| <u>inexplicable</u> | Incapable of being explained or accounted for. <i>For some inexplicable reason her mind went completely blank.</i> |
| insoluble | Admitting of no solution or explanation. <i>Once dry the paints become insoluble in water.</i> |
| magic | Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers- Shakespeare. <i>A magical spell.</i> |
| <u>magical</u> | Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>It was a magical evening of pure nostalgia.</i> |

| orphic | Having an import not apparent to the senses nor obvious to the intelligence; beyond ordinary understanding. |
| out of the ordinary | Outer or outlying. |
| outstanding | Owed as a debt. <i>Einstein was one of the outstanding figures of the 20th centurey.</i> |
| parabolic | Resembling or expressed by parables. <i>A parabolic mirror behind a spotlight projects a parallel beam.</i> |
| paranormal | Seemingly outside normal sensory channels. <i>What seemed to be paranormal manifestations.</i> |
| peculiar | Markedly different from the usual-Virginia Woolf. <i>Some languages are peculiar to one region.</i> |
| perplexing | Lacking clarity of meaning; causing confusion or perplexity. <i>A perplexing problem.</i> |
| phenomenal | Perceptible by the senses or through immediate experience. <i>The phenomenal world.</i> |
| preternatural | Existing outside of or not in accordance with nature-Aldous Huxley. <i>Autumn had arrived with preternatural speed.</i> |

*He was subject to **unexplainable** rages.*

unfathomable

(of water or a natural feature) impossible to measure the extent of.
*Her grey eyes were dark with some **unfathomable** emotion.*

unprecedented

Never done or known before.
*The government took the **unprecedented** step of releasing confidential correspondence.*

unusual

Remarkable or interesting because different from or better than others.
*A man of **unusual** talent.*

weird

Strikingly odd or unusual- Bram Stoker.
***Weird** inhuman sounds.*
