### Definitions of "Neutral" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “neutral” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not supporting or favoring either side in a war, dispute, or contest.*
- *Not supporting or helping either side in a conflict, disagreement, etc.; impartial.*
- *Having no net electric charge.*
- *Possessing no distinctive quality or characteristics.*
- *Belonging to an impartial group or state.*
- *Lacking distinguishing quality or characteristics.*
- *Of or denoting a pale grey, cream, or beige colour.*
- *Having only a limited ability to react chemically; chemically inactive.*
- *Having no personal preference.*
- *Having no hue.*
- *Neither acid nor alkaline; having a pH of about 7.*
- *Having neither a positive nor negative electrical charge.*

- *Having no strongly marked or positive characteristics or features.*

<b>achromatic</b>	Relating to, using, or denoting lenses that transmit light without separating it into constituent colours. <i>The <b>achromatic</b> gloom.</i>
<a href="#"><u>anodyne</u></a>	Not likely to cause offence or disagreement and somewhat dull. <i>The <b>anodyne</b> properties of certain drugs.</i>
<a href="#"><u>bland</u></a>	Lacking strong features or characteristics and therefore uninteresting. <i>A <b>bland</b> little drama.</i>
<b>clinical</b>	Relating to the observation and treatment of actual patients rather than theoretical or laboratory studies. <i>He spoke in the clipped <b>clinical</b> monotones typical of police testimony.</i>
<b>commonplace</b>	Not interesting or original; trite. <i><b>Commonplace</b> everyday activities.</i>

<b>detached</b>	Not fixed in position. <i>She may be <b>detached</b> or even unfeeling but at least she is not hypocritically effusive.</i>
<b>disinterested</b>	Having or feeling no interest in something; uninterested. <i>Her father was so <b>disinterested</b> in her progress that he only visited the school once.</i>
<b>dispassionate</b>	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>She dealt with life's disasters in a calm <b>dispassionate</b> way.</i>
<b>electroneutral</b>	Having no net electric charge.
<b>equitable</b>	Fair to all parties as dictated by reason and conscience. <i>The <b>equitable</b> distribution of resources.</i>
<b>everyday</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i><b>Everyday</b> chores like shopping and housework.</i>
<b>fair</b>	Lacking exceptional quality or ability. <i>Today will be <b>fair</b> and warm.</i>
<b>fair-minded</b>	Of a person; just and impartial; not prejudiced.
<b>impartial</b>	Treating all rivals or disputants equally. <i>The cold neutrality of an <b>impartial</b> judge.</i>
<b>impersonal</b>	(of a verb) used only with a formal subject (in English usually it) and expressing an action not attributable to a definite subject (as in it is snowing). <i>An <b>impersonal</b> corporation.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	Not good; fairly bad. <i>What others think is altogether <b>indifferent</b> to him.</i>
<b>inert</b>	Lacking vigour. <i>She lay <b>inert</b> in her bed.</i>
<b>inoffensive</b>	Not causing anger or annoyance. <i>A shy <b>inoffensive</b> and sensitive girl.</i>
<b>objective</b>	(of a person or their judgement) not influenced by personal feelings or opinions in considering and representing facts. <i><b>Objective</b> art.</i>
<b>open-minded</b>	Ready to entertain new ideas.
<b>ordinary</b>	Not exceptional in any way especially in quality or ability or size or degree. <i>An <b>ordinary</b> day.</i>

