According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “nausea” as a noun can have the following definitions:

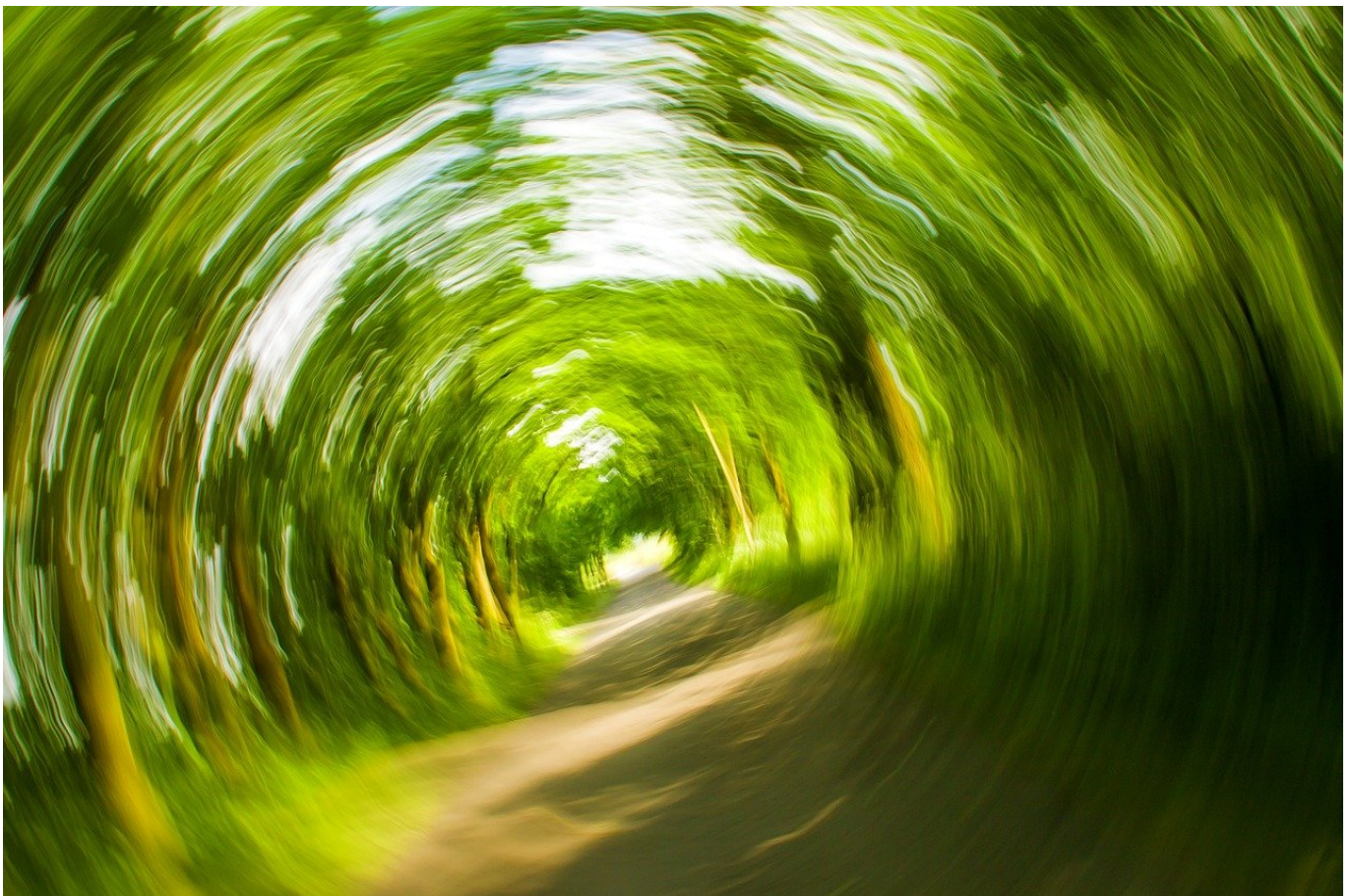
- *The state that precedes vomiting.*
- *A feeling of loathing or disgust.*
- *Disgust so strong it makes you feel sick.*
- *A feeling of sickness with an inclination to vomit.*



## Synonyms of "Nausea" as a noun (13 Words)

- abhorrence** A feeling of revulsion; disgusted loathing.  
*The thought of marrying him filled her with **abhorrence**.*
- aversion** The act of turning yourself (or your gaze) away.  
*My dog s pet **aversion** is visitors particularly males.*
- biliousness** A disposition to exhibit uncontrolled anger.
- detestation** A detested person or thing.  
*Wordsworth s **detestation** of aristocracy.*
- disgust** Strong feelings of dislike.  
*Some of the audience walked out in **disgust**.*
- distaste** Mild dislike or aversion.  
*Harry nurtured a **distaste** for all things athletic.*

