## Narrate as a Verb

### Definitions of "Narrate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “narrate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Narrate or give a detailed account of.*
- *Provide commentary for a film, for example.*
- *Deliver a commentary to accompany (a film, broadcast, piece of music, etc).*
- *Give a spoken or written account of.*



## Synonyms of "Narrate" as a verb (19 Words)

<a href="#">chronicle</a>	Record (a series of events) in a factual and detailed way. <i>His work <b>chronicles</b> 20th century migration.</i>
<a href="#">delineate</a>	Make a mark or lines on a surface. <i>The law should <b>delineate</b> and prohibit behaviour which is socially abhorrent.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Mark out or draw (a geometrical figure). <i>Discreet Italian police <b>described</b> it in a manner typically continental.</i>
<b>detail</b>	Provide details for. <i>The ambulances were <b>detailed</b> to the fire station.</i>
<b>give a report of</b>	Convey, as of a compliment, regards, attention, etc.; bestow.
<b>give an account of</b>	Give food to.
<b>portray</b>	Portray in words. <i>He chose Trevor Howard to <b>portray</b> Captain Bligh.</i>
<a href="#">recite</a>	Recite in elocution. <i>He <b>recited</b> passages of Dante.</i>
<a href="#">recount</a>	Tell someone about something; give an account of an event or experience. <i>He <b>recounts</b> how they often talked of politics.</i>
<b>rehearse</b>	Engage in a rehearsal (of). <i>He had <b>rehearsed</b> a thousand fine phrases.</i>
<a href="#">relate</a>	Have reference to; concern. <i>High unemployment is <b>related</b> to high crime rates.</i>
<a href="#">relay</a>	Control or operate by relay. <i>She intended to <b>relay</b> everything she had learned.</i>
<b>report</b>	Cover an event or subject as a journalist or a reporter. <i>One student <b>reported</b> the other to the principal.</i>
<b>retail</b>	Sell on the retail market. <i>The product <b>retails</b> for around 20.</i>
<b>set forth</b>	Urge to attack someone.
<b>set out</b>	Apply or start.
<b>sketch out</b>	Describe roughly or briefly or give the main points or summary of.
<b>tell</b>	Inform positively and with certainty and confidence. <i>He was <b>telling</b> on all his former colleague.</i>
<a href="#">unfold</a>	Open to the view. <i>Eva <b>unfolded</b> her secret exploits to Mattie.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Narrate" as a verb

- *The series is narrated by Richard Baker.*
- *The story is narrated by the heroine.*



## Associations of "Narrate" (30 Words)

- advisor** An expert who gives advice.  
*The United States sent military **advisors** to Guatemala.*
- aforementioned** Denoting a thing or person previously mentioned.  
*Songs from the **aforementioned** album.*
- aforesaid** Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
- aloud** Audibly; not silently or in a whisper.  
*Please read the passage **aloud**.*
- breathlessly** In a way that involves gasping for breath, typically due to exertion.  
*She laughed **breathlessly**.*

<b>confess</b>	Of a priest listen to the confession of. <i>He <b>confessed</b> to a lifelong passion for food.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Move in a way which follows the outline of (an imaginary geometrical figure). <i>He <b>described</b> his experiences in a letter to his parents.</i>
<b>dialog</b>	A conversation between two persons.
<b>eloquence</b>	Powerful and effective language. <i>His <b>eloquence</b> attracted a large congregation.</i>
<b>fluently</b>	In a smoothly graceful and effortless manner. <i>He can converse <b>fluently</b> in Filipino.</i>
<b>learn</b>	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>They d started <b>learning</b> French.</i>
<b>memorize</b>	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>Have you <b>memorized</b> your lines for the play yet.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	A (usually long) dramatic speech by a single actor. <i>Fred carried on with his <b>monologue</b> as if I hadn t spoken.</i>
<b>orate</b>	Talk pompously. <i>Hamlet thinks speaks <b>orates</b> and acts.</i>
<b>profess</b>	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>A <b>professor</b> what does he <b>profess</b>.</i>
<b>read</b>	Audition for a stage role by reading parts of a role. <i>A man deeply <b>read</b> in history philosophy and theology.</i>
<b>reading</b>	The action or skill of reading. <i>He was famous for his <b>reading</b> of Mozart.</i>
<b>recall</b>	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>Annie <b>recalled</b> the event that led to the rift in their friendship.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	Musical declamation of the kind usual in the narrative and dialogue parts of opera and oratorio, sung in the rhythm of ordinary speech with many words on the same note. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>recite</b>	Recite in elocution. <i>The doctor <b>recited</b> the list of possible side effects of the drug.</i>
<b>recount</b>	An additional (usually a second) count; especially of the votes in a close election. <i>He <b>recounts</b> how they often talked of politics.</i>

<b><u>regretfully</u></b>	In a regretful manner. <i>He sighed <b>regretfully</b>.</i>
<b>report</b>	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>Police <b>reported</b> that the floods were abating.</i>
<b>reportedly</b>	According to what some say (used to express the speaker's belief that the information given is not necessarily true). <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b><u>retrospect</u></b>	A survey or review of a past course of events or period of time. <i>A full <b>retrospect</b> of the battle.</i>
<b><u>soliloquy</u></b>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>He did most of his thinking by <b>soliloquy</b>.</i>
<b>speech</b>	The exchange of spoken words. <i>They were perfectly comfortable together without <b>speech</b>.</i>
<b><u>spoken</u></b>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>The <b>spoken</b> language.</i>
<b>storybook</b>	A book containing a story or collection of stories intended for children. <i>It was a <b>storybook</b> finish to an illustrious career.</i>
<b>tell</b>	Reveal (information) to someone in a non-verbal way. <i>You can <b>tell</b> they re in love.</i>
