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Associations of "Neither here nor there" (30 Words)

anywhere	At or in or to any place anyplace is used informally for anywhere. <i>He could get anywhere from three to seven years.</i>
be	Be present. <i>That was before the war.</i>
being	Being alive living. <i>A rational being.</i>
concurrent	Agreeing or consistent. <i>He received concurrent sentences of two years imprisonment for each of his two convictions.</i>
empirical	Based on, concerned with, or verifiable by observation or experience rather than theory or pure logic. <i>They provided considerable empirical evidence to support their argument.</i>
everywhere	To or in any or all places; (‘everyplace’ is used informally fo. <i>He carried a gun everywhere he went.</i>
exist	Have an existence be extant. <i>He could barely exist on such a low wage.</i>
existence	A way of living. <i>The biggest tree in existence.</i>
existing	Presently existing. <i>The existing system.</i>
extant	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i>An extant letter.</i>
habitable	Fit for habitation. <i>The house should be habitable by Christmas.</i>
heretofore	Before now. <i>Diseases that heretofore were usually confined to rural areas.</i>

hitherto	Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i>Hitherto part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i>
hypostasis	The accumulation of fluid or blood in the lower parts of the body or organs under the influence of gravity, as occurs in cases of poor circulation or after death.
live	Be alive at a specified time. <i>I told her where the coffee lived and went back to sleep.</i>
location	A particular place or position. <i>The movie was filmed entirely on location.</i>
now	In these times- Nancy Mitford. <i>Now my first impulse was to run away.</i>
outlast	Live longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will outlast youth.</i>
outlive	Live through (an experience). <i>She outlived her husband by many years.</i>
<u>pertain</u>	Be in effect or existence in a specified place or at a specified time. <i>Matters pertaining to the organization of government.</i>
place	Take a place in a competition often followed by an ordinal. <i>I can't be in two places at once.</i>
<u>presence</u>	The impression that something is present. <i>He tested for the presence of radon.</i>
present	Bring forward and present to the mind. <i>She did not expect to find herself in her present situation.</i>
<u>reproduction</u>	Recall that is hypothesized to work by storing the original stimulus input and reproducing it during recall. <i>Gutenberg's reproduction of holy texts was far more efficient.</i>
somewhere	In or at or to some place someplace is used informally for somewhere. <i>She must be somewhere.</i>
<u>survival</u>	Something that survives. <i>His shorts were a survival from his army days.</i>
<u>survive</u>	Support oneself. <i>Against all odds the child survived.</i>
<u>sustain</u>	An effect or facility on a keyboard or electronic instrument whereby a note can be sustained after the key is released. <i>This thought had sustained him throughout the years.</i>
