**harridan** A strict, bossy, or belligerent old woman.

- scold** A person who nags or grumbles constantly (typically used of a woman).  
*The fiscal **scolds** insist that reform will make everything even worse.*
- scolder** Someone (especially a woman) who annoys people by constantly finding fault.
- shrew** Small mouselike mammal with a long snout; related to moles.  
*Hold your nagging tongue you miserable old **shrew**.*
- termagant** A harsh-tempered or overbearing woman.

- *Worry persistently.*

<b>go on at</b>	Be the right size or shape; fit correctly or as desired.
<b>grumble at</b>	Make a low noise.
<b>grumbling</b>	Make a low noise.
<a href="#"><u>harass</u></a>	Make repeated small-scale attacks on (an enemy). <i>The squadron's task was to <b>harass</b> the retreating enemy forces.</i>
<b>harp on at</b>	Come back to.
<b>harry</b>	Annoy continually or chronically. <i>He is known to <b>harry</b> his staff when he is overworked.</i>
<b>hen-peck</b>	Bother persistently with trivial complaints.
<b>henpeck</b>	(of a woman) continually criticize and give orders to (her husband or male partner). <i>I don't feel it's my place to <b>henpeck</b> him about it.</i>
<b>hound</b>	Pursue or chase relentlessly. <i>The detectives <b>hounded</b> the suspect until they found him.</i>
<b>keep after</b>	Supply with necessities and support.
<b>keep complaining to</b>	Retain possession of.
<b>keep on at</b>	Retain possession of.
<b>moan at</b>	Indicate pain, discomfort, or displeasure.
<b>moan on at</b>	Indicate pain, discomfort, or displeasure.
<b>moaning</b>	Indicate pain, discomfort, or displeasure.
<b>niggling</b>	Worry unnecessarily or excessively.
<b>peck</b>	Eat by pecking at like a bird. <i>Don't <b>peck</b> at your food eat a whole mouthful.</i>
<b>persecute</b>	Cause to suffer. <i>No one should be <b>persecuted</b> for their religious beliefs.</i>
<b>pick on</b>	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion.

**scold**

(of a bird) call loudly and persistently.

*The gulls wheeled and **scolded** above the lake.*

**upbraid**

Express criticism towards.

*He was **upbraided** for his slovenly appearance.*

<b>abusive</b>	Involving injustice or illegality. <i>Argued that foster homes are <b>abusive</b>.</i>
<b>agitate</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i><b>Agitate</b> the water to disperse the oil.</i>
<b>anger</b>	Fill someone with anger provoke anger in. <i>I was seething with <b>anger</b> and frustration.</i>
<b>annoy</b>	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. <i>The decision really <b>annoyed</b> him.</i>

<b>gadfly</b>	A fly that bites livestock, especially a horsefly, warble fly, or botfly. <i>Always a <b>gadfly</b> he attacked intellectual orthodoxies.</i>
<b><u>hack</u></b>	An act of computer hacking. <i>Men <b>hack</b> at the coalface.</i>
<b>hamper</b>	Put at a disadvantage. <i>A picnic <b>hamper</b>.</i>
<b><u>harass</u></b>	Exhaust by attacking repeatedly. <i><b>Harass</b> the enemy.</i>
<b>hinder</b>	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. <i>Language barriers <b>hindered</b> communication between scientists.</i>
<b>impede</b>	Block passage through. <i>The sap causes swelling which can <b>impede</b> breathing.</i>
<b>importunate</b>	Expressing persistent and earnest entreaty. <i><b>Importunate</b> creditors.</i>
<b><u>insult</u></b>	Treat, mention, or speak to rudely. <i>The movement of the bone causes a severe tissue <b>insult</b>.</i>
<b>irk</b>	Irritate; annoy. <i>It <b>irks</b> her to think of the runaround she received.</i>
<b>irritate</b>	Excite to an abnormal condition, or chafe or inflame. <i><b>Irritate</b> the glands of a leaf.</i>
<b>jitter</b>	Of a signal or device suffer from jitter. <i>The episode is only available as a <b>jittering</b> videotape version.</i>
<b>offend</b>	Act in disregard of laws, rules, contracts, or promises. <i>The smell of ash <b>offended</b> him.</i>
<b><u>oppress</u></b>	Cause to suffer. <i>A system which <b>oppressed</b> working people.</i>
<b>peeve</b>	A cause of annoyance. <i>Another <b>peeve</b> of mine is these so called reality shows.</i>

<b><u>pest</u></b>	A serious sometimes fatal infection of rodents caused by Yersinia pestis and accidentally transmitted to humans by the bite of a flea that has bitten an infected animal. <i>Many <b>pests</b> have developed resistance to the common <b>pesticides</b>.</i>
<b>rile</b>	Make (someone) annoyed or irritated. <i>He has been <b>riled</b> by suggestions that his Arsenal future is in doubt.</i>
<b><u>scold</u></b>	(of a bird) call loudly and persistently. <i>Mum took Anna away <b>scolding</b> her for her bad behaviour.</i>
<b>scolding</b>	Rebuking a person harshly. <i>She d get a <b>scolding</b> from Victoria.</i>
<b><u>sting</u></b>	A painful wound caused by the thrust of an insect s stinger into skin. <i>She felt the sharp <b>sting</b> of tears behind her eyelids.</i>
<b>stonewall</b>	Engage in delaying tactics or refuse to cooperate. <i>Nixon <b>stonewalled</b> the Watergate investigation.</i>
<b><u>worsen</u></b>	Grow worse. <i>Her condition <b>worsened</b> on the flight.</i>
