

**sibyl**

(ancient Rome) a woman who was regarded as an oracle or prophet.

**soothsayer**

Someone who makes predictions of the future (usually on the basis of special knowledge).

<b>abstruse</b>	Difficult to penetrate; incomprehensible to one of ordinary understanding or knowledge. <i>An <b>abstruse</b> philosophical inquiry.</i>
<b><u>arcane</u></b>	Requiring secret or mysterious knowledge. <i><b>Arcane</b> procedures for electing people.</i>
<b>cabbalistic</b>	Relating to or associated with mystical interpretation or esoteric doctrine.
<b>concealed</b>	Hidden on any grounds for any motive. <i>A <b>concealed</b> weapon.</i>
<b><u>cryptic</u></b>	Having a meaning that is mysterious or obscure. <i>A <b>cryptic</b> note.</i>
<b>enigmatic</b>	Resembling an oracle in obscurity of thought. <i>I didn't grasp the meaning of that <b>enigmatic</b> comment until much later.</i>
<b>esoteric</b>	Confined to and understandable by only an enlightened inner circle. <i><b>Esoteric</b> philosophical debates.</i>

<b><u>hidden</u></b>	Designed to elude detection. <i>A <b>hidden</b> cave.</i>
<b>ineffable</b>	Not to be uttered. <i>The <b>ineffable</b> name of the Deity.</i>
<b><u>inexplicable</u></b>	Incapable of being explained or accounted for. <i>Left the house at three in the morning for <b>inexplicable</b> reasons.</i>
<b>inscrutable</b>	Of an obscure nature- Rachel. <i>Guy looked blankly <b>inscrutable</b>.</i>
<b><u>metaphysical</u></b>	Of or characteristic of the metaphysical poets. <i>An empiricist rather than a <b>metaphysical</b> view of law.</i>
<b>mysterious</b>	Of an obscure nature. <i>A dark <b>mysterious</b> windowless building.</i>
<b><u>mystical</u></b>	Concerned with the soul or the spirit, rather than with material things. <i>The <b>mystical</b> city of Kathmandu.</i>
<b><u>obscure</u></b>	Not important or well known. <i>An <b>obscure</b> turn of phrase.</i>
<b><u>occult</u></b>	(of blood) abnormally present, e.g. in faeces, but detectable only chemically or microscopically. <i><b>Occult</b> lore.</i>
<b>orphic</b>	Having an import not apparent to the senses nor obvious to the intelligence; beyond ordinary understanding.
<b>paranormal</b>	Not in accordance with scientific laws. <i>What seemed to be <b>paranormal</b> manifestations.</i>
<b>preternatural</b>	Beyond what is normal or natural. <i>Beyond his <b>preternatural</b> affability there is some acid and some steel.</i>
<b>recondite</b>	Difficult to penetrate; incomprehensible to one of ordinary understanding or knowledge. <i>Some <b>recondite</b> problem in historiography.</i>
<b>religious</b>	Treated or regarded with a devotion and scrupulousness appropriate to worship. <i>She has strong <b>religious</b> convictions.</i>
<b>secret</b>	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>A <b>secret</b> formula.</i>
<b><u>spiritual</u></b>	Having a relationship based on a profound level of mental or emotional communion. <i><b>Spiritual</b> values.</i>



<b>supernatural</b>	(of a manifestation or event) attributed to some force beyond scientific understanding or the laws of nature. <i>A woman of <b>supernatural</b> beauty.</i>
<b>transcendent</b>	(in scholastic philosophy) higher than or not included in any of Aristotle's ten categories. <i>The notion of any <b>transcendent</b> reality beyond thought.</i>
<b>transcendental</b>	(of a number, e.g. $e$ or $\pi$ ) real but not a root of an algebraic equation with rational coefficients. <i>The <b>transcendental</b> importance of each person's soul.</i>
<b>unfathomable</b>	(of water or a natural feature) impossible to measure the extent of. <i>Her grey eyes were dark with some <b>unfathomable</b> emotion.</i>
<b>unrevealed</b>	Not revealed; secret. <i>Some feelings can run so deep that they are better left <b>unrevealed</b>.</i>

- amulet** A trinket or piece of jewelry usually hung about the neck and thought to be a magical protection against evil or disease.
- bewitchment** A magical spell.
- charmed** (of a person's life or a period of this) unusually lucky or happy as though protected by magic.  
*I felt that I had a **charmed** life.*
- conjure** Make (something) appear unexpectedly or seemingly from nowhere.  
*They hoped to **conjure** up the spirit of their dead friend.*
- coven** A secret or close-knit group of associates.  
***Covens** of militants within the party.*
- disbelieve** Reject as false; refuse to accept.  
*He seemed to **disbelieve** her.*
- goddess** A woman who is greatly admired, especially for her beauty.  
*He had an affair with a screen **goddess**.*
- hopefully** It is hoped.  
*He rode on **hopefully**.*



<b>magic</b>	An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i><b>Magic</b> signs that protect against adverse influence.</i>
<b>magical</b>	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>A <b>magical</b> spell.</i>
<b>magician</b>	A person with exceptional skill in a particular area. <i>He was the <b>magician</b> of the fan belt.</i>
<b>miraculous</b>	Being or having the character of a miracle. <i>A <b>miraculous</b> cure.</i>
<b>miraculously</b>	In a miraculous manner. <i>The two drivers <b>miraculously</b> escaped with only minor injuries.</i>
<b>myth</b>	A fictitious or imaginary person or thing. <i>The heroes of Greek <b>myth</b>.</i>
<b>necromancer</b>	One who practices magic or sorcery. <i>Dr Faustus a <b>necromancer</b> of the 16th century.</i>
<b>necromancy</b>	The supposed practice of communicating with the dead, especially in order to predict the future. <i>Alchemy <b>necromancy</b> and other magic practices.</i>
<b>occult</b>	(of a disease or process) not accompanied by readily discernible signs or symptoms. <i><b>Occult</b> blood in the stool.</i>
<b>providential</b>	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention. <i>A <b>providential</b> visitation.</i>
<b>religion</b>	The belief in and worship of a superhuman controlling power, especially a personal God or gods. <i>Consumerism is the new <b>religion</b>.</i>
<b>seance</b>	A meeting at which people attempt to make contact with the dead, especially through the agency of a medium. <i>The <b>seance</b> was held in the medium s parlor.</i>
<b>shaman</b>	In societies practicing shamanism one acting as a medium between the visible and spirit worlds practices sorcery for healing or divination.
<b>sleight</b>	The use of dexterity or cunning, especially so as to deceive. <i>Except by <b>sleight</b> of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
<b>sorcerer</b>	A person who claims or is believed to have magic powers; a wizard.
<b>sorcery</b>	The use of magic, especially black magic.
<b>spell</b>	Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of. <i>She <b>spelled</b> her husband at the wheel.</i>

**supernatural** Manifestations or events considered to be of supernatural origin such as ghosts.

*She doesn't believe in the **supernatural**.*

**talisman**

A person regarded as representing and inspiring a particular group.

*Those rings so fresh and gleaming were their **talismans**.*

**witch**

A woman who is bewitchingly attractive.

*He can marry the old **witch** for all I care.*

**witchcraft**

Bewitching or fascinating attraction or charm.

*Children and goods were believed to be vulnerable to the **witchcraft** of jealous neighbours.*

**wizard**

(in legends and fairy tales) a man who has magical powers.

*A financial **wizard**.*
