Nascent as an Adjective

Definitions of "Nascent" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “nascent” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(especially of a process or organization) just coming into existence and beginning to display signs of future potential.*
- *(chiefly of hydrogen) freshly generated in a reactive form.*
- *Being born or beginning.*

- beginning** Serving to begin.
*The **beginning** canto of the poem.*
- coming out** Of the relatively near future.
- dawning** Beginning to grow light.
*He smiled with **dawning** recognition.*
- emerging** Coming into existence.
*Established and **emerging** artists.*

baby	Treat someone as a baby pamper or be overprotective towards. <i>Don t be such a baby she said witheringly.</i>
<u>born</u>	British nuclear physicist born in Germany honored for his contributions to quantum mechanics 1882 1970. <i>They are born to rule.</i>

budding	(of a plant) having or developing buds. <i>Her budding breasts.</i>
callow	(of a young person) inexperienced and immature. <i>Earnest and callow undergraduates.</i>
colonist	A settler in or inhabitant of a colony.
commencement	The act of starting something. <i>The commencement of the trial.</i>
early	Early shifts. <i>Early varieties of peas and tomatoes mature before most standard varieties.</i>
embryonic	(of a system, idea, or organization) in a rudimentary stage with potential for development. <i>The embryonic government staffed by survivors of the massacre.</i>
emergent	An emergent tree or other plant. <i>An emergent republic.</i>
emerging	Coming into existence. <i>Established and emerging artists.</i>
first	The fielding position of the player on a baseball team who is stationed at first of the bases in the infield counting counterclockwise from home plate. <i>The first day of spring.</i>
freshly	Newly; recently. <i>Freshly ground black pepper.</i>
inborn	Natural to a person or animal. <i>An inborn defect in the formation of collagen.</i>
inchoate	Just begun and so not fully formed or developed; rudimentary. <i>A still inchoate democracy.</i>
inchoative	An inchoative verb. <i>Inchoative stages.</i>
inherent	(of an adjective) having the same meaning in both attributive and predicative uses. <i>Shortcomings inherent in our approach.</i>
innate	Inborn; natural. <i>An innate talent.</i>
natal	A region of eastern South Africa on the Indian Ocean. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his natal city.</i>

<u>native</u>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e g native bee. <i>One s native language.</i>
newborn	(of a child or animal) recently or just born. <i>A newborn infant.</i>
newly	In a new or different manner. <i>A newly arranged hairdo.</i>
<u>novelty</u>	Originality by virtue of being refreshingly novel. <i>A novelty teapot.</i>
<u>pioneer</u>	Open up a road or terrain as a pioneer. <i>She pioneered a graduate program for women students.</i>
primeval	Of the earliest time in history. <i>A primeval desire.</i>
recently	At a recent time; not long ago. <i>He was in Paris recently.</i>
settler	A negotiator who settles disputes. <i>The early European settlers in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.</i>
<u>untapped</u>	Not drawn upon or used. <i>The untapped stockrooms of our minds.</i>
urgency	Importance requiring swift action. <i>Emilia heard the urgency in his voice.</i>
young	Used to denote the younger of two people of the same name. <i>She s very young for her age.</i>
