aflutter	Excited in anticipation. <i>He has the physique that could send a thousand female hearts aflutter.</i>
agitated	Troubled emotionally and usually deeply. <i>Agitated parents.</i>
anxious	Very eager or concerned to do something or for something to happen. <i>There were some anxious moments.</i>
<u>apprehensive</u>	In fear or dread of possible evil or harm. <i>Apprehensive of danger.</i>
<u>brittle</u>	(of a person's voice) unpleasantly hard and sharp and showing signs of instability or nervousness. <i>Glass is brittle.</i>
<u>edgy</u>	Being in a tense state. <i>Tremendously edgy brass playing.</i>

<u>embarrassed</u>	Feeling or caused to feel uneasy and self-conscious. <i>I felt quite embarrassed whenever I talked to her.</i>
<u>excitable</u>	Responding too readily to something new or stimulating; easily excited. <i>A rather excitable young man.</i>
fearful	Experiencing or showing fear. <i>A fearful howling.</i>
febrile	Having or showing the symptoms of a fever. <i>A febrile reaction caused by an allergen.</i>
fevered	Highly or nervously excited. <i>They mopped his fevered brow.</i>
fidgety	Nervous and unable to relax. <i>I get nervous and fidgety at the dentist.</i>
<u>flighty</u>	Fickle and irresponsible. <i>Her mother was a flighty Southern belle.</i>
frightened	Made afraid. <i>A frightened child.</i>
<u>hysterical</u>	Characterized by or arising from psychoneurotic hysteria-Morris Fishbein. <i>Janet became hysterical and began screaming.</i>
ill at ease	Affected by an impairment of normal physical or mental function.
in a cold sweat	Directed or bound inward.
in a state of agitation	Currently fashionable.
in a state of nerves	Directed or bound inward.
jumpy	Causing or characterized by jolts and irregular movements. <i>A jumpy pulse.</i>
keyed up	Serving as an essential component.
like a cat on a hot tin roof	Having the same or similar characteristics.
neural	Relating to a nerve or the nervous system. <i>Neural disorder.</i>
neurological	Relating to the anatomy, functions, and organic disorders of nerves and the nervous system. <i>Neurological evidence.</i>
<u>neurotic</u>	Characteristic of or affected by neurosis. <i>He seemed a neurotic self obsessed character.</i>

overwrought	(of a piece of writing or a work of art) too elaborate or complicated in design or construction. <i>She was too overwrought to listen to reason.</i>
queasy	Causing or fraught with or showing anxiety. <i>The queasy swell of the boat.</i>
<u>restless</u>	Lacking or not affording physical or mental rest. <i>The restless sea.</i>
scared	Made afraid. <i>We re both scared of spiders.</i>
<u>shaky</u>	Unstable because of poor construction or heavy use. <i>After a shaky start the Scottish team made superb efforts.</i>
<u>skittish</u>	(of an animal, especially a horse) nervous or excitable; easily scared. <i>A skittish chestnut mare.</i>
<u>spooky</u>	Unpredictably excitable (especially of horses). <i>I bet this place is really spooky late at night.</i>
<u>strained</u>	Of a mainly liquid substance having been strained to separate out any solid matter. <i>A constrained smile.</i>
stressed	Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed. <i>He dropped out of the race clearly distressed and having difficulty breathing.</i>
strung out	That is on a string.
<u>tense</u>	Pronounced with relatively tense tongue muscles e g the vowel sound in beat. <i>She tried to relax her tense muscles.</i>
<u>trembling</u>	Shaking or quivering, typically as a result of anxiety, excitement, or frailty. <i>Trembling hands.</i>
<u>uncomfortable</u>	Causing or feeling unease or awkwardness. <i>Grew uncomfortable beneath his appraising eye.</i>
<u>uneasy</u>	(of a situation or relationship) not settled; liable to change. <i>She fell into an uneasy sleep.</i>
unquiet	Uneasy; anxious. <i>Poor Amy s unquiet spirit.</i>
worked up	Out of bed.

