## **Narration as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Narration" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “narration” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The action or process of narrating a story.*
- *A message that tells the particulars of an act or occurrence or course of events; presented in writing or drama or cinema or as a radio or television program.*
- *The second section of an oration in which the facts are set forth.*
- *A commentary delivered to accompany a film, broadcast, etc.*
- *(rhetoric) the second section of an oration in which the facts are set forth.*
- *The act of giving an account describing incidents or a course of events.*

<b>account</b>	A client having an account with a supplier. <i>I expected a brief <b>account</b>.</i>
<b>chronicle</b>	A factual written account of important or historical events in the order of their occurrence. <i>The rebels demands for personal freedom are conspicuous in the <b>chronicles</b>.</i>
<b>commentary</b>	A descriptive spoken account (especially on a broadcast) of an event or performance as it happens. <i>A <b>commentary</b> on the Old Testament.</i>
<b>description</b>	The act of describing something. <i>The emphasis was placed on explanation rather than <b>description</b>.</i>
<b>narrative</b>	The practice or art of telling stories. <i>Traditions of oral <b>narrative</b>.</i>
<b>portrayal</b>	A representation by picture or portraiture. <i>The media <b>portrayal</b> of immigration.</i>
<b>reading</b>	The action or skill of reading. <i>Feminist <b>readings</b> of Goethe.</i>
<b>recital</b>	A performance of a programme of music by a soloist or small group. <i>I gave my first <b>recital</b> at the Royal College.</i>
<b>recitation</b>	The action of repeating something aloud from memory. <i>The program included songs and <b>recitations</b> of well loved poems.</i>
<b>rehearsal</b>	The action or process of rehearsing. <i>A <b>rehearsal</b> will be held the day before the wedding.</i>
<b>report</b>	The act of informing by verbal report. <i><b>Report</b> has it that the beetles have now virtually disappeared.</i>
<b>sketch</b>	A rough or unfinished version of any creative work. <i>A biographical <b>sketch</b> of Ernest Hemingway.</i>
<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>The film is based on a true <b>story</b>.</i>
<b>tale</b>	A number or total. <i><b>Tales</b> of witches and warlocks.</i>
<b>yarn</b>	A chat. <i>A fine <b>yarn</b> for a lightweight garment.</i>

## Associations of "Narration" (30 Words)

- aforsaid** Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
- allegory** An expressive style that uses fictional characters and events to describe some subject by suggestive resemblances; an extended metaphor.  
*Pilgrim s Progress is an **allegory** of the spiritual journey.*
- allude** (of an artist or a work of art) recall (an earlier work or style) in such a way as to suggest a relationship with it.  
*The photographs **allude** to Italian Baroque painting.*
- aloud** With relatively high volume.  
*He wept **aloud**.*
- anecdotal** Characterized by or given to telling anecdotes.  
***Anecdotal** conversation.*
- chat** Songbirds having a chattering call.  
*She **chatted** to her mother on the phone every day.*

<b><u>communicative</u></b>	Willing, eager, or able to talk or impart information. <i>Lew was a very <b>communicative</b> chap.</i>
<b>confabulate</b>	Talk socially without exchanging too much information. <i>She has lapses in attention and concentration—she may be confabulating a little.</i>
<b>conversation</b>	A talk, especially an informal one, between two or more people, in which news and ideas are exchanged. <i>The two men were deep in <b>conversation</b>.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Move in a way which follows the outline of (an imaginary geometrical figure). <i>Discreet Italian police <b>described</b> it in a manner typically continental.</i>
<b>description</b>	A spoken or written account of a person, object, or event. <i>It is laughably easy to buy drugs of all <b>descriptions</b>.</i>
<b>dialog</b>	A conversation between two persons.
<b><u>expansive</u></b>	Marked by exaggerated feelings of euphoria and delusions of grandeur. <i>Wine made the guest <b>expansive</b>.</i>
<b>expository</b>	Serving to expound or set forth. <i>Clean <b>expository</b> writing.</i>
<b>fable</b>	A story about mythical or supernatural beings or events. <i>The unnatural monsters of <b>fable</b>.</i>
<b>fiction</b>	A belief or statement that is false but is often held to be true because it is expedient to do so. <i>The notion of the country being a democracy is a polite <b>fiction</b>.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	A long, tedious speech by one person during a conversation. <i>He had a long and exacting <b>monologue</b> at the end of the film.</i>
<b><u>narrate</u></b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is <b>narrated</b> by the heroine.</i>
<b><u>narrative</u></b>	The practice or art of telling stories. <i>A <b>narrative</b> poem.</i>
<b>orate</b>	Talk pompously. <i>Hamlet thinks speaks <b>orates</b> and acts.</i>
<b>read</b>	Having a readership of a specified extent. <i>Do you <b>read</b> me Over.</i>
<b>recapitulate</b>	Repeat an earlier theme of a composition. <i>Let s <b>recapitulate</b> the main ideas.</i>

<b>recitative</b>	A vocal passage of narrative text that a singer delivers with natural rhythms of speech. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>reportedly</b>	According to what some say (used to express the speaker's belief that the information given is not necessarily true). <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b>soliloquy</b>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>In the opening <b>soliloquy</b> he declares his true intent.</i>
<b>spoken</b>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>Sharp <b>spoken</b>.</i>
<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>Having such information is useful but it is not the whole <b>story</b>.</i>
<b>tale</b>	A message that tells the particulars of an act or occurrence or course of events; presented in writing or drama or cinema or as a radio or television program. <i>A delightful children's <b>tale</b>.</i>
<b>talking</b>	The action of talking speech or discussion. <i>The world's greatest <b>talking</b> bird.</i>
<b>tell</b>	A Swiss patriot who lived in the early 14th century and who was renowned for his skill as an archer; according to legend an Austrian governor compelled him to shoot an apple from his son's head with his crossbow (which he did successfully without mishap). <i>I couldn't <b>tell</b> if he believed me.</i>
