## **Narrator as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Narrator" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “narrator” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person who narrates something, especially a character who recounts the events of a novel or narrative poem.*
- *Someone who tells a story.*
- *A person who delivers a commentary accompanying a film, broadcast, piece of music, etc.*



## Synonyms of "Narrator" as a noun (9 Words)

<b>annalist</b>	A person who writes annals.
<b>chronicler</b>	A record or narrative description of past events. <i>A <b>chronicler</b> of 18th century American life.</i>
<b>commentator</b>	A person who comments on events or on a text. <i><b>Commentators</b> noted that the demonstration was part of a wider strategy.</i>
<b>relater</b>	A person who tells a story; a narrator.
<b>reporter</b>	A person who investigates and reports or edits news stories.
<b>romancer</b>	A writer of medieval romances.
<b>storyteller</b>	Someone who tells lies.
<b>teller</b>	(in the UK) each of the four officers of the Exchequer responsible for the receipt and payment of moneys. <i>A foul mouthed <b>teller</b> of lies.</i>
<b>teller of tales</b>	An employee of a bank who receives and pays out money.



## Usage Examples of "Narrator" as a noun

- *A first-person narrator.*
- *His poetic efforts are mocked by the narrator of the story.*
- *A religious broadcast with Johnny Morris as narrator.*



## Associations of "Narrator" (30 Words)

- advise** Inform (someone) about a fact or situation in a formal or official way.  
*The lawyer **advised** the court that his client wished to give evidence.*
- author** Be the author of a book or piece of writing.  
*The **authors** of the peace plan.*
- authorship** The act of initiating a new idea or theory or writing.  
*It was a matter of disputed **authorship**.*
- bestseller** A book that has had a large and rapid sale.  
*The **bestseller** list.*
- book** A bookmaker's record of bets accepted and money paid out.  
*McMahon was **booked** for a foul.*
- chapter** An ecclesiastical assembly of the monks in a monastery or even of the canons of a church.  
*The people are about to begin a new **chapter** in their history.*

<b>didactic</b>	In the manner of a teacher, particularly so as to appear patronizing. <i>His tone ranged from <b>didactic</b> to backslapping.</i>
<b>expository</b>	Intended to explain or describe something. <i>Clean <b>expository</b> writing.</i>
<b>fiction</b>	Something that is invented or untrue. <i>The notion of the country being a democracy is a polite <b>fiction</b>.</i>
<b>hortative</b>	Giving strong encouragement.
<b>hortatory</b>	Tending or aiming to exhort. <i>A series of <b>hortatory</b> epistles.</i>
<b>informative</b>	Tending to increase knowledge or dissipate ignorance. <i>A thought provoking <b>informative</b> article.</i>
<b>instructive</b>	Useful and informative. <i>It is <b>instructive</b> to compare the two projects.</i>
<b>literate</b>	A literate person. <i>Their parents were uneducated and barely <b>literate</b>.</i>
<b>moralize</b>	Improve the morals of. <i>He endeavoured to <b>moralize</b> an immoral society.</i>
<b>narration</b>	A message that tells the particulars of an act or occurrence or course of events; presented in writing or drama or cinema or as a radio or television program. <i>The style of <b>narration</b> in the novel.</i>
<b>nonfiction</b>	Prose writing that is not fictional.
<b>novel</b>	The literary genre represented or exemplified by novels. <i>The <b>novel</b> is the most adaptable of all literary forms.</i>
<b>omniscient</b>	Knowing everything. <i>A third person <b>omniscient</b> narrator.</i>
<b>potboiler</b>	A literary composition of poor quality that was written quickly to make money (to boil the pot).
<b>prologue</b>	The actor who delivers the prologue in a play. <i>The events from 1945 to 1956 provided the <b>prologue</b> to the post imperial era.</i>
<b>protagonist</b>	The principal character in a work of fiction. <i>He s a strenuous <b>protagonist</b> of the new agricultural policy.</i>
<b>reading</b>	The action or skill of reading. <i>I found the article fascinating <b>reading</b>.</i>
<b>soliloquy</b>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>Edmund ends the scene as he had begun it with a <b>soliloquy</b>.</i>

<b><u>speaker</u></b>	Electro-acoustic transducer that converts electrical signals into sounds loud enough to be heard at a distance. <i>Our guest <b>speaker</b> will give an audiovisual presentation.</i>
<b><u>spell</u></b>	Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of. <i>We had to <b>spell</b> out our names for the police officer.</i>
<b>storybook</b>	Denoting something that is as idyllic or perfect as things typically are in children's stories. <i>It was a <b>storybook</b> finish to an illustrious career.</i>
<b>teller</b>	A person who tells something. <i>A foul mouthed <b>teller</b> of lies.</i>
<b>tone</b>	A steady sound without overtones. <i>The piano <b>tone</b> appears lacking in warmth.</i>
<b><u>write</u></b>	Write music. <i>He couldn't read or <b>write</b>.</i>
