<b>extemporize</b>	Manage in a makeshift way; do with whatever is at hand. <i>He <b>extemporized</b> at the piano.</i>
<b><u>gravitate</u></b>	Move due to the pull of gravitation. <i>Young western Europeans will <b>gravitate</b> to Berlin.</i>
<b>immediate</b>	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>No changes are envisaged in the <b>immediate</b> future.</i>
<b><u>impromptu</u></b>	An extemporaneous speech or remark. <i>An <b>impromptu</b> speech.</i>
<b><u>improvise</u></b>	Create and perform (music, drama, or verse) spontaneously or without preparation. <i>He invited actors to <b>improvise</b> dialogue.</i>
