<u>instantly</u>	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. <i>She fell asleep almost instantly.</i>
instinctive	Unthinking; prompted by (or as if by) instinct. <i>He was an instinctive cook.</i>
<u>involuntary</u>	Done without will or conscious control. <i>Gave an involuntary start.</i>
occur	To be found to exist. <i>Precious stones occur in a large area in Brazil.</i>
oratory	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own oratory.</i>
