**edginess** Feelings of anxiety that make you tense and irritable.

fear An unpleasant emotion caused by the threat of danger, pain, or harm.

He is prey to irrational **fear**s.

**fearfulness** The trait of being afraid.

**foreboding** A feeling of evil to come.

With a sense of **foreboding** she read the note.

**fretfulness** An irritable petulant feeling.

jitteriness The anxious feeling you have when you have the jitters.

jumpiness The anxious feeling you have when you have the jitters.

**misgiving** Doubt about someone's honesty.

I felt a sense of **misgiving** at the prospect of retirement.

Control of your emotions.
