<b>fabulous</b>	Very good; wonderful. <i>A <b>fabulous</b> vacation.</i>
<b>fanciful</b>	Over-imaginative and unrealistic. <i>A <b>fanciful</b> pattern with intertwined vines and flowers.</i>
<b>fictitious</b>	Occurring in or invented for fiction. <i>A <b>fictitious</b> address.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	(of language or a work of art) grand or grandiose in scale or intention. <i>They took <b>heroic</b> measures to save his life.</i>
<b>imaginary</b>	Not based on fact; existing only in the imagination. <i>A small child s <b>imaginary</b> friends.</i>

<b>legendary</b>	Remarkable enough to be famous; very well known. <i><b>Legendary</b> exploits of Jesse James.</i>
<b>made-up</b>	Having been paved.
<b>make-believe</b>	Imagined as in a play.
<b>mythic</b>	Mythical. <i><b>Mythic</b> creatures.</i>
<b>mythologic</b>	Based on or told of in traditional stories; lacking factual basis or historical validity.
<b>mythological</b>	Based on or told of in traditional stories; lacking factual basis or historical validity. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all <b>mythological</b> symbols.</i>
<b>romantic</b>	Relating to or denoting the artistic and literary movement of romanticism. <i>The <b>romantic</b> tradition.</i>
<b>traditional</b>	(of jazz) in the style of the early 20th century. <i>The <b>traditional</b> drinks in the clubhouse.</i>
<b>unreal</b>	Lacking material form or substance unreal. <i>Ghosts and other <b>unreal</b> entities.</i>
<b>untrue</b>	Not according with the facts. <i>A malicious and <b>untrue</b> story.</i>

- deification** The elevation of a person (as to the status of a god).  
*The capitalists deification of capital.*

<b>dragon</b>	<p>A mythical monster like a giant reptile In European tradition the dragon is typically fire breathing and tends to symbolize chaos or evil whereas in East Asia it is usually a beneficent symbol of fertility associated with water and the heavens.</p> <p><i>The geography teacher was a real <b>dragon</b>.</i></p>
<b>dryad</b>	<p>A dark brown Eurasian butterfly with two prominent bluish eyespots on each forewing.</p>
<b><u>dwarf</u></b>	<p>A person who is of unusually or abnormally small stature because of a congenital condition a person affected by dwarfism.</p> <p><i>The lack of sunlight <b>dwarfed</b> these pines.</i></p>
<b>fabled</b>	<p>Celebrated in fable or legend.</p> <p><i>A <b>fabled</b> art collection.</i></p>
<b>fabulous</b>	<p>Based on or told of in traditional stories; lacking factual basis or historical validity.</p> <p><i><b>Fabulous</b> creatures.</i></p>
<b>fairy</b>	<p>A small imaginary being of human form that has magical powers, especially a female one.</p> <p><i><b>Fairy</b> gold.</i></p>
<b>faun</b>	<p>One of a class of lustful rural gods, represented as a man with a goat's horns, ears, legs, and tail.</p>
<b>giant</b>	<p>Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise.</p> <p><i>A <b>giant</b> meteorite.</i></p>
<b>gnome</b>	<p>A legendary dwarfish creature supposed to guard the earth's treasures underground.</p> <p><i>The <b>gnomes</b> of Zurich.</i></p>
<b><u>hero</u></b>	<p>(Greek mythology) priestess of Aphrodite who killed herself when her lover Leander drowned while trying to swim the Hellespont to see her.</p> <p><i>RAF pilots were the <b>heroes</b> of the Battle of Britain.</i></p>
<b>incredible</b>	<p>Beyond belief or understanding.</p> <p><i>The noise from the crowd was <b>incredible</b>.</i></p>
<b>legend</b>	<p>An extremely famous or notorious person, especially in a particular field.</p> <p><i>See <b>legend</b> to Fig 1.</i></p>
<b>legendary</b>	<p>So celebrated as to having taken on the nature of a legend.</p> <p><i>Her wisdom in matters of childbirth was <b>legendary</b>.</i></p>
<b><u>miracle</u></b>	<p>A remarkable event or development that brings very welcome consequences.</p> <p><i>The <b>miracle</b> of rising from the grave.</i></p>

<b>mystery</b>	Something that is difficult or impossible to understand or explain. <i>What happened after he left home that day remains a <b>mystery</b>.</i>
<b>myth</b>	An exaggerated or idealized conception of a person or thing. <i>Nobody had ever heard of Simon s mysterious friend Anna said he was a <b>myth</b>.</i>
<b>mythological</b>	Relating to, based on, or appearing in myths or mythology. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all <b>mythological</b> symbols.</i>
<b>mythology</b>	Myths collectively; the body of stories associated with a culture or institution or person. <i>This field includes archaeology comparative <b>mythology</b> and folklore.</i>
<b>noted</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>The restaurant is <b>noted</b> for its high standards of cuisine.</i>
<b>phoenix</b>	A legendary Arabian bird said to periodically burn itself to death and emerge from the ashes as a new phoenix according to most versions only one phoenix lived at a time and it renewed itself every 500 years. <i>I m that <b>phoenix</b> the old fashioned family doctor.</i>
<b>saga</b>	A long story of heroic achievement, especially a medieval prose narrative in Old Norse or Old Icelandic. <i>Launching into the <b>saga</b> of her engagement.</i>
<b>satyr</b>	A satyrid butterfly with chiefly dark brown wings. <i>Charles was an unmarried <b>satyr</b>.</i>
<b>sylph</b>	An elemental being believed to inhabit the air. <i>An oh so slim <b>sylph</b> dressed in a black leotard.</i>
<b>tale</b>	A fictitious or true narrative or story, especially one that is imaginatively recounted. <i>A delightful children s <b>tale</b>.</i>
<b>unicorn</b>	A heraldic representation of a unicorn with a twisted horn a deer s feet a goat s beard and a lion s tail. <i>Team entries comprised two fours three <b>unicorns</b> and a three abreast.</i>