- loathing** A feeling of intense dislike or disgust; hatred.  
*The thought filled him with **loathing**.*
- odium** State of disgrace resulting from detestable behavior.  
*He incurred widespread **odium** for military failures and government corruption.*
- queasiness** A mild state of nausea.
- repugnance** Intense aversion.  
*Our **repugnance** at the bleeding carcasses.*
- repulsion** The force by which bodies repel one another.  
*Bond lengths are increased due to increasing **repulsion** between the atoms.*
- revulsion** A sense of disgust and loathing.  
*News of the attack will be met with sorrow and **revulsion**.*
- sickness** The state of being ill.  
*She was absent through **sickness**.*



## Usage Examples of "Nausea" as a noun

- *A wave of nausea engulfed him.*
- *The stories will launch a wave of public nausea and outrage.*



## Associations of "Nausea" (30 Words)

- [ailment](#)** An illness, typically a minor one.  
*The doctor diagnosed a common stomach **ailment**.*
- [airsickness](#)** Motion sickness experienced while traveling by air (especially during turbulence).
- [dementia](#)** A chronic or persistent disorder of the mental processes caused by brain disease or injury and marked by memory disorders, personality changes, and impaired reasoning.
- [diarrhea](#)** Frequent and watery bowel movements; can be a symptom of infection or food poisoning or colitis or a gastrointestinal tumor.

<b>discomfort</b>	Something that makes a person feel physically uncomfortable. <i>The patient complained of <b>discomfort</b> in the left calf.</i>
<b>disgusting</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>A <b>disgusting</b> smell.</i>
<b>disorient</b>	Cause someone to lose their sense of direction disorientate. <i>The inconsistencies of the narrative do more than merely <b>disorient</b> and challenge the reader.</i>
<b>displeasing</b>	Causing annoyance or dissatisfaction; disagreeable. <i>It was not entirely <b>displeasing</b> to be the centre of such a drama.</i>
<b>dizziness</b>	A sensation of spinning around and losing one's balance. <i>The medicine can cause <b>dizziness</b> or nausea.</i>
<b>dizzy</b>	Make dizzy or giddy. <i>He looked around <b>dizzy</b> with happiness.</i>
<b>epilepsy</b>	A neurological disorder marked by sudden recurrent episodes of sensory disturbance, loss of consciousness, or convulsions, associated with abnormal electrical activity in the brain.
<b>fatigue</b>	A lessening in one's response to or enthusiasm for something, caused by overexposure. <i>The nails have become rusted through or <b>fatigued</b>.</i>
<b>giddiness</b>	An impulsive scatterbrained manner. <i>Symptoms include nausea vomiting and <b>giddiness</b>.</i>
<b>hateful</b>	Very unpleasant. <i>That <b>hateful</b> arrogant woman.</i>
<b>headache</b>	A continuous pain in the head. <i>I've got a splitting <b>headache</b>.</i>
<b>ill</b>	Presaging ill fortune. <i>A look on her face which boded <b>ill</b> for anyone who crossed her path.</i>
<b>migraine</b>	A recurrent throbbing headache that typically affects one side of the head and is often accompanied by nausea and disturbed vision. <i>An attack of <b>migraine</b>.</i>
<b>nauseating</b>	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust; disgusting. <i>The stench was <b>nauseating</b>.</i>
<b>nauseous</b>	Disgusting or offensive. <i>This <b>nauseous</b> account of a court case.</i>
<b>numbness</b>	The trait of lacking enthusiasm for or interest in things generally. <i>Tingling and <b>numbness</b> in the left arm.</i>

<b>pain</b>	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>Chest <b>pains</b>.</i>
<b>sickening</b>	Causing great annoyance or disappointment. <i>A <b>sickening</b> stench.</i>
<b>sickness</b>	Defectiveness or unsoundness. <i>A <b>sickness</b> allowance.</i>
<b>squeamish</b>	Easily made to feel sick or disgusted. <i>I ve always been <b>squeamish</b> about bugs.</i>
<b>stomach</b>	The stomach viewed as the seat of hunger nausea anxiety or other unsettling feelings. <i>He cannot <b>stomach</b> raw fish.</i>
<b>stupor</b>	A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility. <i>Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken <b>stupor</b>.</i>
<b>syncope</b>	The loss of sounds from within a word (as in `fo`c`sle` for `forecastle.
<b>unsightly</b>	Unpleasant to look at; ugly. <i><b>Unsightly</b> billboards.</i>
<b>vertigo</b>	A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall.
<b>vomiting</b>	The reflex act of ejecting the contents of the stomach through the mouth.