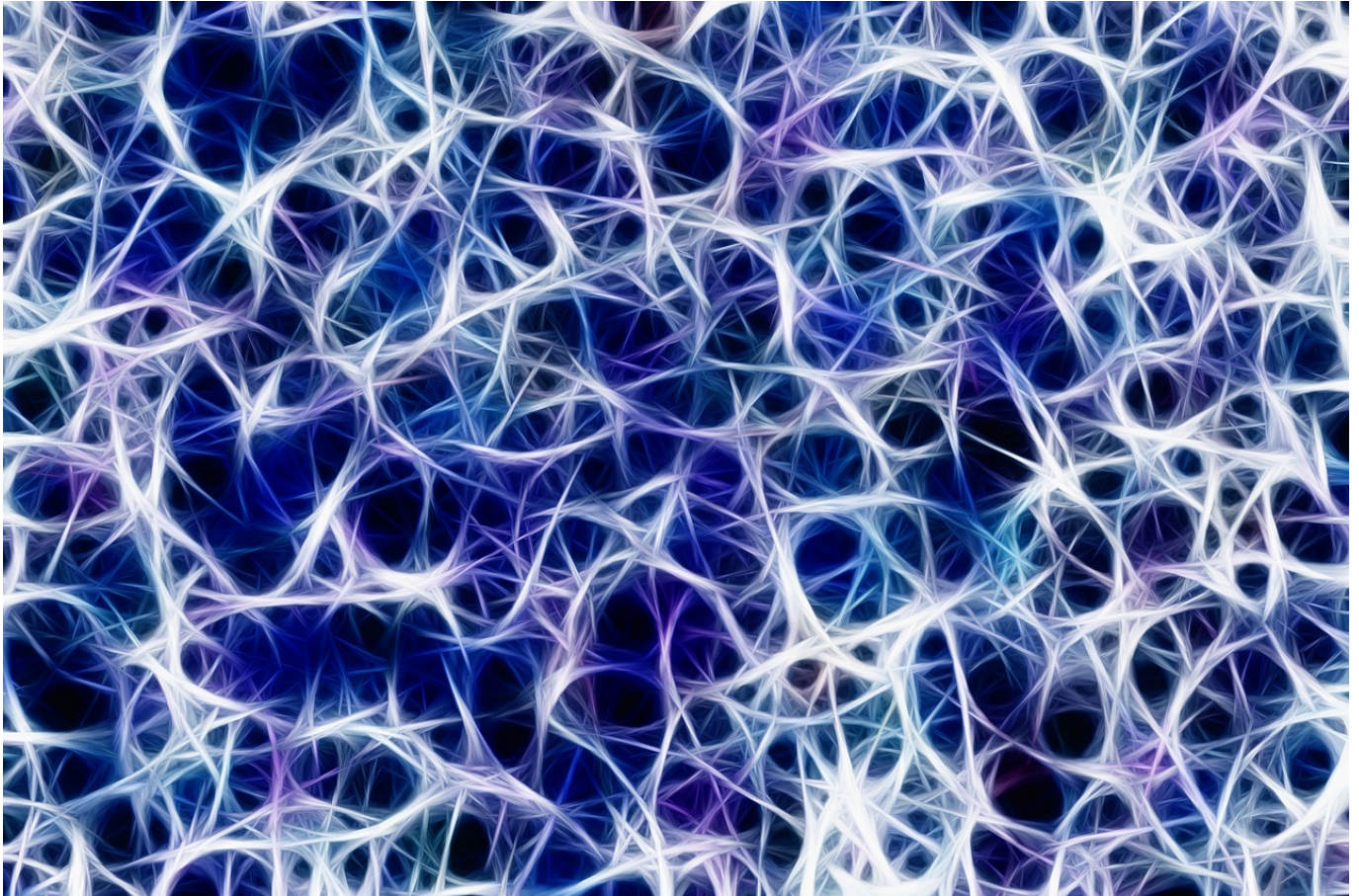
worried

Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief.

*He is **worried** that we are not sustaining high employment.*

wrought up

Shaped to fit by or as if by altering the contours of a pliable mass (as by work or effort).

harried	Feeling strained as a result of having demands persistently made on one; harassed. <i>Harried detectives answer ringing phones.</i>
<u>impatience</u>	The tendency to be impatient; irritability or restlessness. <i>He was shifting in his seat with impatience.</i>
<u>insecurity</u>	The state of being subject to danger or injury. <i>She had a deep sense of insecurity.</i>
irritability	An irritable petulant feeling. <i>Symptoms include insomnia and irritability.</i>
nervously	In an anxiously nervous manner. <i>Kevin nervously glanced at his watch.</i>
nervy	Characterized or produced by apprehension or uncertainty. <i>He was nervy and on edge.</i>
paralyze	Cause to be paralyzed and immobile. <i>The bureaucracy paralyzes the entire operation.</i>
peevish	Having or showing an irritable disposition. <i>A thin peevish voice.</i>
petulance	The quality of being childishly sulky or bad-tempered. <i>A slight degree of petulance had crept into his voice.</i>
<u>preoccupied</u>	Having or showing excessive or compulsive concern with something. <i>She seemed a bit preoccupied.</i>
querulous	Habitually complaining. <i>She became querulous and demanding.</i>
restlessly	In a restless manner.
<u>skittish</u>	(of a person) playfully frivolous or unpredictable. <i>My skittish and immature mother.</i>
solicitous	Showing hovering attentiveness. <i>Solicitous parents.</i>
<u>strained</u>	Of a mainly liquid substance having been strained to separate out any solid matter. <i>There was a strained silence.</i>
stressed	Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed. <i>Stressed concrete walls.</i>
<u>temper</u>	Make more temperate acceptable or suitable by adding something else. <i>Tempered steel pins.</i>
<u>tense</u>	Become tense nervous or uneasy. <i>She tried to relax her tense muscles.</i>

troubled Characterized by or indicative of distress or affliction or danger or need.
***Troubled** teenagers.*

uneasy Lacking a sense of security or affording no ease or reassurance.
*She lived in a state of **uneasy** truce with her strict father.*

uptight Anxious or angry in a tense and overly controlled way.
*He is so **uptight** about everything.*

volatility Tendency of a substance to evaporate at normal temperatures.
*The **volatility** of the market drove many investors away.*

worried Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief.
*A **worried** frown.*
