- *A person who explores by sea.*
- *An instrument or device which assists in navigating a vessel or aircraft.*

- helmsman** A person who steers a ship or boat.
- mariner** A man who serves as a sailor.

- pilot** A person with expert local knowledge qualified to take charge of a ship entering or leaving a harbour.  
*He returns to our TV screens in a **pilot** for a Channel 4 sitcom.*

- wayfinder** A sign, landmark, or other indicator used to assist people in navigating to a particular location.  
*The chimney stacks have been a **wayfinder** for nearly five decades.*

- aboard** On a ship, train, plane or other vehicle.  
*Welcome **aboard**.*
- adventure** A commercial venture.  
*They had **adventured** into the forest.*
- boat** Transport someone or something in a boat.  
*Those newly arriving here by **boat** or plane.*
- boatswain** A petty officer on a merchant ship who controls the work of other seamen.
- captain** Be the captain of a ship aircraft or sports team.  
*The cup was presented to the winning team's **captain**.*
- circumnavigate** Travel around, either by plane or ship.  
*He undertook to **circumnavigate** the globe in 80 days or less.*

<b>crew</b>	Act as a member of a crew subordinate to a captain. <i>A <b>crew</b> of assorted computer geeks.</i>
<b>cruise</b>	Travel or move around a place slowly, typically in search of something. <i>Millwall <b>cruised</b> to a 2 0 win over Leicester.</i>
<b>embark</b>	Set out on (an enterprise or subject of study). <i>She <b>embarked</b> upon a new career.</i>
<b>exploration</b>	A careful systematic search. <i>An <b>exploration</b> of the African interior.</i>
<b>explorer</b>	A commercial browser. <i>A polar <b>explorer</b>.</i>
<b>find</b>	Come upon after searching find the location of something that was missed or lost. <i>Did you <b>find</b> your glasses.</i>
<b>flight</b>	A formation of aircraft in flight. <i>A <b>flight</b> of fancy.</i>
<b>galleon</b>	A large square-rigged sailing ship with three or more masts; used by the Spanish for commerce and war from the 15th to 18th centuries. <i>A Spanish treasure <b>galleon</b> wrecked off the Florida Keys.</i>
<b>geographer</b>	An expert in the study of the physical features of the earth and its atmosphere, and of human activity as it affects and is affected by these.
<b>jack</b>	Hunt with a jacklight. <i>You don t know <b>jack</b>.</i>
<b>journey</b>	Undertake a journey or trip. <i>I was excited with my character s <b>journey</b> in the film.</i>
<b>mariner</b>	A sailor. <i>The intrepid <b>mariners</b> of yesteryear set out to discover new worlds.</i>
<b>navigation</b>	The guidance of ships or airplanes from place to place. <i>Columbus corrected his westward course by celestial <b>navigation</b>.</i>
<b>prospector</b>	A person who searches for mineral deposits, especially by drilling and excavation. <i>I see myself as a <b>prospector</b> of opportunities for my clients.</i>
<b>sailing</b>	The action of sailing in a ship or boat. <i>A <b>sailing</b> club.</i>
<b>sailor</b>	A person who rarely (or often) becomes sick at sea in rough weather. <i>He is a keen <b>sailor</b> in his spare time.</i>
<b>ship</b>	Embark on a ship. <i>Jack you <b>shipped</b> with the Admiral once didn t you.</i>

<b>shipwreck</b>	Cause to experience shipwreck. <i>She found herself clinging to the kitchen cabinet like a <b>shipwrecked</b> mariner to a rock.</i>
<b>steamboat</b>	A boat propelled by a steam engine.
<b>tour</b>	Take a performer production etc on tour. <i>A <b>tour</b> of the White House.</i>
<b>travel</b>	The action of travelling. <i>Light <b>travels</b> faster than sound.</i>
<b>trip</b>	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>Sammy s gone on a school <b>trip</b>.</i>
<b>voyage</b>	Go on a voyage. <i>Writing a biography is a <b>voyage</b> of discovery.</i>