<b>pale</b>	(of a person or their complexion) having less colour than usual, typically as a result of shock, fear, or ill health. <i>The late afternoon light coming through the el tracks fell in <b>pale</b> oblongs on the street.</i>
<b>pastel</b>	Delicate and pale in color. <i><b>Pastel</b> pink.</i>
<b>removed</b>	(with reference to cousins) separated in relationship by a particular number of steps of descent. <i>A cousin once <b>removed</b>.</i>
<b>run-of-the-mill</b>	Not special in any way.
<b>unaffiliated</b>	Not affiliated. <i><b>Unaffiliated</b> one day events.</i>
<b>unaligned</b>	Not placed or arranged in a straight line, in parallel, or in correct relative positions. <i><b>Unaligned</b> diagonals.</i>
<b>unallied</b>	Not allied; having no allies.
<b>unbiased</b>	Without bias. <i>They give clear <b>unbiased</b> advice.</i>
<b>unemotional</b>	Unsusceptible to or destitute of or showing no emotion. <i>A flat <b>unemotional</b> voice.</i>
<b>unexceptionable</b>	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>A judge's ethics should be <b>unexceptionable</b>.</i>
<b>uninvolved</b>	Showing lack of emotional involvement. <i>Convicted killers in documentaries sound <b>uninvolved</b> and mechanical.</i>
<b>unobjectionable</b>	Free from objectionable elements; fit for all observers. <i>The bail conditions were <b>unobjectionable</b> as far as he was concerned.</i>
<b>unprejudiced</b>	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>An <b>unprejudiced</b> reading of the New Testament.</i>
<b>unremarkable</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>An <b>unremarkable</b> house.</i>

<b>arbitrate</b>	(of an independent person or body) reach an authoritative judgement or settlement. <i>The board has the power to <b>arbitrate</b> in disputes.</i>
<b>asexual</b>	Not having or involving sex. <i><b>Asexual</b> parasites.</i>
<b>average</b>	Calculate or estimate the average of. <i>A very <b>average</b> director making very <b>average</b> movies.</i>
<b>central</b>	Accessible from a variety of places. <i>A <b>central</b> position.</i>

<b>equitable</b>	Valid in equity as distinct from law. <i><b>Equitable</b> treatment of all citizens.</i>
<b>equity</b>	The value of a mortgaged property after deduction of charges against it. <i>He owns 62 of the group s <b>equity</b>.</i>
<b>halfway</b>	In the middle of a period of time. <i>He stopped <b>halfway</b> down the passage.</i>
<b>impartial</b>	Showing lack of favoritism. <i>The <b>impartial</b> eye of a scientist.</i>
<b>impartiality</b>	An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure <b>impartiality</b> in the judging process.</i>
<b>impersonal</b>	(of a place or organization) featureless and anonymous. <i>An <b>impersonal</b> tower block.</i>
<b>interim</b>	An interim dividend profit etc. <i>In the <b>interim</b> I ll just keep my fingers crossed.</i>
<b>intermediate</b>	An intermediate thing. <i>A pathway leading to the formation of reactive <b>intermediates</b>.</i>

<b>level</b>	Become level or even. <i>You can easily take a character to <b>level</b> 20 in less than 15 hours and finish the campaign.</i>
<b>median</b>	The median value of a range of values. <i>The <b>median</b> duration of this treatment was four months.</i>
<b>mediocre</b>	Of only average quality; not very good. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from <b>mediocre</b> to above average.</i>
<b><u>middle</u></b>	In cricket tennis etc strike the ball with the middle of the bat racket or club. <i>Rain during the <b>middle</b> of April.</i>
<b>middlebrow</b>	A middlebrow person. <i><b>Middlebrow</b> fiction.</i>
<b>midst</b>	The location of something surrounded by other things. <i>He left his flat in the <b>midst</b> of a rainstorm.</i>
<b>midway</b>	Equally distant from the extremes. <i>A <b>midway</b> path is chosen between the diverging aspirations of the two factions.</i>
<b>moderate</b>	A person who holds moderate views especially in politics. <i><b>Moderate</b> success.</i>
<b><u>modest</u></b>	Marked by simplicity; having a humble opinion of yourself. <i><b>Modest</b> dress means that hemlines must be below the knee.</i>
<b>neuter</b>	The neuter gender. <i>A <b>neutered</b> tomcat.</i>
<b>neutrality</b>	Absence of decided views, expression, or strong feeling. <i>The structure has overall electrical <b>neutrality</b>.</i>
<b><u>objectivity</u></b>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any <b>objectivity</b>.</i>
<b>unbiased</b>	Showing no prejudice for or against something; impartial. <i>They give clear <b>unbiased</b> advice.</i>
<b>unprejudiced</b>	Not having or showing a dislike or distrust based on fixed or preconceived ideas. <i>An <b>unprejudiced</b> reading of the New Testament.</i>
